COMPETITION RULES

- All games to 15, win by two, cap at 17. Finals also to 15/17.
- Half-time is 10 minutes.
- Each team has two timeouts per half.
- Regardless of how many timeouts a team has used before overtime, during overtime each team has one timeout.
- Overtime: A game is in overtime if tied at one point less than original game total, and the winning score will exceed said game total, (e.g. In a game to 15 goals, overtime occurs when the score reaches 14-14 and the minimum winning score is determined to be 16.)
- Time-cap goes on at end of round time on schedule. Add two points to higher score after first score after time-cap. Play to that total. No more win by two.
- The time-cap does not affect timeouts.

2006 WUCC Qualification

The World Flying Disc Federation (WFDF) has released the initial team allocations for the 2006 World Ultimate Club Championships (Perth, Australia, Nov. 2006). Please note that WFDF expects that not all initial bids will be filled and bids will be re-allocated if/when they become available.

The U.S. has initially been awarded the following number of bids to the 2006 WUCC in each division: Open – 5, Women's – 5, Mixed – 6, Masters – 4. Qualification for these bids, and any additional bids awarded to the U.S. by WFDF will be based on final placement at the 2005 UPA Club Championships. Good luck!

Placement Game Rules (5-8 and 9-16 on Saturday)

- All games on the schedule, including placement games on Saturday, must be played this year. Final placement for the event will be used to determine bids to the 2006 World Ultimate Club Championships in Perth, Australia. Note that the number of bids currently awarded to the U.S. may increase if other countries turn down their bids. It is very important that all placement games 5th-16th are played out so we can award those additional bids should they become available.
- Strength wildcards will be awarded based on final standings as determined by the set format and the strength wildcard criteria. Because this is a WUCC qualifying year, the first round of the 5-8 bracket will be played as scheduled rather than switched up to create specific wildcard match-ups (as is done in non-WUCC qualifying years).
- If a team does not play a scheduled placement game, that team will not be eligible for a bid to the 2006 WUCC and that team's region will not be eligible for any wildcards (strength, size, growth) for the 2006 Club Series, unless special approval is granted by the tournament Competition Director.

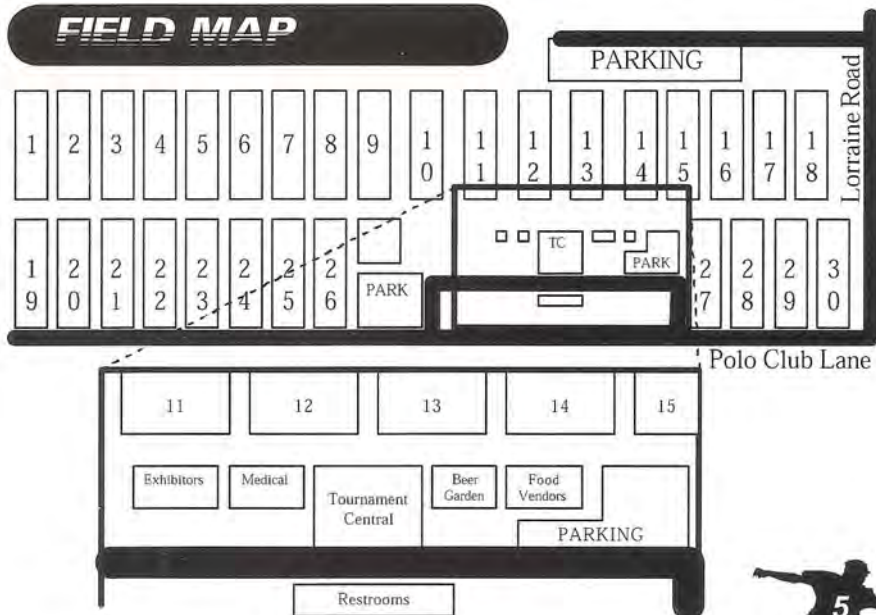

HEALTH AND SAFETY

Medical staff (trainer and EMT) will be available through the event at Tournament Central. Please seek advice and assistance regarding prevention and treatment of injuries or illness.

Directions to the local hospital can be found in the "Directions" section of this program.

Heat, Nutrition and Hydration

- Heat-related illness occurs where body cooling by evaporation is limited. Sweating depletes the body's salt and moisture, which leads to dehydration. If a player recognizes any signs or symptoms of heat-related illness, he or she should treat the problem immediately.

- Signs and Symptoms of Heat Illness can include change in level of consciousness, abdominal cramps, nausea/vomiting, fatigue/tingling, chills, inability to spit, dry mucous membranes, decreased urine output and change in color.

- Prevention and Treatment of Heat Illness

- Avoid alcohol, caffeine, and carbonated beverages.

- Medications such as antihistamines, decongestants, certain asthma medications, and diuretics can increase risk for heat illness. Avoid them if possible.

- Avoid certain nutritional supplements (such as caffeine and ephedrine) that can dehydrate the body and/or increase metabolism and heat production.

- Know your body – Be honest! Are you fit enough to perform under current conditions?

- Drink and eat – Eat and drink (water AND sports drinks) "optimally" before, during, and after play. Potassium is important (good sources include: sports drinks, yogurt, grapefruit juice, bananas, oranges). Sodium is also important (good sources include: sports drinks, vegetable juices, pretzels, nuts, cheese and crackers). After play, carbohydrates are important: foods such as potatoes, honey, cereal, white bread, corn chips, sports drinks, jelly beans, rice cakes, bagels, crackers, gummy candies).

- Don't drink too much – Over-hydrating can be dangerous if it leads to a fluid and electrolyte imbalance.

- Monitor your urine – Clear/copious = hydrated. Dark = Need water/

electrolytes.

- Be sensitive to prior illness – If you've been sick, your body may be more susceptible to dehydration.

- Rest and cool down after play – Find shade, wet the skin, get in front of a fan or breeze.

Sideline Safety

- Players and spectators should make every effort to keep objects, including but not limited to bags, strollers, chairs, coolers and tents, as far away from the playing field as possible.
- If a player feels that an object on the sideline is not safe, s/he should inform Event Staff and should refrain from playing until s/he is satisfied that safe conditions have been established.
- The UPA and Event Staff reserve the right to move or remove objects or spectators from on or near the playing field if those conditions are, in the opinion of the UPA or Event Staff, unsafe for players, staff, or spectators.

Lightning Guidelines

- Event staff will communicate with players and spectators via PA system and field marshals equipped with radios that there is a lightning danger, play will be stopped, and everyone should seek shelter.
- Safe Shelter for players and spectators at the polo grounds include any enclosed building or fully enclosed vehicle with a hard top and closed windows.
- Event staff will use the Flash-to Bang method to determine when to send people to shelter. By the time the Flash-to-Bang count has reached 30 seconds, all individuals should be in a safe shelter location.
- If you can't get to a safe shelter, try to avoid being the tallest object in an open field or on open water. Avoid other tall objects, metal objects, and water. Assume a crouch position with only the balls of your feet touching the ground, your arms wrapped around your knees, and your head lowered. Minimize contact with the ground. Do not lie flat.
- Avoid using telephone land lines. Cell phones are safe provided the person has followed other safety guidelines.
- Event staff will indicate to players when play is going to resume. Team captains should meet at Tournament Central to receive instructions for resuming play and any schedule modifications.



SPRIT AWARDS

Ultimate has traditionally relied upon a spirit of sportsmanship which places the responsibility for fair play on the player himself. Highly competitive play is encouraged, but never at the expense of the bond of mutual respect between players, adherence to the agreed-upon rules of the game, or the basic joy of play.

- UPA 10th Edition Rules of Ultimate

Team Awards - Following every game, each team will be asked to rate its opponent on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being the rating for the highest level of sportsmanship. These ratings will be averaged and the team in each division with the highest rating will be awarded the Team Spirit Award after their division's finals.

Individual Awards - Teams will be each be asked to nominate a player from their own team who they feel displays the highest level of spirit. The definition of spirit is up to each team, but should include elements of sportsmanship, leadership, perseverance, fire, etc. Choose the person whose attitude you wish other people on your team would emulate and who other players off your team admire. Individual spirit winners will receive a medal and full-color Spirit of the Game disc, courtesy of Discraft.



Peter Farricker Spirit of the Game Award - The spirit award in the Open Division is called the Farricker Spirit Award, named for Peter Farricker, a player who embodied Spirit of the Game to those who knew him and those who played with or against him. This award is given to a player in the Open Division of the UPA's Championship Series adjudged to have exhibited personal responsibility, integrity, and fairness combined with a high standard of playing ability. Each qualifying Open team nominates one player from their own team as the person who best represents the spirit of the game. At the Open Championship, each nominee is honored with a disc, pin or set of

Mardi Gras beads. Our hope is that the people wearing the Mardi Gras beads will be connected to Pete, each other and the Spirit of the Game, and become role models for their teammates and opponents. A selection committee watches the open semis and selects one of the 4 semifinal nominees as the winner. The award will be presented before the Open Finals. Previous winners include Moses Rifkin, Andy Crews and Damien Scott.

Kathy Pufahl Spirit of the Game Award - The introduction of the Kathy Pufahl Cande Spirit of the Game Award will build upon the foundations of SOTG that are reflected in the Farricker Spirit Award; Ability, Fairness, and Integrity. The Kathy Pufahl Cande Spirit Award will build upon that foundation by also recognizing those individuals who give back to our sport. The Kathy Pufahl Spirit Award is given to the player(s) adjudged to have exhibited personal responsibility, integrity, and selfless contribution to Ultimate, combined with a high standard of playing ability. Each Regional qualifying team nominates one player from their team as the person who best represents the spirit of the game and has contributed in a substantial way to their ultimate community. At the Club Championships, each of the 16 nominees is honored with a disc and a memento reflective of Kathy's love of horticulture. A selection committee will review the nomination documents, observe the nominees play, determine the 4 semifinalists, and then select one of the 4 semifinal nominees as the winner. The inaugural Pufahl Award went to Vida Towne.

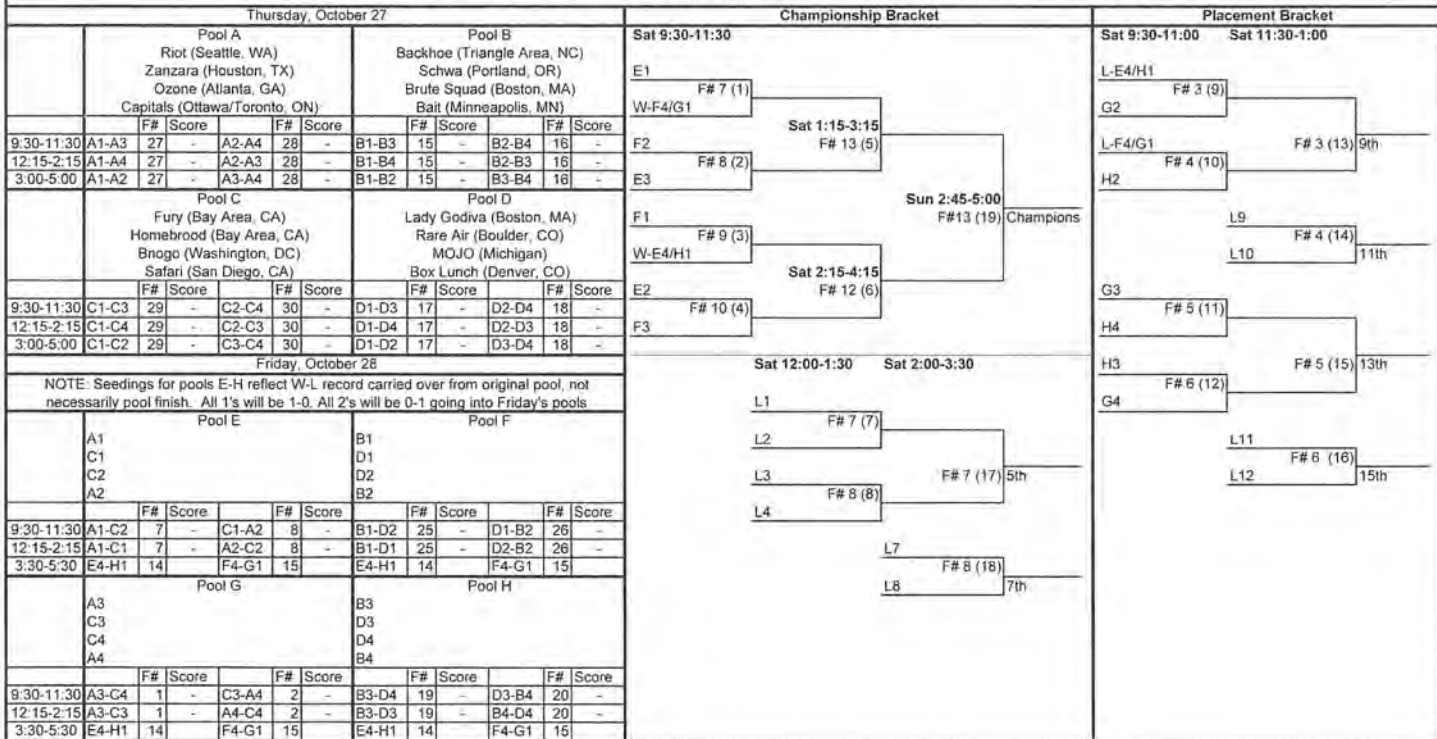

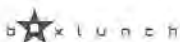
MOJO
