A Message from the Director of Competition

Welcome, competitors, staff and spectators, to the 1995 UPA College National Championships – one of my favorite tournaments of the year!

One of the things I love about College Nationals is that there are always new faces. That it especially true this year, where there are more new teams than in any year past. I want to give a warm welcome to teams which have never qualified for Nationals before: In the Open Division, Yale, Williams, and LSU; and in the Women's Division, Stanford, Colorado, and Yale.

I love the competition. Defending champ East Carolina is back. Does anyone remember the last time they played the West region champ? It was at Penn State in 1993, and Santa Cruz won by a large margin to eliminate ECU from the semis on a tiebreaker. Will they meet again this year? Can Carleton improve from two consecutive semifinal losses to become the first Central team to make the finals in the Open Division? Can Georgia become the first South semifinalist since the glory days of Texas in the late 1980's? Can UNC-Wilmington add on to their streak of three consecutive final-four appearances – which happens to be the longest current streak in the College Division? And I love the spirit. Quite simply: college competition has loads more spirit than the Club Division.

So to players I say: congratulations, and have the time of your lives. Savor these times, you don't know when, or even if, you will ever get to play in a Nationals again. To staff: a million thanks, because without you, this event just wouldn't happen. This goes to the host crew, the folks at UPA Headquarters, to the myriad of scorekeepers and observers, and a whole host of other people whose volunteer work has helped made this possible. 

The numbers represent the field that the team plays on during that time slot (see field map, next page). 'bye' means the team has no game that time slot. 'qu' is used for the women's division, and represents the quarterfinals.







