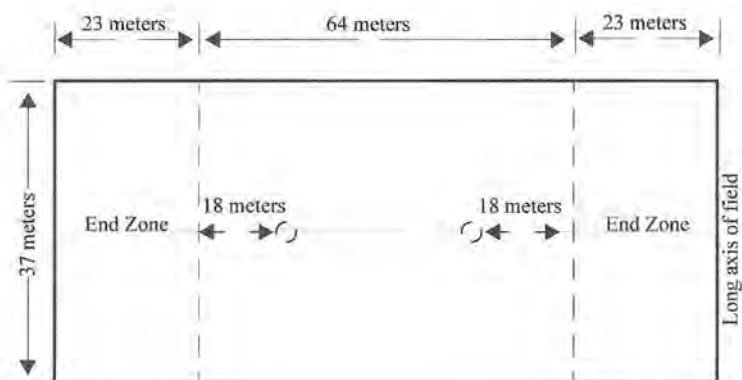

Half-time and Post-game: Award Ceremony. During half-time, awards will be presented to the Spirit Award teams and Spirit Award individuals (one from each team). Immediately following finals, awards will be presented to 1st and 2nd place teams in each division.



Ultimate in 10

1. **The Field** - A rectangular shape with end zones at each end. A regulation field is 70 yards by 40 yards, with end zones 25 yards deep.
2. **Initiate Play** - Each point begins with both teams lining up on the front of their respective end zone. The defense throws ("pulls") the disc to the offense. A regulation game has seven players per team.
3. **Scoring** - Each time the offense completes a pass in the defense's end zone, the offense scores a point. Play is initiated after each score.
4. **Movement of the Disc** - The disc may be advanced in any direction by completing a pass to a teammate. Players may not run with the disc. The person with the disc ("thrower") has ten seconds to throw the disc. The defender guarding the thrower ("marker") counts the stall count.
5. **Change of Possession** - When a pass is not completed (i.e., out of bounds, drop, block, interception), the defense immediately takes possession of the disc and becomes offense.

Simple Rules

6. **Substitutions** - Players not in the game may replace players in the game after a score and during an injury timeout.

7. **Non-Contact** - No physical contact is allowed between players. Picks and screens are also prohibited. A foul occurs when contact is made.

8. **Fouls** - When a player initiates contact on another players, a foul occurs. When a foul disrupts possession, the play resumes as if the possession was retained. If the player committing the foul disagrees with the foul call, the play is redone.

9. **Self-Refereeing** - Players are responsible for their own foul and line calls. Players resolve their own disputes.

10. **Spirit of the Game** - Ultimate stresses sportsmanship and fair play. Competitive play is encouraged, but never at the expense of respect between players, adherence to the rules and the basic joy of play.

From the hotels, take Hwy 290 E for about two miles. Head south on 183, which is also known as Ed Bluestein Rd, for two miles. Turn left on Loyola Lane, and go for just under half a mile. The entrance to the Austin Rugby Clubhouse and Burr Fields will be on your right. Take that road for about 1/2 a mile. Don't give up hope! The clubhouse is at the end.

FIELDS:

UT Whitaker Fields

51st & Guadalupe

The Whitaker Fields are 1.5 mile from the hotels. From the hotel, you will head southwest on Middle Fiskville toward E Koenig (2222). Turn right on E Koenig and follow it to the light at Guadalupe (about 1 mile). Turn left on Guadalupe and follow it about 1/2 mile. Fields will be on your left after you cross through the light at 51st.

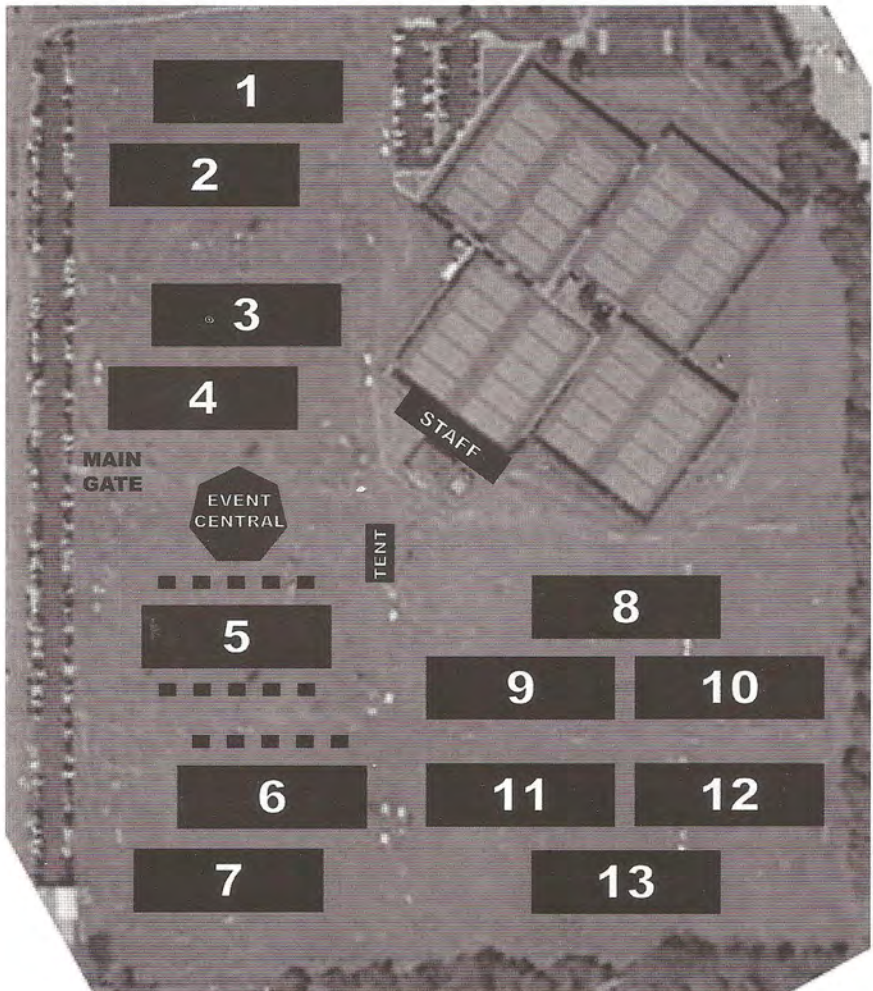

CALLAHAN SPOTTINGS IN AUSTIN, TEXAS

Many of the top candidates for the Callahan Award are here in Austin playing at the UPA College Championships this weekend. The Callahan was first awarded in 1996 and is given out annually to the sport's best male and female players.

The award is determined by a vote of the current college players, and over the past month almost a thousand ballots have been received at the Callahan web site: www.callahan-mvp.com

Each year college teams from throughout the US and Canada nominate the one player from their team that they feel best represents Ultimate in terms of leadership, skill, dedication and sportsmanship. Although over a hundred players have been nominated for this year's award (73 men and 48 women), each division has half a dozen or so candidates that dominate the Callahan discussion.

The award is named after Henry Callahan, the original founder of the University of Oregon Ultimate team, and coincidentally, two of this year's favored candidates attend his alma mater. Ben Wiggins (#1) plays for the Oregon men's team, EGO, the #2 seeded team here in Austin, and Chelsea Dengler, captain of the Oregon women's team.

Team History: Facing a strong field in the spring of 2002, *Chakra* just barely missed advancing to college nationals. With the loss of a strong 2002 senior class, led by Megan Insko and Julie Bird, *Chakra* worked hard to rebuild for the spring 2003 season. *Chakra* regained study-abroad students Tiffany Milner and Taren Stinebrickner-Kauffman and post-grad student Leigh Torres, while recruiting a strong field of new athletes (including Dana Morgan and Rebecca Braynard). Coupling these additions with the leadership of seniors Amy Faulring, Nirupa Goel and post-grad Deb Stutz—and with strong support from post-grad Jeannie Albrecht and juniors Lauren Childs and Mimi Phan—*Chakra* finished second in its first spring tourney, Charlotte's Queen City, losing only to Penn State.

Stanford Invitational: A jet-lagged 1-3 on Saturday was followed up with a 3-0 Sunday to give *Chakra* a #9 finish overall.

College Terminus: *Chakra* went 3-1 on Saturday, losing a nail-biter at the cap to Yale. On Sunday *Chakra* avenged the Yale loss, but came up short against Iowa's long game in the finals.

NC Sectionals: *Chakra* held onto its #2 seed in the NC Section, losing only to #1 Carolina in a time-capped 15-14 barn burner.

Atlantic Coast Regionals: Inspired by the Carolina loss, *Chakra* retooled its offense, going 4-1 on Saturday. Overcoming quarterfinalist Virginia the next morning, *Chakra* then lost a second time to Georgia for the #1 berth to nationals. The backdoor victory over William & Mary clinched the AC region's second bid—and *Chakra*'s first visit to college nationals.

Team History: *sMITe* is proud to represent the New England region at this year's college nationals. Finishing first in their region for the second straight year, this is *sMITe*'s fourth national appearance in six years.

sMITe is composed of a strong core of veterans who made it to the semifinals of last year's national tournament, as well as nine rookies. Unlike the teams of past years, which have gone to tournaments with few to no subs, this year's team sometimes brings

Team History: The Oregon Ultimate team was founded in 1981 by none other than the Henry Callahan. Led by Callahan, Oregon valued the "spirit of the game" and grew to become a strong college team. Reaching nationals out of the vaunted west in 1985 and 1986, Oregon won the National Championship in 1992. After '92 the team entered a period of decline, where anemic results prevailed.

In 1999 all of that changed when two outstanding players and leaders arrived—Josh Greenough and Ben Wiggins. The duo of Greenough and Wiggins bestowed the team with the title EGO, and helped lead it to a series of strong seasons and a berth to the 2001 College Championships by beating rival Stanford for the one bid out of the northwest region, and placing 3rd at the championships.

2002 began with high expectations. With both Greenough and Wiggins returning to captain the team, EGO looked ripe for a repeat trip to nationals and to make a concentrated effort on returning to the podium a decade after Oregon's only trip to the top. But the season ended in disappointment when the team failed to qualify after a deflating loss in the regional final and a burned out effort in the backdoor game.

This year EGO has rebounded. Fielding its strongest team to date, Oregon has played well in many tournaments, including winning President's Day. Again the 2003 EGO has had to come out of the northwest region with only one bid to nationals. After beating Stanford in the semis 15-12, Oregon took down the strong sectional rival Oregon State, 15-10.

Will this be the year that EGO recaptures the crown? Will Oregon repeat as Spirit Award Team Champions, as they did in 2001? We can only wait and see, stay tuned...

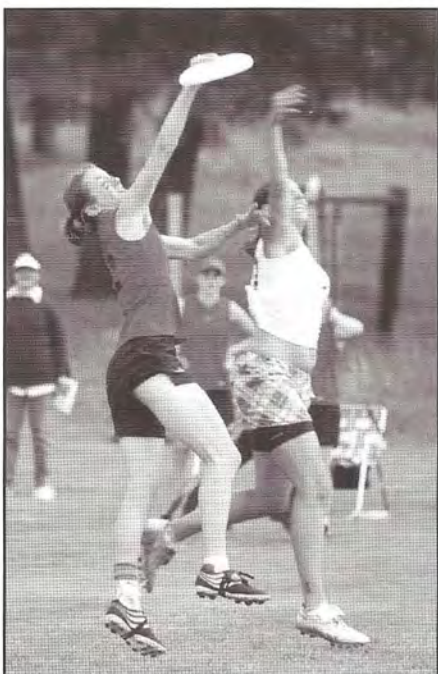
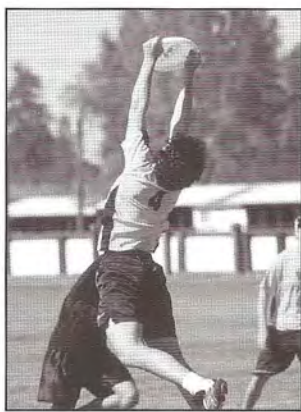

Tribute to Curtis Randall

In a recent trip to northwest regionals in Vancouver, BC, Curtis Randall, a member of the Brigham Young Ultimate team was killed when he lost control of his vehicle, rolling it five times. Curtis was one of the most awe-inspiring individuals I ever met and, as such, I feel it important to commemorate and learn from his life through this article.

Who was Curtis Randall? To the Ultimate world, he was a 6'5", 180 lb nightmare for opposing deeps. He had good hops, great hands, and an uncanny ability to read the disc. I can't count the number of times in which all I could see was his hand extended above a mass of people to catch one of my crappy throws. He uplifted our team not only through his athletic ability, but also through his infectious smile, positive attitude, and faith in his teammates. He didn't play the game just to win or get an award or build his ego. He played to have fun and, Curtis, heaven knows you made the game more fun for the rest of us.

In the Provo, UT Ultimate community, Curtis Randall had a huge role. To Curtis, however, Ultimate was a diversion—a break from the monumental work that he was accomplishing in the rest of his life. He died at the age of 26, but had already accomplished feats that many men don't accomplish for another 10-20 years. He was a loving husband to his wife, Amy, and a caring father to his daughter, Eliza. Don Wichern, who shared housing with Curtis at regionals last year said, "I learned more about how to be a husband and father from Curtis [on that trip] than I have from anyone else, just by listening to how he talked to his wife on the phone."

Curtis also accomplished many great things in his school and community. He was recently accepted into the

doctorate program at BYU for computer science. He magnified his church callings. He was an Eagle Scout. He served an LDS mission in Venezuela. He was a captain of intramural and high school Ultimate, basketball and track teams. I could easily continue, but time and space do not allow.

I truly believe that in order to compensate for the loss to the Ultimate community and the world, we must better ourselves as a collective group. To do so, we need only

look at how Curtis lived his life and find ways to improve our own. Curtis was a goal-setter and lived focused on achieving his goals. He wasn't flaky; he decided what he wanted in life and did the honest, hard work necessary to get it. He didn't sacrifice his integrity or backstab. He just made a habit of utilizing each day to accomplish his goals.

Curtis was a great friend, husband, father, brother, and teammate. He was enjoyable to be around on and off the field. He was a competitor, but never at the expense of others' enjoyment of the game. He was a jokester, an optimist, a mediator, and a guy whose life seemed to

be in perfect order. He taught me how to be a captain without being one himself. I have not overstated anything about him. He truly was that good.

In conclusion, I implore you again to better yourselves as players and individuals in his absence. If you do, Curtis Randall will not have left behind a hole in our community, but a legacy.
