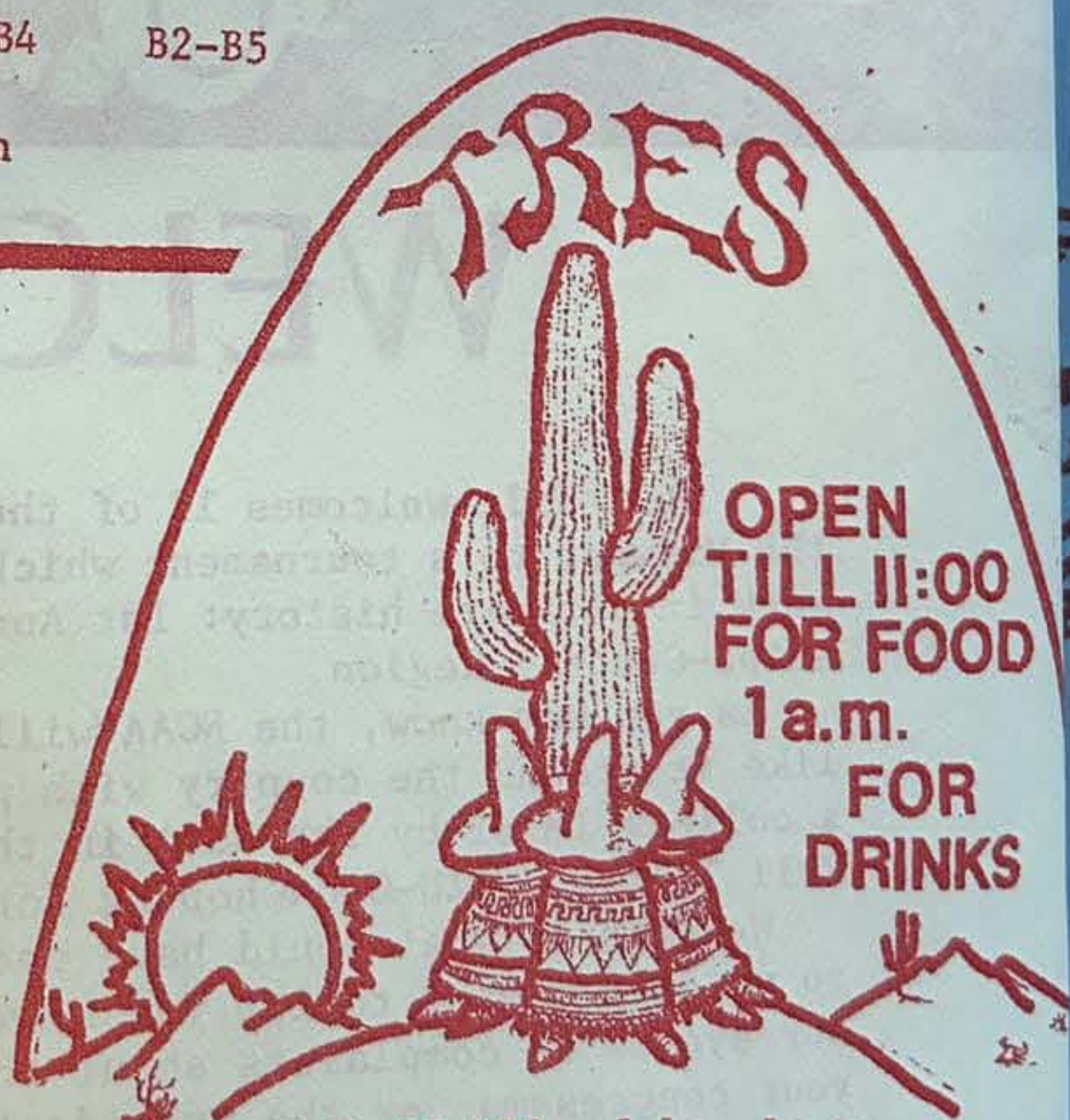

WHO'S WHO IN COLLEGIATE ULTIMATE CENTRAL REGION

CHICAGO, UNIVERSITY OF (CHICAGO, IL.)

U of C has the advantage of being located in the same city as the 1983 National Champions. You just might see a few Windy City Players donning U of C colors this weekend. If so, this team could be a serious threat to any of the top seeded teams.

EARLHAM COLLEGE (RICHMOND, IN.)

A strong wind would definitely be a major asset to Earlham. They have a very disciplined zone that causes trouble for even the best of dischanders. Don't let up against these guys; they play you tough every goal of the game.

ILLINOIS STATE UNIVERSITY (NORMAL, IL.)

ISU is once again in the rebuilding stage. Winning is fun, but these guys play this game because they enjoy it. They do have some big playmakers, but lack depth. They may not win it all, but could be the reason why somebody else doesn't.

KANSAS, UNIVERSITY OF (LAWRENCE)

PURDUE UNIVERSITY (WEST LAFAYETTE, IN)

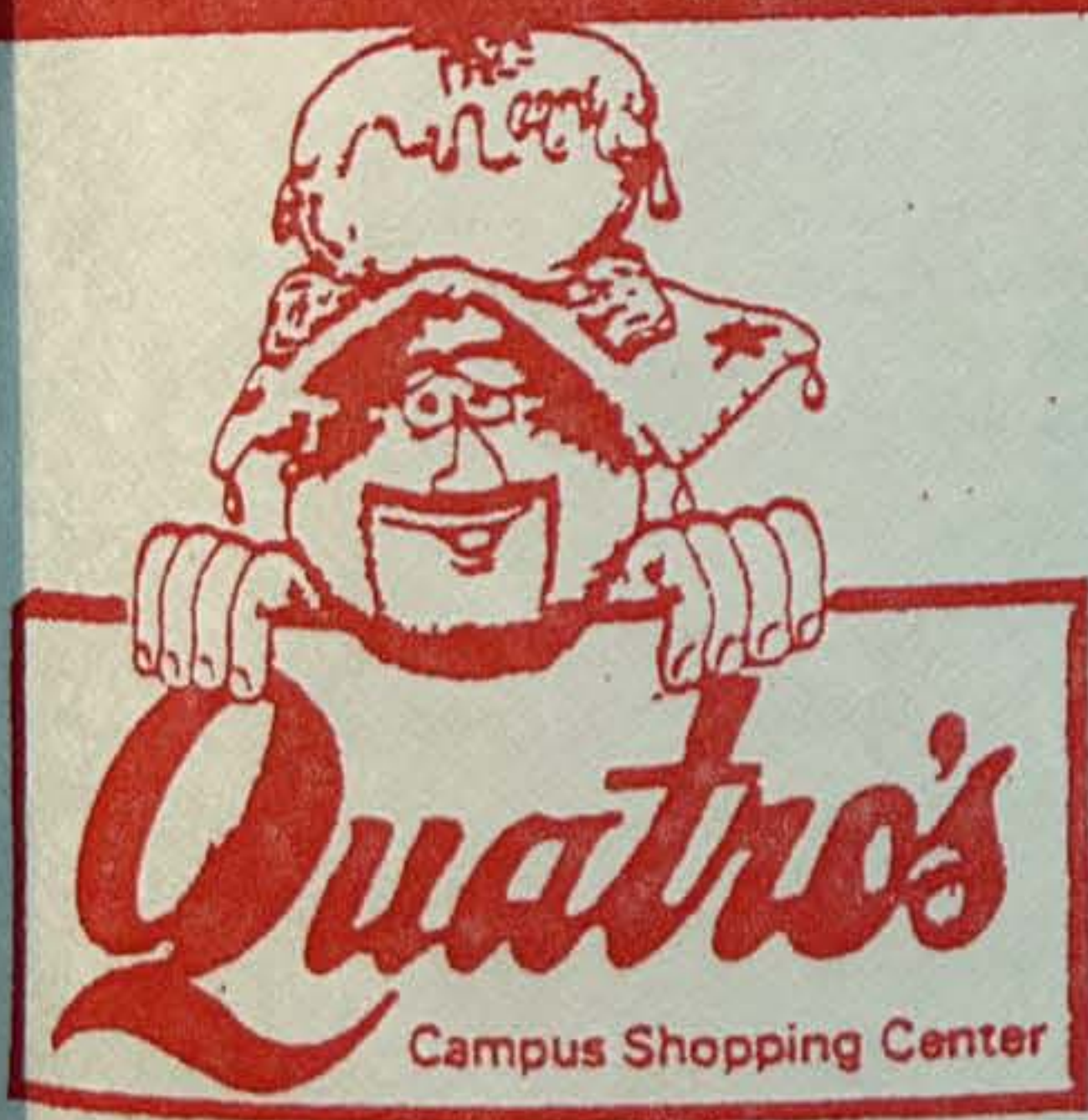

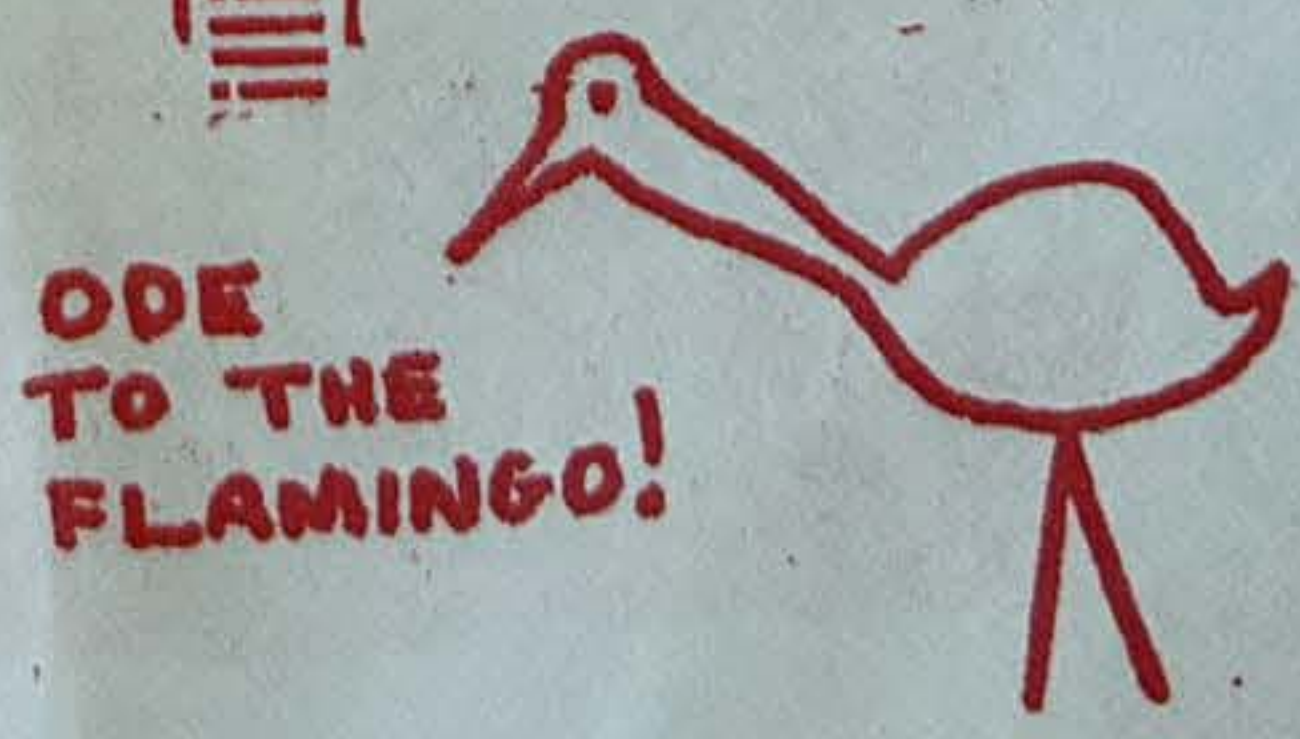

So next time you're walking in the rain, take a look at yourself, literally, as well as figuratively. Save a worm. Save a life!

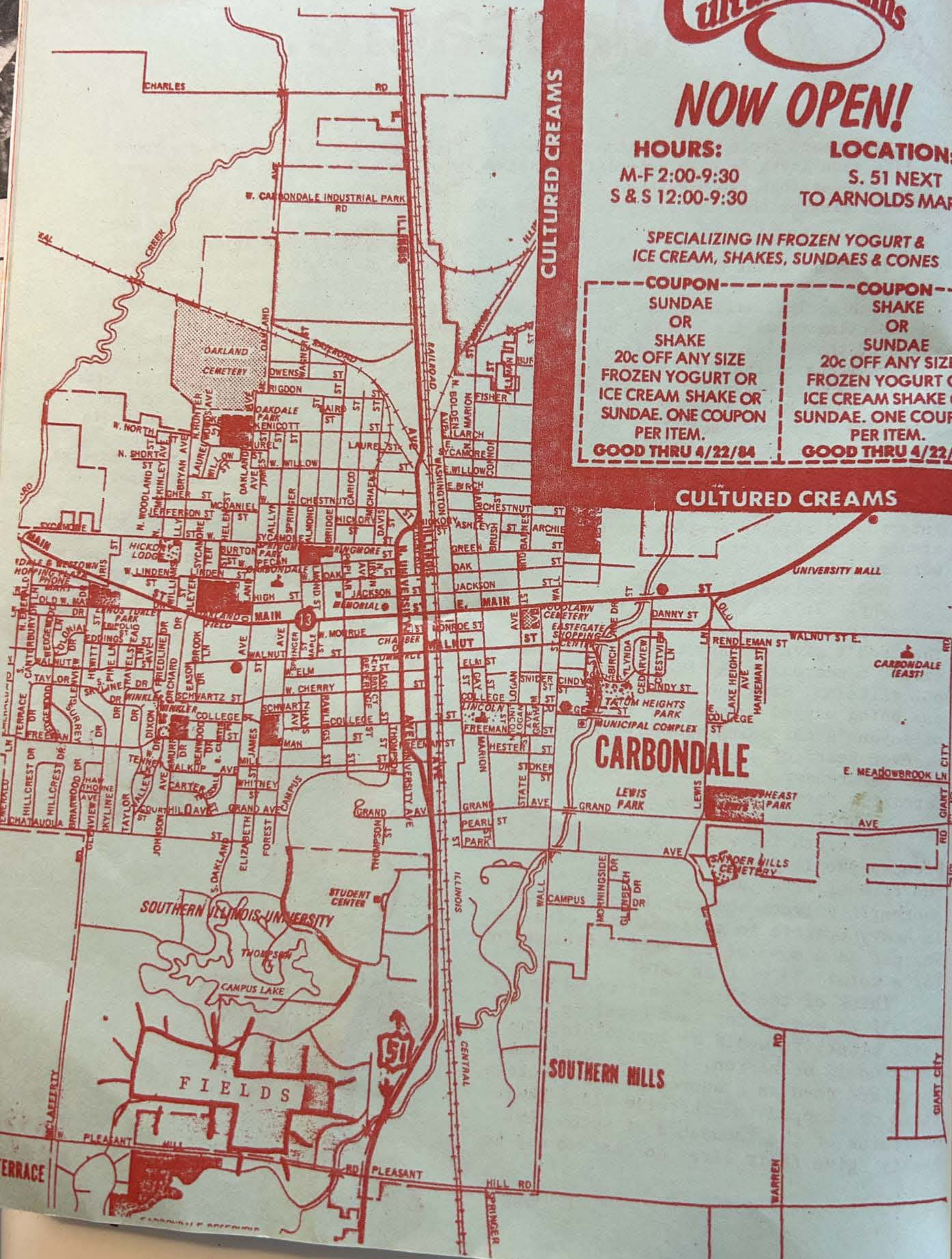

BARS ON SATURDAY NIGHT:

HANGAR 9

A very popular jazz-fusion and rock band, Streetcorner Symphony, will be playing here on Saturday night. There is a \$2.00 cover, with 95¢ speedrails and \$1.50 imports. Room for dancing if you have enough strength left over.

T.J.'s

This is a low grade bar that has a high appeal to high school seniors and freshmen in college. This may be why it smells like throw-up a lot of the time. The band "1001" will be there and there is a \$1.00 cover.

The CLUB

Owner is always a supporter of the frisbee club. There will be no cover here to see "Suburban Housewife" perform. St. Pauli's on special all night for \$1.25. Located right next to Booby's.

GATSBY'S

WTAO night with trivia and prizes. There's no cover, but no place to dance and no specials either. They do have some nice pool tables if you're into it. (In case you go to try to win some trivia prizes, they ask the same questions over about a six week period and the regulars tend to dominate.)

GREAT ESCAPE

Across the street from Gatsby's, "Crosstown Rivals" will be playing new wave music for either 50¢ or a \$1.00 cover. Dancefloor is pretty small. Lots of video games. 85¢ speedrails.

TREATS

If you go to Dairy Queen, you've made a mistake. Carbondale is lucky enough to have this unique ice cream and frozen yogurt stand. They use all natural ingredients and make everything from scratch while you wait. They have a large assortment of sundaes and shakes with some cosmic flavors that'll knock your socks off. 5 minutes from fields, 1/4 mile south on 51. A MUST!

QUATRO'S

Without a doubt the leader in deep pan pizza in Carbondale. They also have other Italian and pasta dishes. Owner is also a good supporter of the frisbee club. If it's gonna be pasta, make it Quatros. (There's a \$1.00 coupon in the program.)

TRES HOMBRES

Great Mexican food at very reasonable prices. If you go here with about \$5 bucks, you'll have to be wheeled out. It gets pretty busy on Saturdays so if you don't want to wait close to an hour, call for a reservation early in the day. (You may have to break up into partys less than five to get seated quicker.) Worth the wait in either case.

BOOBYS

Hot subs and sandwiches are their speciality. Nice, easy atmosphere and \$1.90 pitchers of Busch may make this a hot spot for discheads on Saturday night. Delicious, fresh meats and reasonable prices.

OTHERS

Some restaurants, such as Emperor's Palace, Stan Hoyes, and Prime Time may be a little steep for a frisbee players budget. All the fast food franchises are the same as anywhere else. There is a Dennys 1 mile west of town on 13 and a Golden Bear one mile east of town on 13 for breakfast on Sunday. Mary Lou's will be closed.
