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#### ULTIMATE: THE SPORT

Ultimate is a fast-moving sport, where the wind becomes another player, and people are constantly churning and diving after a piece of plastic.

Ultimate started in 1967 at Columbia High School in Maplewood, New Jersey. A group of students used a parking lot as a field and invented a new sport, what was later to become known as Ultimate Frisbee.

The name was shortened to Ultimate because of a trademark infringement with Whamo and the sport grew to be nationwide, and ultimately worldwide. It is played on a 70 X 40 yard field, with 25 yard end zones. Games are played to points, and goals are scored by completing a pass to a teammate in the end Zone.

A point is started with a downfield throw-off, or pull as it is called by players, from one team to another. The player who catches the disc must stop, establish a pivot foot, and throw a pass before the defender reaches a count of ten. If the defender reaches ten before the pass is thrown, or is the pass is intercepted, incomplete, ot out of bounds, the result is a turnover and the posession of the disc is reversed. This process is repeated with every completed pass. The result is a dynamic, free-flowing game, with olts of exciting dives and catches.

#### ULTIMATE AND THEN SOME

A good way to improve your ultimate game is to get involved in other disc sports. Discathon is a perfect sport for ultimate players. This event is a race of 1500 meters, running while throwing one of two or three discs through manditory obstacles and around dog legs. You must finish the course with two discs. Only the disc thrown has to take the course-you may run short cuts to get to where your throw landed and then make your next throw. You must be a good runner plus a good thrower to do well.

Disc golf improves your ultimate game because of the variety of throws used. Golf is good distance, accuracy, and mind control practice.

Maximum time aloft is a game to see how long you can keep a disc in the air and then catch it with one hand. The world record is around 16 seconds from the time the disc left your hand until the disc was caught. Ultimately, this game is good for making throws using wind, reading the wind, and reading how the disc floats in the air.

Distance competition helps with pulls and the

high percentage bomb.


Freestyle helps with quickness and body control. It makes for a good warm-up and spectacular hot dog catches for when you want to rub in a score.


The accuracy event speaks for itself. Guts is good for improving reaction time, diving, and team work.


So come on, expand your overall disc skills. Compete in event tournaments. You can get to know your competitors easily and you never have to make a questionable call! You may be surprised at how well you do in event competition. There are trophies and bucks out there to be claimed at Flying Disc Tournaments.

Wisconsin holds a State Tournament every August. The 1988 State was held at Brown Deer Park in Milwaukee. It was the 13th annual tournament. The events were Disc Golf, Distance, Maximum Time Aloft, Discathon, and Freestyle. Competing in all 5 (all around) is as tough as an

Ultimate weekend. Almost.







#### MADISON'S ULTIMATE HISTORY

It is fitting that Madison will host the 10th Midwest Regionals as it was the site of the very first Midwest Regional held in 1979. Madison's ultimate history had begun two years earlier when in 1977 Andy Klein's Penn State team won the eastern regional and went on to face Santa Barbara in the national title game. Although they didn't win that game it did motivate Andy Klein to start a team that fall at the University of Wisconsin where he was beginning graduate school.

Andy, along with two students he met throwing at James Madison Park, Kent Archie and Gary Stricker, decided to advertise around campus to form a U.W. ultimate team. They came up with a couple of good athletes out of the midwest willing to learn the game, but a vast majority of the original team were east coasters-including six from New York City. They all had played ultimate previously either in high school or at an eastern college. Among these was Mike Wohl who was being featured in the original Pepsi ultimate commercial shot in Central Park near Mike's house in NYC. Thus Madison ultimate had it's first star. The team worked out a few times late in the fall of 1977. Although they didn't go to their first tournament until the spring of 1978 which was sectionals held in East Lansing, Michigan. Most of the teams there had been playing a year or two already. But Madison showed they were a team to be reckoned with from day one by going undefeated and winning sectionals. This included a big win over heavily favored Michigan State in the finals. But M.S.U. rebounded and went on to win it's second regional amid a streak of five in a row. So they, along with runnerup Yellow Springs, Ohio, went on out to Easterns as was the procedure back then. But this prompted Andy Klein to convince Tom Kennedy, for whom he had written the U.P.A. bylaws, to divide the country into five separate regions instead of two. The next spring this was adopted and the top 8 teams from sectional play advanced to Madison for the very first Midwest Regional in 1979. Again M.S.U. were the champs with Yellow Springs as runnerup and Madison beating Michigan University for third.

But with Nationals in the spring, Andy Klein began to notice that the upper midwest was at a big disadvantage getting ready with snow lasting until April. So he talked Tom Kennedy into changing the regionals from the spring to fall and also into allowing the top 16 teams advancing to regionals instead of 8.

So you can see Madison ultimate and Andy Klein had alot to do with shaping the history and development of the sport, especially here in the midwest. Although Madison's chance to eventually make Nationals in those early years was dealt a severe blow when it's best player ever-John Ballsrud was paralyzed in a car accident. The team did go on to establish a great winning tradition with 9 Sectional Championships and 5 final four finishes at regional play. They've compiled an overall record of 347 wins and 189 losses in the last eleven years. This included a remarkable early dominance against Windy City going 8-0 from 1978-1982 which included 4 tough one point decisions.

In the spring of 1982 Madison was hit hard by graduation and lost 10 of it's top 12 players. So the team had to be rebuilt and the names like Andy Klein, Tim McGregor, Joe Brady, Stephen Shurson, and John Schmail were gone. But soon new names came forth to restore that winning tradition such as Brad Wendt, Joe Stocklein, Jeff Yu, and the Sackett brothers Sammy and Jumpin Joe. So now it's up to all of you to help keep that strong ultimate tradition going here in Madison by having some good games and good times at the 1988 Midwest Regionals!!!
