Immediately following the finals, awards will be given to 1st & 2nd place teams, Spirit Award teams, and Spirit Award individuals.

### Competition Guidelines

- All open division games and Sunday girl's division games to 15; hard cap at 17. Girl's pool
   play games on Saturday to 11; hard cap at 13.
- · Halftime is five minutes.
- · Each team has two timeouts per half.
- Overtime: A game is in overtime if tied at one point less than the original game total, and the winning score will exceed the said game total.
   (e.g., in a game to 15, overtime occurs when the score reaches 14-14, and the minimum winning

score is determined to be 16.)

- Regardless of how many timeouts a team has used before overtime, during overtime each team has one timeout.
- Time cap goes on at end of round time on schedule. Add two points to higher score after first score after the time cap. Play to that total. No more win by two.
- The time cap does not affect timeouts.

## Spirit Awards

"Ultimate has traditionally relied upon a spirit of sportsmanship which places the responsibility for fair play on the player himself. Highly competitive play is encouraged, but never at the expense of the bond of mutual respect between players, adherence to the agreed-upon rules of the game, or the basic joy of play."

TEAM AWARDS: Following every game, each team will be asked to rate its opponent on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being the rating for the highest level of sportsmanship. These ratings will be averaged, and the team in each division with the highest rating will be awarded the Team Spirit Award after their division's final.

INDIVIDUAL AWARDS: Teams will each be asked to nominate a player from their own team who they feel displays the highest level of spirit. The definition of spirit is up to each team, but should include elements of sportsmanship, leadership, perseverance, fire, etc. Choose the person whose attitude you wish other people on your team would emulate and who other players off your team admire. Individual spirit winners will receive a medal (courtesy of PLAYULTY.com) and a light-up disc (courtesy of FLASHFLIGHT). Crystal Lake Sports Complex 1557 SE Crystal Lake Dr

#### From hotels:

Go west to 4th St. Take a left on 4th (south, towards downtown Corvallis). Continue to follow NW 4th St under the highway overpass (4th becomes OR Hwy 99W South after you have gone under the highway overpass.) At the first stoplight, turn left onto Alexander Avenue. After approximately 0.5 miles, Alexander turns sharply right and becomes Crystal Lake Drive. The entrance to the parking lot for the Crystal Lake Sports Complex is approximately 0.75 miles further on the left side of the road. The fields are less than 2 miles from the hofels.


## TO THE PORTLAND AIRPORT:




## Field Map









Team History: The Beacon Blue Demons started the 2003-04 school year with one goal-win a National Championship. Beacon had an excellent fall season, going 13-1, including wins over several traditional national powerhouses. The Blue Demons practice every morning at 6:30 a.m. in the dirt outfield of a baseball field off of the West Side Highway. The team hopes their dedication and sacrifice pay off with a strong showing in Corvallis.

The team look huge strides forward this fall toward that goal with a first place finish at the Huck Or You're Nothing Princeton Invitational, beating last year's National semifinalist CHUF in the finals. Beacon scored a semifinal win over Watchung Hills and a quarterfinal win over Princeton on Sunday after winning its pool on Saturday. Saturday's pool play games included a decisive win over Scarsdale, Beacon finished their fall season well by winning the Scarsdale Invitational, going 4-0, including wins over Columbia X, Stuyvesant and Watchung Hills. No team scored over 7 points on Beacon all day.

This is Beacon's eighth year in existence, and this is the best team Beacon has ever had. Beacon is undefeated in New York City League play, and has beaten college and high school teams alike. Team History: Northfield Mt Hermon has a long history of Ultimate beginning back in 1968 when Jared Kass introduced the game for the first time while teaching in the NMH Summer School. It was at this time that he decided to call the game Ultimate Frisbee and to introduce the concept of "Spirit of the Game." The team, as it exists now. is in its sixth year and 3th as a varsity team. 
