However, anyone wishing to sell or market their recordings in any manner to any individual or organization other then the UPA (including but not limited to any sales, promotional, advertising or merchandising uses) will be required to complete a 2007 Recording Partnership Agreement prior to being allowed to record UPA events.

Note: Family and friends may record events for personal use, but may not reproduce these recordings for commercial purposes without prior written consent from the UPA.

Competition Rules

- 11th Edition Rules of Ultimate will be in effect.
- Girls Pool A (Games to 13, point-cap at 15). Girls Pool B (Games to 11, point-cap at 13. All other games to 15, point-cap at 17.
- Half-time is 5 minutes.
- Each team has two timeouts per half.
- Regardless of how many timeouts a team has used before overtime, during overtime each team has one timeout.
- Overtime: A game is in overtime if tied at one point less than original game total (e.g. In a
 game to 15 goals, overtime occurs when the score reaches 14-14).
- Soft time-cap goes on at end of round time on schedule. Add two points to higher score after first score after soft time-cap. Play to that total. No more win by two.
 - Hard time-cap goes on 15 minutes after the soft time-cap. Game is over at the end of the point in progress, unless tied. If tied, play one more point.
 - Caps do not affect timeouts.

Spirit Awards

Ultimate has traditionally relied upon a spirit of sportsmanship which places the responsibility for fair play on the player himself. Highly competitive play is encouraged, but never at the expense of the bond of mutual respect between players, adherence to the agreed-upon rules of the game, or the basic joy of play.

- UPA 11th Edition Rules of Ultimate

Team Awards - Following every game, each team will be asked to rate its opponent on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being the rating for the highest level of sportsmanship. These ratings will be averaged and the team in each division with the highest rating will be awarded the Team Spirit Award after their division's finals.

Individual Awards – Teams will each be asked to nominate a player from their own team who they feel displays the highest level of spirit. The definition of spirit is up to each team, but should include elements of sportsmanship, leadership, perseverance, fire, etc. Choose the person whose attitude you wish other people on your team would emulate and who other players off your team admire. Individual spirit winners will receive a medal and prize disc (courtesy of DISCRAFT). Thanks to Discraft for their support of Ultimate and Spirit of the Game!



Medical staff (trainer and EMT) will be available through the event at Tournament Central. Please seek advice and assistance regarding prevention and treatment of injuries or illness.

Directions to the local hospital can be found in the "Directions" section of this program.

Concussions

- Concussions are brain injuries that can occur as a result of a blow to the head.
- Symptoms may include headache, nausea, vision problems, confusion, balance problems.
- If you think you or one of your teammates might have a concussion, tell your coach and have the person see a medical professional. Medical staff are on hand at the event at Tournament Central.

Heat, Nutrition and Hydration.

- Heat-related illness occurs where body cooling by evaporation is limited. Sweating depletes the body's salt and moisture, which leads to dehydration. If a player recognizes any signs or symptoms of heat-related illness, he or she should treat the problem immediately.
- Signs and Symptoms of Heat Illness can include change in level of consciousness, abdominal cramps, nausea/vomiting, fatigue/tingling, chills, inability to spit, dry mucous membranes, decreased urine output and change in color.
- Prevention and Treatment of Heat Illness
 - o Avoid alcohol, caffeine, and carbonated beverages.
 - Medications such as antihistamines, decongestants, certain asthma medications, and diuretics can increase risk for heat illness. Avoid them if possible.
 - Avoid certain nutritional supplements (such as caffeine and ephedrine) that can dehydrate the body and/or increase metabolism and heat production.
 - Know your body Be honest! Are you fit enough to perform under current conditions?
 - o Drink and eat Eat and drink (water AND sports drinks) "optimally" before, during, and after play. Potassium is important (good sources include: sports drinks, yogurt, grapefruit juice, bananas, oranges). Sodium is also important (good sources include: sports drinks, vegetable juices, pretzels, nuts, cheese and crackers). After play, carbohydrates are important: foods such as potatoes, honey, cereal, white bread, com chips, sports drinks, jelly beans, rice cakes, bagels crackers, gummy candies).
 - Don't drink too much Over-hydrating can be dangerous if it leads to a fluid and electrolyte imbalance.
 - Monitor your urine Clear/copious = hydrated. Dark = Need water/electrolytes.
 - Be sensitive to prior illness If you've been sick, your body may be more susceptible to dehydration.
 - Rest and cool down after play Find shade, wet the skin, get in front of a fan or breeze.



Sideline Safety

- Players and spectators should make every elfort to keep objects, including but not limited to bags, strollers, chairs, coolers and tents, as far away from the playing field as possible.
- If a player feels that an object on the sideline is not safe, s/he should inform Event Staff and should refrain from playing until s/he is satisfied that safe conditions have been established.
- The UPA and Event Staff reserve the right to move or remove objects or spectators from on or near the playing field if those conditions are, in the opinion of the UPA or Event Staff, unsafe for players, staff, or spectators.

Lightning Guidelines

- Event staff will communicate with players and spectators via PA system and field marshals equipped with radios that there is a lightning danger, play will be stopped, and everyone should seek shelter.
- Safe Shelter for players and spectators at the Skagit River Park includes any fully enclosed building or vehicle with a hard top and closed windows.
- Event staff will use the Flash-to Bang method to determine when to send people to shelter. By the time the Flash-to-Bang count has reached 30 seconds, all individuals should be in a safe shelter location.
- If you can't get to a safe shelter, try to avoid being the tallest object in an open field or
 on open water. Avoid other tall objects, metal objects, and water. Assume a crouch
 position with only the balls of your feet touching the ground, your arms wrapped
 around your knees, and your head lowered. Minimize contact with the ground. Do not
 lie flat.
- Avoid using telephone land lines. Cell phones are safe provided the person has followed other safety guidelines.
- Event staff will indicate to players when play is going to resume. Team captains should
 meet at Toumament Central to receive instructions for resuming play and any schedule
 modifications.










Alameda Community Learning Center Dark Mean Alameda, Calif. Coach: Michael DeSousa


The Alameda Community Learning Center Ultimate program is currently in its fifth Year and already has two (2005 and 2006) California State Championships under its belt. The program (aka Dark Meat) is based in a small charter school in the San Francisco Bay Area but nonetheless consists of a Middle School, Girl's, Open JV and Varsity teams. Beginning in 2006, Alameda began hosting and planning the California High School State Championships. Dark Meat has attended the past two UPA High School Western Championships, as well as the last Nationals in 2004. In 2006, Dark Meat finished in a tie for third place overall at Westerns. The team name was created as a result of a light-shirt vs. darkshirt practice (light meat and dark meat), where dark meat ended up dominating, effectively solidifying the name permanently.

In the past year, Dark Meat has participated in the Cold Fusion tournament in Eugene Oregon, hosted their own tournament (Alameda Meatfest), as well as attended College Tournaments such as the Sean Ryan Memorial (UC Santa Cruz) and the Santa Barbara Qualifier. Dark Meat has also hosted scrimmages at the Encinal Football field against various teams from around the Bay Area.



Last year Berkeley went to only one tournament, the California State Championships, and went 1-3. They've come a long way this year, already attending four tournaments.

The name came to them after their first game of the season, a win over Redwood High. When coming up with a cheer they decided to do a haiku instead. Then they decided, "Hey, let's be the Berkeley High Coup." The double entendre of being poetic as well as revolutionary was appealing, so they went with it from then on.

So far this season, Creek has gone undefeated in regular season play, with a big 9-8 win over East High School, one of the oldest and most developed programs in the state. In April, Creek took 3rd at the 3rd Annual East Invite, going undefeated in pool play, and then losing 13-7 to eventual champion Rockhurst High School in the semifinals. Several players on the team were members of the 2006 YCC 2nd place Denver team, and they hope to put a few more on the team this summer.

Last year, Creek took 2nd at the Colorado State Tournament. The team name, Maul, comes from the nearby Cherry Creek Mall. Cherry Creek Maul. Get it? Yeah we know we're funny.

Churchill High School Ultimate began back in 1999, but did not compete in their first legitimate tournament until 2001. The last three years have proven Churchill as one of the top teams in the northwest region. The team also continues to invest themselves in the development of younger players through their ongoing coaching of Kennedy Middle School up the road.

After finishing 2nd (2005) and then 9th (2006) at the UPA High School Western Championships, Churchill has earned the respect of being one of the top teams in nation. This year, the Churchill Open team competed exclusively in college tournaments before taking their state tournament a few weeks ago. Thus far the team has gone 14-8, with only one high school loss to their friends Haus.

I, Tribe, have continued to challenge my opponents and watch my players grow during this fifth year of my existence. At the first tournament of the year, Cold Fusion, I tested my mettle against some of the best players in Oregon. I bravely conquered South Eugene, though he was split into X and Y teams. 1 struggled against MoHo, but got a second chance after vanquishing Churchill B. I took third, losing an epic battle to MoHo in the semifinals. The match was intense, tears were shed, but all in all, I held my head up high. I long to prove to everyone that I am not a seasonal team, but a constant, driven force to be reckoned with. I long to manifest my skill, determination, and grit as I continue to challenge teams throughout the Northwest.



Ultimate Blue is in its third full year as an official club at Junction City High School. High School competition is few and far between in Kansas, but we've improved quickly by going up against college teams and we're doing what we can to make youth Ultimate happen in Kansas - the J-town Juggernaut on April 28th was the first vouth-only Ultimate tournament in Kansas. Our name came from combining Ultimate with our high school mascot, the Blue Jay.





Lakeside HS **Big Cats** Seattle, Wash. Coach: Jeremy Cram

The Lakeside team has had a difficult time garnering the respect of the school community, but last year their status was upgraded to clublevel. It is the largest competitive club at the school. Lakeside tends to bring a strong team to the field, finishing 5th at the inaugural UPA High School Western Championships and 3rd at last year's Westerns. Last year, Lakeside played well in the Washington State tournament, losing in the finals to the Northwest School.

The school mascot at Lakeside is the Lion, and from the birth of the Ultimate team, the name has been the Big Cats. However, due to the lack of respect from the administration and school community, past team leaders stuck the letters of LIONS in a name blender, and out came the delicious smoothie LOINS, the Ultimate team's loving nickname and the reason for the current logo-a dancing lion wearing nothing but a loin cloth.

The Lakewood Tigers team was founded six years ago and has enjoyed tremendous success in Colorado. Coach Berget has been with the team since its inception and has headed the growth of Ultimate in Colorado for the last several years. This is the first out of state tournament the Tigers have attended, and they hope it will be a great experience.

Nathan Hale High School is a public school in Seattle, WA, and is one of the few public schools in the country with a varsity Ultimate team. The team began in the late 1990's as a club sport. In the 2005 and 2006 UPA High School Western Championships, the Raider Open team finished third (tic) and tenth, respectively.

In their first year of single gender play, 2004, a group of 13 freshmen played on the boy's JV team. In the subsequent years, this group became the core of the team, contributing more each season to the varsity squad. Now, as this group has become seniors, they have picked up a few more upperclassmen (15 seniors total) as well as some standout rookies, and have developed a considerable on-field rapport and a dedication to each-other that they will rely on to carry them far at Westerns.

The Rockhurst Ultimate program has been in existence for about six years. This year is different than in the past in that it is run more by the students rather than the school. Therefore, we thought a new name would be appropriate. Our coach recalled a scene out of the movie Predator in which the predator crushes a scorpion and looks at it in his hand. We thought the crushed scorpion would be a great logo. So we simply decided that we should somehow incorporate the scorpion into our name. Background:

The role of the coach at all levels of Ultimate is unique in a sport that places on-field player authority above non-player influence. As non-players the coach's authority must not extend to the on-field officiating process. Coaches may be faced with situations where they are able to correct the self-officiating process and ensure the correct outcome to a given play. In this situation, coaches must not interfere in the officiating process, in order to ensure that players learn and take responsibility for officiating. Coach interference in the decision making process, even in the most egregious violations, will indicate to players that the coach and not the players have the ultimate responsibility for ensuring the inherent fairness of the game. Teaching players the rules and how to implement them should be done at practices or off of the field. It is the coach's responsibility to ensure that the players understand their own responsibilities as players and teach players how to handle those responsibilities.

Guidelines:

- Coaches should introduce themselves to the other coaches prior to a game and discuss concerns. This could potentially include the level of play, the level of intensity (e.g. spiking and rushing the field), and possible modifications to the captain's clause (e.g. prohibiting zone for new teams or footblocking).
- Because the potential for misperception is high, spiking is prohibited at the youth level unless otherwise agreed upon by the coaches or captains. Spiking in a disrespectful manner is never ok at any level.
- Coaches will not make calls from the sideline nor offer their opinion on a play.
 Coaches should encourage players to come to a resolution on their own, and if asked during a dispute coaches may offer rules clarifications. After a dispute a coach may talk to his or her own player about the dispute and offer opinions.
- Youth coaches will make an effort to educate parents about Spirit of the Game and work to create a sideline atmosphere that respects Spirit of the Game.
- Coaches will teach and give players opportunities to practice knowledge of the rules of Ultimate.
- Coaches will always exhibit respect for opposing players.
- Coaches will always exhibit respect for other coaches.
- Coaches will always exhibit respect for observer
- Coaches will model Spirit of the Game at all times.

Summary:

The coach's goal in terms of Spirit of the Game is to create an environment where players are responsible for upholding the rules and ensuring that the outcomes of plays and games are fair.









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
