## Explanation and History of Ultimate

Ultimate is a game that is played by two teams consisting of seven players each. The two teams start on opposite end-zone lines on a field which is 125 yards long and 50 yards wide. One team pulls (kicks-off) to the other team. The receiving team must advance the frisbee into the end-zone by passing it - running with the frisbee is a traveling violation.

The team which pulled plays defense and tries to intercept or knock down the frisbee by doing anything they can short of significant physical contact with another player. Doing so would result in a foul. If the defense succeeds in intercepting or knocking down the disc a turnover is the result and the team previously playing defense immediately plays offense.

This guideline is for the spectators and is by no means intended as a substitute for the rules. Players should be advised to play by the revised eighth edition rules.

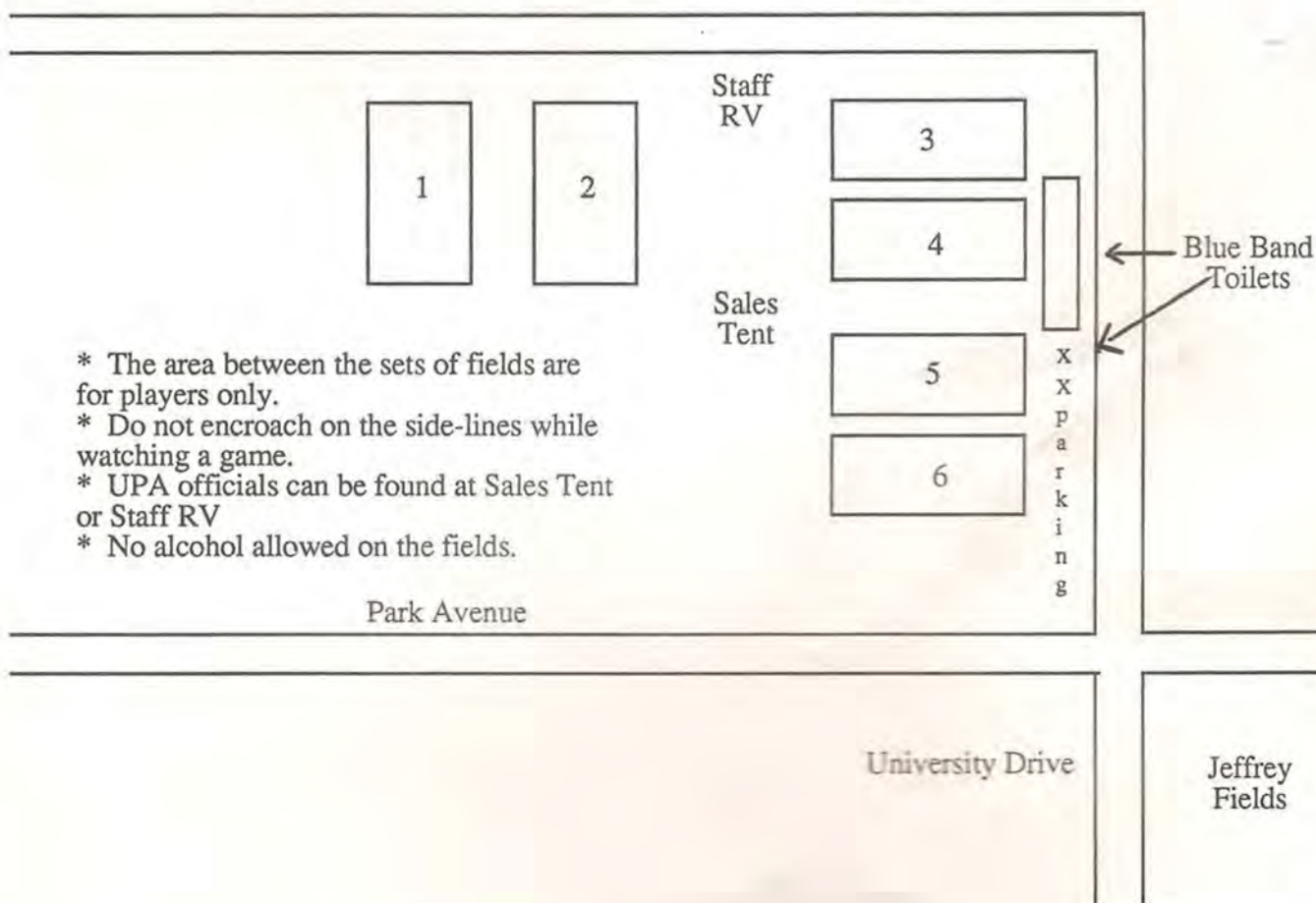
Ultimate was invented in 1968 at Columbia High School in New Jersey and has since been played competitively at the high school, college, and club levels as well as in the gym classes and backyards. New Jersey has been regarded as the birthplace and home of Ultimate ever since its inception. Up until 1983, both clubs and colleges played against each other for championships. Now, in the fall season it is played that way, but in the spring there are separate championships, hence this being the fourth **collegiate** championship. Spectators at this tournament are fortunate to see the pioneers of the sport set precedents for what should be a long future of the sport. These players are doing for Ultimate what Honus Wagner and Cy Young did for baseball.

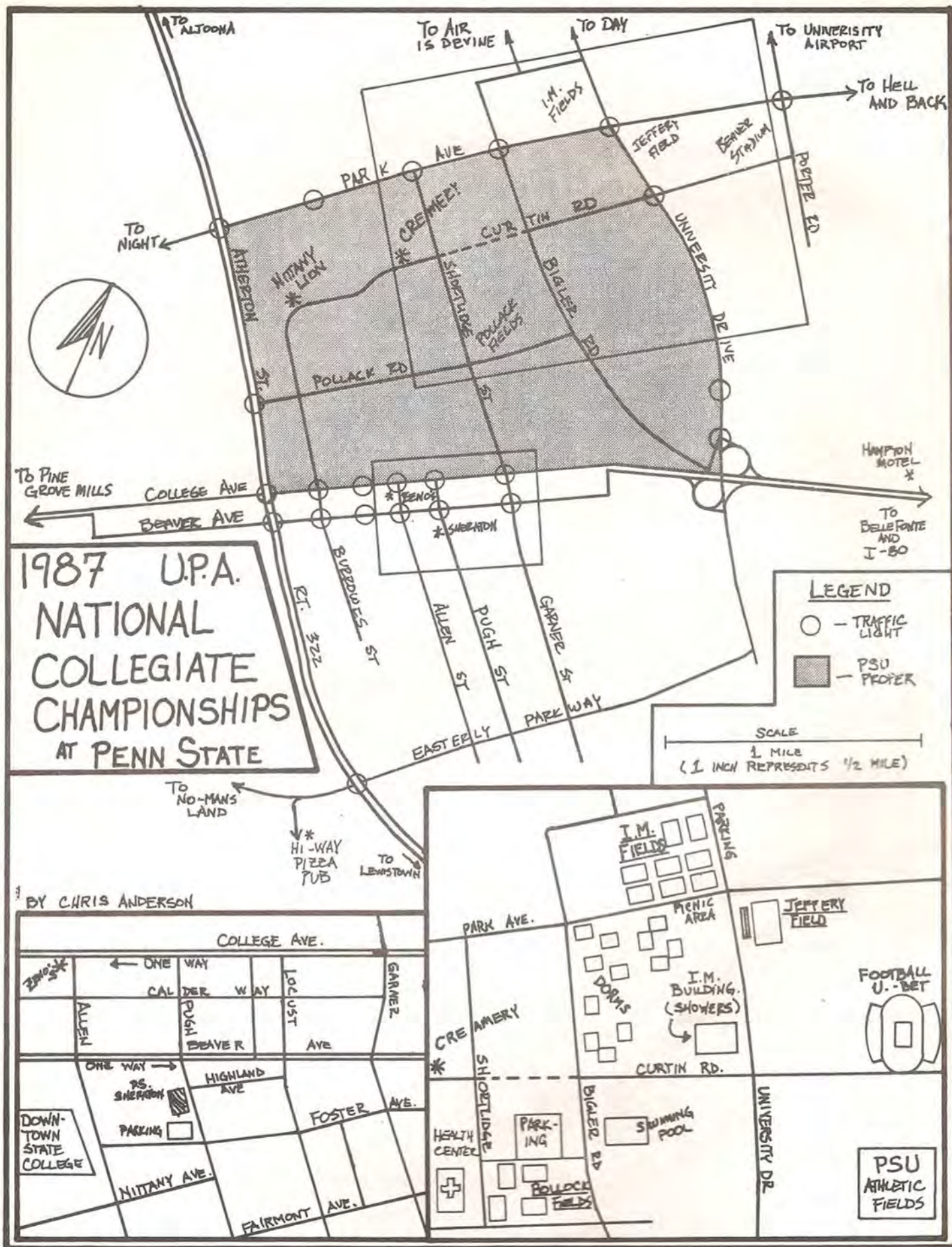

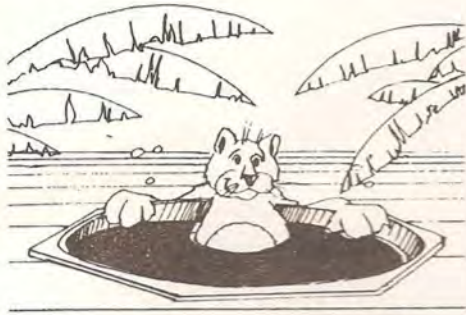
All restaurants and bars listed (with the exception of Hoss's and The Post House Tavern) are in downtown State College and can be walked to from The Sheraton with ease.
