SITE RULES

NO ALCOHOL! Facility, event staff, and security will be checking to make sure people are not drinking. There will also be lots of moms, dads, and kids watching the action. Please abide by these rules. NO BIKES ON FIELDS!

NO STAKES >6"! Please secure your pop-up tents, but in order to protect the irrigation system, do not use stakes longer than 6."

SPECTATORS AND EQUIPMENT MUST STAY AT LEAST 3 YARDS AWAY FROM SIDELINES! Where there are buffer lines, respect them. Where there are not buffer lines, stay back at least 3 yards.

TRASH AND RECYCLING! Place recyclables in the recycling receptacles and place trash in the trash. Thanks to VC Ultimate for helping make recycling possible at this event through the VC Green Program.

Hello teams, congratulations for making it to Boulder and welcome to the 2008 UPA College Ultimate Championships! We're excited to be able to host this event at the Pleasant View Soccer Complex, one of the most beautiful field facilities in the country. Boulder, CO is also home to the Ultimate Players Association whose staff is thrilled to hold the College Championships event in their backyard.

We've done our best to make sure that everything has been taken care of, so that you can focus on playing in the most important tournament of your season. The fields are in tip-top condition and ready for that layout D-block at game point. We'll have water stations a short walk from every field and food given to the captains each morning, so that you can keep your body running at max intensity all weekend long.

Half-time and Post-Game - Award Ceremonies. During half-time, awards will be presented to the "Recharge Team Spirit Award" teams and Spirit Award individuals (one from each team). Immediately following finals, awards will be presented to 1st and 2nd place teams in each division.

COMPETITION RULES

- UPA Official Rules of Ultimate, 11th Edition will be in effect. Observers will be used in all games, along with the Unified Misconduct Foul system.
- All games to 15, point-cap at 17.
- Half-time is 10 minutes.
- Each team has two timeouts per half.
- Regardless of how many timeouts a team has used before overtime, during overtime each team has one timeout.
- Overtime: A game is in overtime if tied at one point less than original game total (e.g. In a game to 15 goals, overtime occurs when the score reaches 14-14).
- Soft time-cap goes on at end of round time on schedule. Add two points to higher score after first score after soft time-cap. Game ends when first team reaches new game total, or when first team reaches 15 ahead by at least two points, whichever comes first.
- A hard time cap will be put into effect for all pool and consolation/placement games (9th-16th). The hard time cap will go on 15 minutes after the soft time cap. Game is over at the end of the point in progress, unless tied. If tied, play one more point.
- **Caps do not affect timeouts.**



CBS COLLEGE SPORTS TELEVISION



The Collegiate Nationals is a multi-sport, multi-venue event that brings together and showcases the definitive collegiate national championships of emerging club sports. The event was created by College Sports Television (CSTV), now CBS College Sports Television, and has been held since 2006. It has expanded to include sports such as snowboarding, wakeboarding, boxing, weightlifting, kayaking, beach volleyball, and adventure racing. The Collegiate Nationals will be taking place over four weekends this spring in Keystone, Reno, San Diego and Boulder and the competition will crown over 40 champions by its conclusion. CBS College Sports is proud to include what will be one of the best events for the 2008 lineup, the UPA College Ultimate Championships.

Mark your calendars now to watch the Open and Women's Finals televised on CBSC in their entirety. Ultimate will air at 8pm EST on the following dates:

May 31: Women's Ultimate Coverage (highlights of Collegiate Nationals in Boulder)

June 2: Open Ultimate Coverage (highlights of Collegiate Nationals in Boulder)

June 7: Women's Championship

June 8: Open Championship

Each program will air a minimum of 7 additional times so check your local listings for additional broadcast schedules. Programs will be aired "live to tape" with limited editing and available on or before July 1 at www.thecollegiatenationals.com. The UPA thanks Discraft for their sponsorship of the broadcasts.

The UPA asks your cooperation when approached by members of the camera crew for interviews. Please be respectful and do your best to talk about your passion for Ultimate and your participation. Teams qualified for the finals should be prepared to participate in interviews immediately following the conclusion of their semifinal game.

Camera people will be respectful of your space and will do their best to stay out of the way while they film. However, accidents can happen. If you or your team comes across any issues during competition, please contact a member of the tournament staff - not a camera person - who will follow up with the production crew.



ALUMNI ALL-STAR SHOWCASE

On Saturday evening, the UPA will host a showcase game between all-star teams consisting of former college players from throughout the country. The UPA is excited about continuing to showcase the sport and entertain players and fans at the College Championships through this game, first hosted at the tournament in 2007.

The two all-star teams will be Mixed and consist of 12 players each (6 men and 6 women). One team will represent the East and the other the West, each comprised of 4 college regions. Players for these teams were selected based upon where they played in the College Series while in college, and on factors such as level of playing ability, position, and sportsmanship. The Mixed format is 4/3 with the teams required to alternate the 4-person gender each point.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

Medical staff (trainer and EMT) will be available through the event at Tournament Central. Please seek advice and assistance regarding prevention and treatment of injuries or illness.

Directions to the local hospital can be found in the "Directions" section of this program.

CONCUSSIONS

- Concussions are brain injuries that can occur as a result of a blow to the head.
- Symptoms may include headache, nausea, vision problems, confusion, balance problems.
- If you think you or one of your teammates might have a concussion, tell your coach and have the person see a medical professional. Medical staff are on hand at the event at Tournament Central.

HEAT, NUTRITION AND HYDRATION*

*Please note that at over a mile above sea level, the Boulder, CO air is thin and dry and the sun can be more intense. Players who are not acclimated to the altitude should be especially aware of the following health issues.

- Heat-related illness occurs where body cooling by evaporation is limited. Sweating depletes the body's salt and moisture, which leads to dehydration. If a player recognizes any signs or symptoms of heat-related illness, he or she should treat the problem immediately.
- Signs and symptoms of heat illness can include change in level of consciousness, abdominal cramps, nausea/vomiting, fatigue/tingling, chills, inability to spit, dry mucous membranes, decreased output and change in color of urine.
- Prevention and treatment of heat illness:
 - Avoid alcohol, caffeine, and carbonated beverages.
 - Medications such as antihistamines, decongestants, certain asthma medications, and diuretics can increase risk for heat illness. Avoid them if possible.
 - Avoid certain nutritional supplements (such as caffeine and ephedrine) that can dehydrate the body and/or increase metabolism and heat production.
 - Know your body - Be honest! Are you fit enough to perform under current conditions?
 - Drink and eat - Eat and drink (water AND sports drinks) "optimally" before, during, and after play. Potassium is important (good sources include: sports drinks, yogurt, grapefruit juice, bananas, oranges). Sodium is also important (good sources include: sports drinks, vegetable juices, pretzels, nuts, cheese and crackers). After play, carbohydrates are important: foods such as potatoes, honey, cereal, white bread, corn chips, sports drinks, jelly beans, rice cakes, bagels/crackers, gummy candies).
 - Don't drink too much. Over-hydrating can be dangerous if it leads to a fluid and electrolyte imbalance.
 - Monitor your urine - Clear/copious = hydrated. Dark = Need water/electrolytes.
 - Be sensitive to prior illness - If you've been sick, your body may be more susceptible to dehydration.
 - Rest and cool down after play - Find shade, wet the skin, get in front of a fan or breeze.

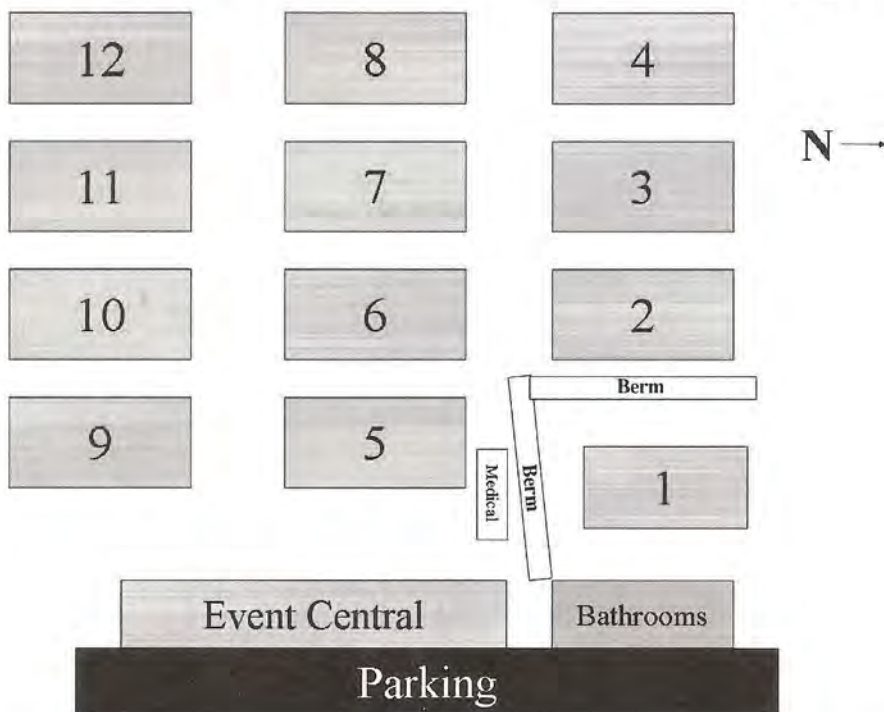
SIDELINE SAFETY

- Players and spectators should make every effort to keep objects, including but not limited to bags, strollers, chairs, coolers and tents, as far away from the playing field as possible.
- If a player feels that an object on the sideline is not safe, s/he should inform Event Staff and should refrain from playing until s/he is satisfied that safe conditions have been established.
- The UPA and Event Staff reserve the right to move or remove objects or spectators from on or near the playing field if those conditions are, in the opinion of the UPA or Event Staff, unsafe for players, staff, or spectators.

LIGHTNING GUIDELINES

- Event staff will communicate with players and spectators via PA system and field marshals equipped with radios that there is a lightning danger, play will be stopped, and everyone should seek shelter.
- Safe Shelter for players and spectators at the polo grounds include any enclosed building or fully enclosed vehicle with a hard top and closed windows.
- Event staff will use the Flash-to-Bang method to determine when to send people to shelter. By the time the Flash-to-Bang count has reached 30 seconds, all individuals should be in a safe shelter location.
- If you can't get to a safe shelter, try to avoid being the tallest object in an open field or on open water. Avoid other tall objects, metal objects, and water. Assume a crouch position with only the balls of your feet touching the ground, your arms wrapped around your knees, and your head lowered. Minimize contact with the ground. Do not lie flat.
- Avoid using telephone land lines. Cell phones are safe provided the person has followed other safety guidelines.
- Event staff will indicate to players when play is going to resume. Team captains should meet at Tournament Central to receive instructions for resuming play and any schedule modifications.

SPIRIT AWARDS

Ultimate has traditionally relied upon a spirit of sportsmanship which places the responsibility for fair play on the player. Highly competitive play is encouraged, but never at the expense of mutual respect among competitors, adherence to the agreed-upon rules of the game, or the basic joy of play. - UPA Official Rules of Ultimate, 11th Edition

RECHARGE TEAM SPIRIT AWARDS - Following every game, each team will be asked to rate its opponent on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being the rating for the highest level of sportsmanship. These ratings will be averaged and the team in each division with the highest rating will be awarded the **RECHARGE TEAM SPIRIT AWARD** after their division's finals. The winning teams will each receive a trophy and prizes courtesy of Recharge. Thanks to **RECHARGE** for their support of Ultimate and the Spirit of the Game™!

UPA SPIRIT RATINGS GUIDELINES

The ratings are ordered from 5 (indicating the highest level of spirit) thru 1 (the lowest level of spirit):

- 5:** Highest level of respect shown throughout game towards opponents, officials, and spectators. For the level of play, showed excellent knowledge of the rules and abided by them throughout the game. Any conflicts were resolved amicably and without incident. Opposing team's conduct added to our enjoyment of the game. The opposing team unfailingly played fairly and with an excellent attitude.
- 4:** Respect shown throughout the game towards opponents, officials, and spectators. For the level of play, showed above average knowledge of the rules and abided by them throughout the game. Any conflicts were resolved favorably and without incident. Opposing team's conduct did not detract from our enjoyment of the game. The opposing team played fairly and with a good attitude.
- 3:** Generally exhibited respect towards opponents, officials, and spectators. For the level of play, showed adequate knowledge of the rules and abided by them during the game. Any conflicts were resolved plainly and without incident. Opposing team's conduct generally did not detract from our enjoyment of the game. The opposing team generally played fairly and with a decent attitude.
- 2:** Exhibited a lack of respect towards opponents, officials, and/or spectators. For the level of play, showed a lack of knowledge of or disregard for the rules at points during the game. Any conflicts were resolved heatedly or led to contentious incidents. Opposing team's conduct detracted somewhat from our enjoyment of the game. The opposing team played unfairly and/or with a poor attitude.
- 1:** Exhibited a major lack of respect towards opponents, officials, and/or spectators. For the level of play, exhibited no knowledge of the rules or blatantly disregarded them during the game. Conflicts were resolved acrimoniously or led directly to contentious incidents. Opposing team's conduct made the game basically unenjoyable. The opposing team played unfairly and their attitude was abysmal.

INDIVIDUAL AWARDS

Teams will each be asked to nominate a player from their own team who they feel displays the highest level of spirit. The definition of spirit is up to each team, but should include elements of sportsmanship, leadership, perseverance, fire, etc. Choose the person whose attitude you wish other people on your team would emulate and who other players off your team admire. Individual spirit winners will receive a medal and prize disc (courtesy of Discraft). Thanks to **DISCRAFT** for their support of Ultimate and Spirit of the Game!

The Valkyries were formed in 2003 and are thus playing in our sixth UPA Series. Before 2005, we had only "backed" our way into Regionals. We then added Jason Adams (Delaware alum, former player/captain of Twisted Metal) and that spring we went 1-2 at Regionals before being eliminated. In 2006 we returned almost our full roster and entered Regionals as the 6 seed and made our first trip to Sunday of Regionals, finishing in the tied for 5th spot. We lost one of our captains after that season, but had a solid recruiting year, and in spring of 2007 knocked off Tufts and Delaware during the season to set ourselves up as the number 1 seed in our Section, and ultimately the number 2 seed at Regionals. We lost to Dartmouth in the semis, and had two key players suffer concussions in the backdoor semi-final, ending hopes of Nationals, and finished 4th in the region. This spring we added Kayla Burnim (Delaware alum/captain) to our coaching staff and set a clear team goal of making Nationals. After some success at Presidents Day and then faltering some at Yale Cup and Roll Call, the team re-dedicated ourselves to getting in better shape and making a serious run at Nationals. A 15-8 Sectional victory over heavily favored Tufts showed what our work could do and entering Regionals as the 2 seed behind Dartmouth, we finished with a 4-0 to earn our first trip to Nationals.
