FROM THE NATIONAL COLLEGE DIRECTOR

This weekend, the nation's top 12 open and top 10 women's teams from colleges across the country will play for the title of champion. 1993 marks the 10th anniversary of the UPA College National Championships. As perhaps the only person to have attended every one (first as a spectator, twice as a player, and since then as an official), I can claim to have the perspective to survey how far we've come in a decade.

Some things have changed a lot. The level of play has steadily increased to the point where the college teams of today are every bit as sophisticated and athletic, if not experienced, as their Open Club counterparts. There are steadily more teams competing each year, and real support and recognition from school administrations continues to grow as Ultimate becomes more recognized for the solid sport that it is. The women's division at College Nationals has been born and become highly competitive.

Some things, however, have remained fundamentally unchanged. The Spirit of the Game continues to be the motivating factor that drives all Ultimate players, and the College Nationals continues to be the Standard by which Ultimate measures this value that binds Ultimate players across the country, and indeed the globe.

The sport of Ultimate still gives special meaning to the phrase, "PLAY for the title." The competitors are quite serious; they have put forth enormous personal effort to get here; more than any of us will ever know. Yet the game itself is still marked by an enthusiasm and joy that recalls a primary notion of PLAY. PLAYers are responsible for every aspect of the game, including the upkeep of the rules on the field of play. Referees are nowhere to be found in Ultimate. Observers mitigate the effects of the pressure inherent in top level games with the most at stake, but the players maintain real control over the game.

I am confident that the core values of Ultimate will be reaffirmed and showcased here this weekend. Tournament producers Jay Cohen and Gimp, and the Lehigh Low Earth Orbit, have been working steadily for months to bring together this event in fine fashion. Ultimate players, including some experienced veterans from around the country, have volunteered their time to staff this event. Enjoy the results of their labor; be aware of their efforts, be impressed and let them know it. Inexplicably, running a tournament can be one of the most thankless jobs in Ultimate - let's change that here.

To the competitors: CONGRATULATIONS, you are all champions no matter who takes home the trophies (and Spirit awards). Treasure the experience of nationals, it is rare. PLAY hard, PLAY with spirit and have fun! You are ushering in the second decade of College Nationals!

Lehigh Sports Medicine

Sports Medicine

The Lehigh University Sports Medicine Department is becoming one of the most innovative and progressive programs in the East. The staff of athletic trainers is dedicated to providing the utmost in quality care to its athletes. The realm of care includes the prevention of athletic injuries, recognition and treatment of injuries, rehabilitation of the athlete and health, fitness and nutrition education.

The National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA), which certifies all athletic trainers at Lehigh, is a professional organization that was established in 1949 for the purpose of advancing, encouraging and improving the athletic training profession. Its certification process is an academically and clinically demanding one. Sophisticated educational guidelines have been imposed.

The subject matter in which an athletic trainer must be proficient includes: prevention of athletic injury/illness, evaluation of athletic injury/illness, first aid and emergency care, therapeutic modalities, therapeutic exercise, human anatomy, biology, human physiology, exercise physiology, biomechanics, physics, psychology and nutrition.

The prevention of athletic injuries is the primary concern for an athletic trainer. Among the modes of prevention employed at Lehigh are regular orthopaedic physical examinations, well-devised conditioning programs, proper protective equipment and attention to environmental factors.

At the collegiate level, athletic trainers are often the first person at the site of an injury and must recognize and evaluate the condition. They provide daily team coverage for practices and contests, administer treatments and conduct rehabilitation programs. Immediate recognition of a particular injury or illness is critical to expediting the treatment and, therefore, the healing process. The care offered by an athletic trainer is professional and quite indispensable.

The injury rehabilitation process can range from a few days to a year, depending upon the type and severity of the injury. As an athletic trainer, it is important to develop rehabilitation programs that will be continually challenging to the athlete. A successful program requires a great amount of commitment by the athlete as well as the athletic trainer. Director of Sports Medicine Jack Foley says that "we try to create an optimal environment for healing to occur. It helps to know the individual personalities of the players in order to keep them motivated. It takes a delicate balance to maintain the intensity level, both physically and mentally. Our ultimate goal is to return the athlete to a functional and successful level of activity."

The sports medicine facility and equipment at Lehigh are state-

of-the-art. The athletic trainers have the experience and equipment to manage the most minor bumps to serious debilitating injuries.

In addition, sports medicine at Lehigh includes a comprehensive and innovative alcohol and drug education program, in which all student-athletes are encouraged to participate. Just this past year the department instituted a new student-athlete meal program and established skin infection treatment guidelines, which have since been adopted by the NCAA.

Sports medicine has certainly grownimmeasurably since the days of the "bucket and sponge." The Lehigh sports medicine staff has made a commitment to contribute to that growth and to continue to provide excellent care to the athlete. Lehigh University athletes are served by a team of professionals which is dedicated to the prevention, management and treatment of athletic injuries.





Getting to Lehigh University



Getting to Lehigh....

From Route 22:

The easiest way to approach Lehigh is from Route 22 to the north of Bethlehem. From Route 22 take the Bethlehem \Route 378 exit. Continue for 3.6 miles to the point where you cross the bridge over the Lehigh River, being careful to stay in the left lane as you cross the bridge.

Turn left at the traffic light for Third Street at the end of the bridge. Continue one block down the ramp to the traffic light at Brodhead Avenue, and turn right. Continue on Brodhead three and a half blocks until you see a sign on your left to enter the Lehigh Campus.

Follow this entrance to the first stop sign. At the stop sign, turn right, and follow than road as it winds to the right through a steel gate. The road will then wind left and come to a stop sign. At the stop sign go left to the next stop sign. Ahead on the right will be a green building; McClintic-Marshall (M&M) is the

next building on your right after the green building.

From Route I-78:


If you approach Bethlehem from the south from Route I-78, take the Hellertown exit. Turn left onto Route 412 at the exit and drive through the borough of Hellertown approximately one mile to a traffic light at Water Street. Turn right onto Water Street and travel approximately one-half-mile to the intersection of Mountain Drive South at the entrance to Murray H. Goodman campus. Turn right onto Mountain Drive and follow it to the top of South Mountain, and then begin to descend along Mountain Drive North.


Take the second left after the second stop sign on Mountain Drive North. Follow the road to the first fork (approximately one-half-mile) and bear right around the curve to the stop sign (the green-painted Taylor College will be in front of you.) Bear left to the iron gates and turn right at the stop sign. McClintic-Marshall is the first building on your right after Taylor
