Half-time and Post-Game – Award Ceremony. During half-time, awards will be presented to the Spirit Award teams and Spirit Award individuals (one from each team). Immediately following finals, awards will be presented to 1st and 2nd place teams in each division.

New Format This Year!

The 2006 UPA College Ultimate Championships will represent the fourth year of Ultimate programming on CSTV, the nation's number one destination for college sports. The format for this year's programming will be slightly different than that of years past. In addition to broadcasting a show on each the Open and Women's finals, CSTV will produce two highlight shows, one featuring the Open division and the other the Women's division. We are excited about the new format as it will give more teams airtime opportunities. Because of this new format there will also be a few changes regarding the interviewing process. The interviews will be conducted on the fields, rather than in the CSTV trailer as they had been in the past. When the cameramen approach you please be respectful and do your best to talk about the excitement of Ultimate and the game that you just played.



The cameramen will also try to be respectful of your space and do their best to stay out of the way while they film. However, accidents do happen. If you or your team come across any issues during play, please approach a member of the tournament staff - NOT the cameramen - who will then follow up with the CSTV crew.

INTERVIEW TIPS

- **Always assume that you are being recorded**
- **Eye contact** with the interviewer - very important. Do not look at the camera.
- **Don't fidget!** You could fall out of the shot.
- **Listen to the question** and answer it straight on.
- **Speak clearly**, don't swallow the endings of your words and give a reasonable pause between sentences.
- **Plan ahead.** There are only 5 questions - HOW, WHAT, WHY, WHERE AND WHEN.
- **Never be condescending**, even if you think the interviewer's not really on this planet.
- Take three deep breaths before the interview starts. Settles the nerves - all pro- broadcasters do this simple exercise.
- **Smile and enjoy it** - that will make you sound and feel more confident. The eyes will sparkle and you won't look like a startled rabbit.

COMPETITION RULES



- All games to 15, win by two, cap at 17.
- Half-time is 10 minutes.
- Each team has two timeouts per half.
- Regardless of how many timeouts a team has used before overtime, during overtime each team has one timeout.
- Overtime: A game is in overtime if tied at one point less than original game total, and the winning score will exceed said game total. (e.g. In a game to 15 goals, overtime occurs when the score reaches 14-14 and the minimum winning score is determined to be 16.)
- Time-cap goes on at end of round time on schedule. Add two points to higher score after first score after time-cap. Play to that total. No more win by two.
- The time-cap does not affect timeouts.

SPIRIT AWARDS

Ultimate has traditionally relied upon a spirit of sportsmanship which places the responsibility for fair play on the player himself. Highly competitive play is encouraged, but never at the expense of the bond of mutual respect between players, adherence to the agreed-upon rules of the game, or the basic joy of play.

Team Awards - Following every game, each team will be asked to rate its opponent on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being the rating for the highest level of sportsmanship. These ratings will be averaged and the team in each division with the highest rating will be awarded the Team Spirit Award after their division's finals. Members of the winning teams will each receive a wristband, courtesy of Five Ultimate.

Individual Awards - Teams will each be asked to nominate a player from their own team who they feel displays the highest level of spirit. The definition of spirit is up to each team, but should include elements of sportsmanship, leadership, perseverance, fire, etc. Choose the person whose attitude you wish other people on your team would emulate and who other players off your team admire. Individual spirit winners will receive a medal, a Five Ultimate jacket, a Discraft SuperColor™ Spirit of the Game disc, and a 2004-5 College Championships DVD. 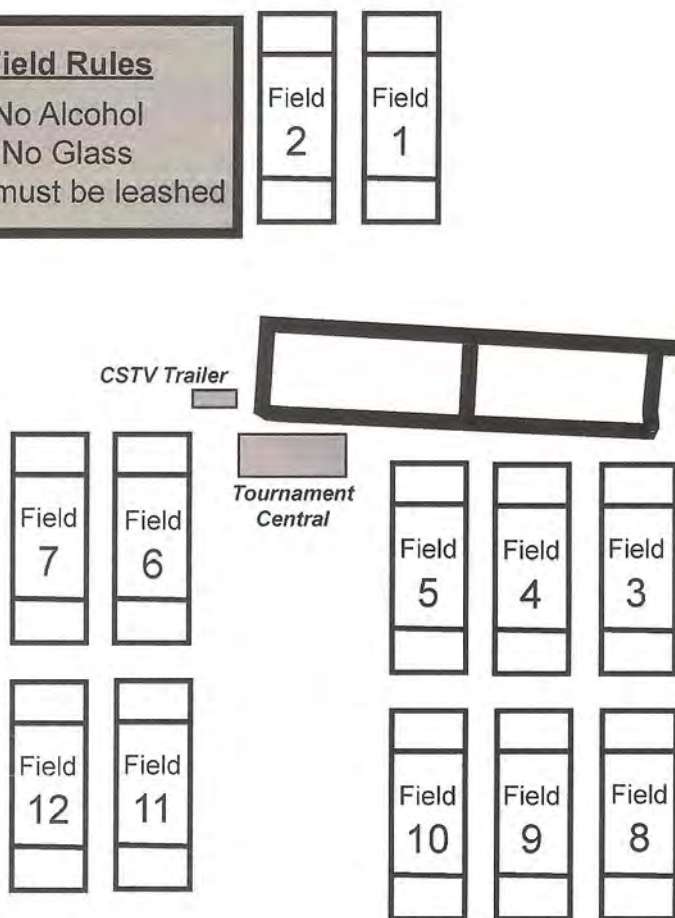

Heat, Nutrition and Hydration

- Heat-related illness occurs where body cooling by evaporation is limited. Sweating depletes the body's salt and moisture, which leads to dehydration. If a player recognizes any signs or symptoms of heat-related illness, he or she should treat the problem immediately.
- Signs and Symptoms of Heat Illness can include change in level of consciousness, abdominal cramps, nausea/vomiting, fatigue/tingling, chills, inability to spit, dry mucous membranes, decreased urine output and change in color.
- Prevention and Treatment of Heat Illness
 - Avoid alcohol, caffeine, and carbonated beverages.
 - Medications such as antihistamines, decongestants, certain asthma medications, and diuretics can increase risk for heat illness. Avoid them if possible.
 - Avoid certain nutritional supplements (such as caffeine and ephedrine) that can dehydrate the body and/or increase metabolism and heat production.
 - Know your body – Be honest! Are you fit enough to perform under current conditions?
 - Drink and eat – Eat and drink (water AND sports drinks) "optimally" before, during, and after play. Potassium is important (good sources include: sports drinks, yogurt, grapefruit juice, bananas, and oranges). Sodium is also important (good sources include: sports drinks, vegetable juices, pretzels, nuts, cheese and crackers). After play, carbohydrates are important: foods such as potatoes, honey, cereal, white bread, corn chips, sports drinks, jelly beans, rice cakes, bagels, crackers, gummy candies).
 - Don't drink too much – Over-hydrating can be dangerous if it leads to a fluid and electrolyte imbalance.
 - Monitor your urine – Clear/copious = hydrated. Dark = Need water/electrolytes.
 - Be sensitive to prior illness – If you've been sick, your body may be more susceptible to dehydration.
 - Rest and cool down after play – Find shade, wet the skin, get in front of a fan or breeze.

Sideline Safety

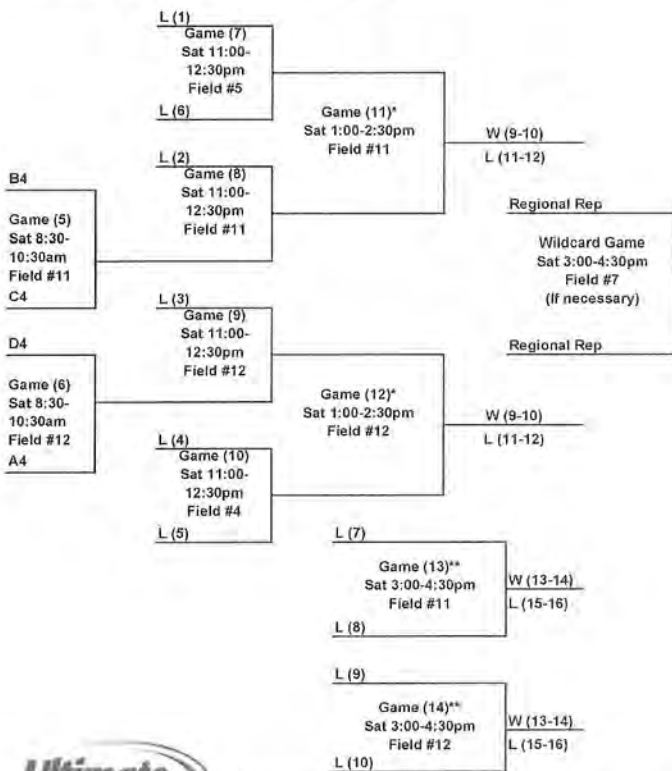
- Players and spectators should make every effort to keep objects, including but not limited to bags, strollers, chairs, coolers and tents, as far away from the playing field as possible.
- If a player feels that an object on the sideline is not safe, s/he should inform Event Staff and should refrain from playing until s/he is satisfied that safe conditions have been established.
- The UPA and Event Staff reserve the right to move or remove objects or spectators from on or near the playing field if those conditions are, in the opinion of the UPA or Event Staff, unsafe for players, staff, or spectators.

Lightning Guidelines

- Event staff will communicate with players and spectators via PA system and field marshals equipped with radios that there is a lightning danger, play will be stopped, and everyone should seek shelter.
- Safe Shelter for players and spectators at Spindler Road Fields includes any fully enclosed building or vehicle with a hard top and closed windows.
- Event staff will use the Flash-to Bang method to determine when to send people to shelter. By the time the Flash-to-Bang count has reached 30 seconds, all individuals should be in a safe shelter location.
- If you can't get to a safe shelter, try to avoid being the tallest object in an open field or on open water. Avoid other tall objects, metal objects, and water. Assume a crouch position with only the balls of your feet touching the ground, your arms wrapped around your knees, and your head lowered. Minimize contact with the ground. Do not lie flat.
- Avoid using telephone land lines. Cell phones are safe provided the person has followed other safety guidelines.
- Event staff will indicate to players when play is going to resume. Team captains should meet at Tournament Central to receive instructions for resuming play and any schedule modifications.

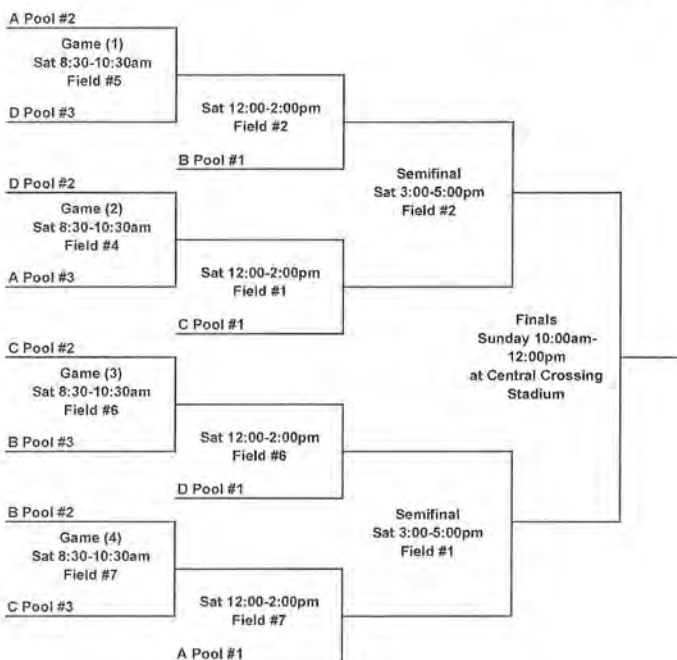

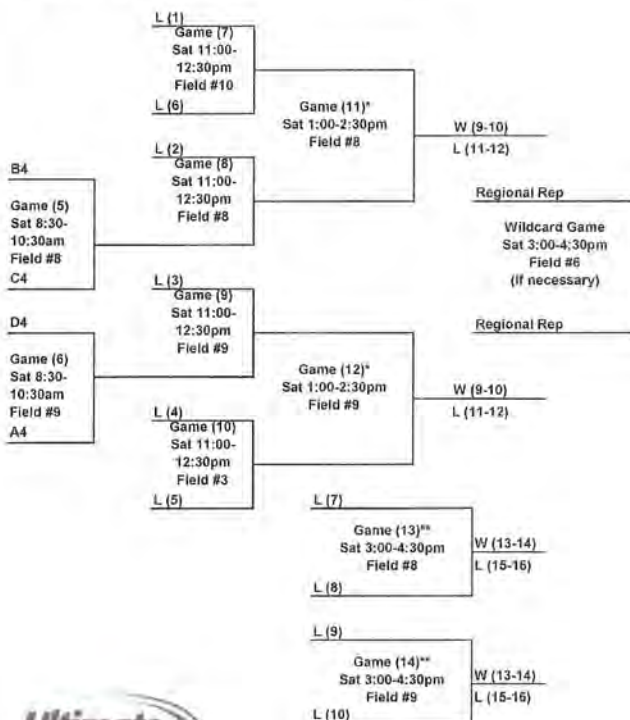

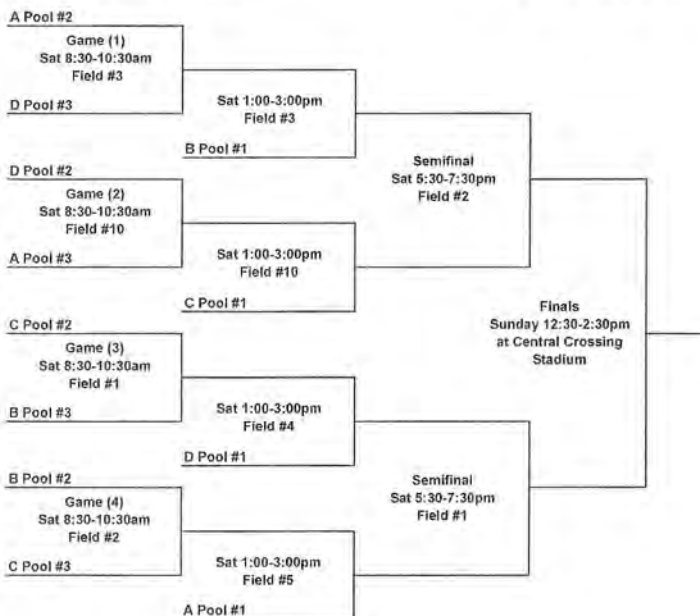

Delaware Sideshow has recently become one of the more competitive teams in the Metro East, winning its first Colonial Section title in 2003. After a disappointing 2005 season, Delaware expected to have a rebuilding year in 2006, due to losing a majority of its team to graduation, but a trio of new graduate students changed that expectation. Brandon Redding, Jackson Schreiber, and Raju Prasad, each with club level experience, have helped Delaware earn its second Metro East Championship in three years. They are supported by handlers Matt Gallin and Neville Clubwala, deeps Pat Walters and Dan Calamai, and mids Kevin McCormick, Nick Hirannet, and Dan Cuoco.

In his final season, Tim Gehret has finally lifted Florida to its first UPA College Championships in the modern era. After missing Regionals in his first season, Gehret took his team to the game-

to-go against Georgia in '02. With more pieces in place and having finished in the top-8 of Centex in '03 and '04, it appeared Gehret would be able to navigate the AC Region. Until this season, he, and Florida had fallen short.

Joined by '04 Atlantic Coast Freshman of the Year, Kurt Gibson, fellow captain Bill MacQueen, and a roster featuring 13 members of Club Championships qualifier Vicious Cycle, Florida entered '06 with high but tempered expectations. After defeating Sectional Rivals Georgia and Georgia Tech to win its home tournament, FWC, it seemed Florida might be able to erase the ghosts of seasons past. After dominating the highest levels of competition at Trouble in Vegas and the Stanford Invite, running their record to 25-0, Florida began an as yet unbroken run of 11 straight weeks at #1 in the UPA Rankings. Florida lost its first and only game at Centex to #2 Wisconsin, 15-14, despite having a chance to win eight yards from the goal line.

In the Series, Florida had to overcome nemesis Georgia, on their home turf in Athens. A contentious 11-10 win removed the monkey from their backs, and propelled them through Regionals. Again, Georgia Tech and Georgia stood in the way, and again, Florida emerged, 15-10 and 15-5, to secure a spot in Columbus as the AC Regional Champion and one of the favorites to win the title.

Since the late 1970s, the Michigan Ultimate Team has been a staple of club sports at the University of Michigan. After changing names from Wolverbees to Damaged Goods to Primal Urge to Tumult (among others) in the 1980's and 90's, magnUM was at last chosen in the late 1990s. The team has since established itself as a nationally respected team, becoming a perennial Regional Championship contender. Despite losing ten talented veterans from the 2005

Great Lakes Championship campaign, the 2006 magnUM team is making its seventh UPA College Championships appearance in eight years. With this year's College Championships bid, magnUM has proven itself as a reloading program rather than a rebuilding program. An ever-improving corps of returning players, strong rookie contributions, and a spring free of fire hydrant, bicycle, and couch-related injuries brings Michigan into the College Championships stronger than ever. 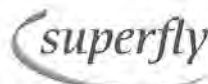

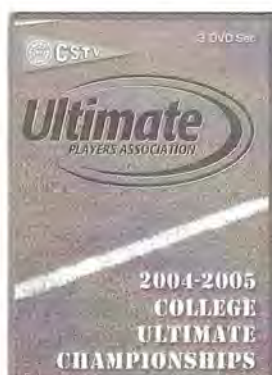
