Ultimate Frisbee

Ultimate is a fast moving field sport played with a Frisbee disc. The action of the game combines the passing and scoring of football, the cutting and guarding of basketball and the non-stop field movement of soccer. Because Ultimate is a team sport in which each player must act as quarterback, receiver and defender, a large number of participants can be actively involved throughout the course of play.

Ultimate is played on a field similar to a football field, with 25-yard endzones at each end of a field that is 70 yards long by 40 yards wide. Two seven-person teams are on the field at once, with substitutions allowed only between goals.

The object of the game is to pass the disc from teammate to teammate until a pass is caught in the opponent's endzone. Running with the disc is not allowed: upon catching a pass, the player must stop running and establish a pivot foot before attempting the next pass. In the meantime, potential receivers are cutting towards and away from the player with the disc, often running established plays or patterns. The disc may be thrown in any direction and there is no offsides. The thrower must throw the disc within ten seconds.

The Spirit of the Game

Demanding athletic competition, such as that found in an Ultimate game, has a positive influence on a person's physical, mental and social development. But, what sets Ultimate apart from all other sports is the priority it places on sportsmanship — the game is characterized by its high regard for mutual respect among players and an absence of referees. The introduction to the Rules of the Game clearly defines this principle, which is referred to as the "Spirit of the Game": Ultimate has traditionally relied upon a spirit of sportsmanship which places the responsibility for fair play on the player himself/herself. Highly competitive play is encouraged but never at the expense of the bond of mutual respect between players, adherence to agreed-upon rules of the game, or the basic joy of play. Protection of these vital elements serves to eliminate adverse conduct from the Ultimate field. Such actions as taunting of opposing players, dangerous aggression, intentional fouling, or other "win-at-all-costs" behavior are contrary to the spirit of the game and must be avoided by all players.

... the Staff



The following is a listing of things to do and sights to see while in Washington, D.C.

Our Metro subway system is the easiest and cheapest way to get around, with stops all throughout the downtown and suburban areas. The subway, however, closes at midnight, so build that into your evening plans. Taxicabs are relatively inexpensive and quite plentiful in the District. Fares are determined on a "Zone" basis.

The Key Bridge Marriott, the tournament hotel, is 200 yards from the Rosslyn Metro Stop on the Orange Line and the Blue Line.

The Playing Fields – West Potomac Park – are located between the Tidal Basin and the Potomac River. They can be reached from the following Metro stops: Smithsonian (Orange/Blue), Federal Triangle (Orange/ Blue), Foggy Bottom (Orange/Blue) and Farragut West (Orange/ Blue). Head toward the Washington Monument and Jefferson Memorial. Then proceed toward the river.

• Georgetown: Just a short walk across the Key Bridge from the tournament hotel is Georgetown, D.C.'s oldest neighborhood and world famous shopping district. Every specialty store imagineable and hundreds of restaurants can be found on either M Street or Wisconsin Avenue. Great clothes, toys, food and ice cream are just across the bridge.

• Wilson Boulevard: Just up the hill from the hotel is a strip of ethnic restaurants representing every nationality and cuisine. Ask for directions to Wilson Boulevard at the hotel. It's about a one-minute drive and well worth the trip.

• Smithsonian Institution: The Smithsonian Institution is comprised of 11 different museums and galleries lining the National Capitol Mall. The Air and Space Museum, the world's most popular, is located at Indepdence and D Streets, and can be reached by taking Metro to the Smithsonian stop on the Orange/Blue lines. Most other Smithsonian buildings – Arts and Industries, Natural History, the Hirshorn Art Museum (8th & Independence) – are located at the same Metro stop.

...And See

• National Geographic Building: Located on 17th Street between K and L Streets. Daily exhibits taken from the pages of National Geographic magazine are open to the public at no cost. This can be reached by taking Metro to the Farragut North stop on the Red line or the Farragut West stop on the Orange and Blue lines.


• White House: The headquarters for our kinder and gentler nation is located at 16th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue. The best view of the house and its fountains, however, is found on E Street, behind the back yard. The White House is most easily reached by taking Metro to the Farragut West stop on the Orange and Blue lines. Frisbees crossing the fence will be disintegrated by ground-toair laser cannons hidden in Bush's bushes.

• The Pawnshop: The Pawnshop restaurant is the site of our two tournament parties, Saturday and Sunday nights. It's located at the corner of Moore Street and Lee Highway. Take the Subway to the Rosslyn stop on the Orange/Blue lines and turn left on Moore. The Pawnshop is roughly 100 yards across Lee Highway from the Key Bridge Marriott, the tournament hotel. See the full page map for directions or ask anyone at the hotel how to get there.

• Also Within Walking Distance: The following objects of interest are within walking distance of the fields at West Potomac Park: The National Botanical Gardens are located just before the Capitol on the Mall. The Gardens are open all day Friday, Saturday and Sunday. The Old Executive Office Building is a marvel of Federal-period architecture and is located at the corner of 17th and Pennsylvania, right next door to the White House.





Ultimate Players Association

The Ultimate Players Association (UPA) is a not-for-profit corporation established in 1979 as the governing body of the sport of Ultimate to promote its growth and development and to coordinate the sport's ongoing activities.



The Competitors

Central Region

Windy City

This gritty squad from Chicago is a two-time UPA National Champion, taking the title in New Orleans in 1983 and again in Houston in 1986. They have qualified for the semi's at Nationals a record six consecutive years, and have consistently displayed one of the game's great offenses.

Amanata

A St. Louis team has appeared in the Nationals every year since the St. Louis Tunas lost in the finals in Austin in 1982. Two years later, they took the title in Santa Barbara. They also qualified for the semi's in 1985 and 1987.

AWOL

This marks the second Nationals appearance for the Chicago/Michigan team. They finished second at the 1986 Nationals playing under the name "Nemeheads". Most of them, however, played on Nemesis, a team which qualified for Nationals in the two intervening years.

South Region

Jaga

This Austin team's appearance here at Nationals means that every year in the 1980's, except for one, the South has been represented by a team from Texas. This team has made a previous appearance as the aptly-named "Splat."

Chain Lightning

Last year's regionals defeat ended a three year consecutive streak of Nationals appearances for the Atlanta team. This year they are back, setting a South record by competing at the Nationals for the fifth time.

Ozone

This year marks Ozone's third straight Southern Regional title. With two appearances in New York, and their regionals in Austin, all within the space of four weeks, Ozone is the most travelled women's team this fall. For them, competing here in D.C. at the Nationals is actually the closest tournament they have travelled to this season.

West Region

Tsunami

This San Francisco bay area team is the defending UPA National Champions. This year they tied a West men's record by winning the region three consecutive years.

Iguanas

It had been six years since anyone outside of San Francisco and Santa Barbara finished in the top two at the West Regionals until this L.A./San Diego team did so two weeks ago. Many of their members played on L.A.'s Polo Club.

Donors

The Donors, based in Oregon, are only the second team outside of California to ever qualify for the Nationals from the Western region. They qualified the hard way, after losing a first round game. It's great to see new faces.

Crush Club

This years' West winners are a team based out of both L.A. and Santa Barbara. The women's team from Santa Barbara, from 1984 to 1987, was the most dominant team in history, winning four straight Nationals titles. Crush Club, by beating the Maniacs in a close regional finals, may be the favored team.

Maniacs

Called Mamba last year, the San Francisco area team returns to the Nationals for the second time. Last year they finished in the semifinals, an extremely strong finish for a team competing in its first Nationals. They, along with Boston's Lady Godiva, are the two women's teams that could win it all despite finishing second in their region.

The Competitors

Northeast Region

Titanic

Titanic continues the legacy of a Boston men's team qualifying for Nationals every year in the 80's. National semifinalists for the last three years, and finalists last year, this Boston squad won the Northeast Region in a thrilling 21-19 final, after finishing second to New York in the two previous years. In all of Titanic's five appearances at Nationals, the only time they have not made the semis (1985, D.C.) was the only other time they won their region. Curious indeed.

New York

In this, their third year, New York's loss in the Northeast finals marks the first time they have not won that region's title. National champs in 1987, and semifinalists in '88, they are sure to be the strongest "second place" team competing. The last two times a team from New York finished second in their region, they made it to the semifinals, including a Nationals second place finish in 1985, also held in D.C.

Earth Atomizers

Boston's Earth Atomizers, seeded sixth in the Northeast regional, beat the third seed, Graffiti from New York, twice in one weekend to finish third. This marks the third time, and second in the last three years, that two men's teams from Boston have qualified. New York (with New York and Graffiti) shares that distinction.

Smithereens

This is the Smithereens third Nationals in the last four years. Last year they had their highest finish ever, making it to the finals before losing to their cross-town Boston rivals, Lady Godiva. This is the second straight year that two women's teams from Boston have qualified, which are the only two times in the history of the women's division.

Lady Godiva

Boston's Lady Godiva, the defending National Champions, are the only team, men's or women's, to make the finals in each of the last two years. This year marks their third straight Nationals appearance, a Northeast women's record. There are four Boston teams here this year, breaking their own record of three set last year.

Mid Atlantic Region

Loony Tunes

Loony Tunes is the first men's team ever to win the Mid-Atlantic region three consecutive years. With each year they win the Regionals more convincingly and come closer to making the Nationals semifinals. In the last two years they finished just a few points shy.

Philmore

Like last year, Philmore came from second place in their sectionals to qualify for Nationals. In between, during August, they won the World Club Championships in Germany. At last year's Nationals, they finished at 3-2, an excellent record for a first year team. They know how to peak at the right time – this is the second straight year they've come out of the loser's bracket of Regionals to advance to Nationals.

Satori

Washington D.C.'s entry into the Nationals, Satori has had one of the best seasons of any team in the country. In their first year, they've won April Fools, Centrals, Easterns, and the New York Invitational while rolling to a 98-7 record. Beware! Their only unaverged loss was to an all-star team in the finals at Boulder. Get 'em home team!

Zephyrs

The Zephyrs are back, last competing at Nationals in 1985, which were also held in D.C. This Philadelphia team is almost entirely different from there '85 team. But, as they did in '85, they qualified from regionals by beating a team in the last round that the Zephyrs had lost to earlier in the same tournament.

The Main Tournament Tent

On the Tidal Basin side of the playing fields will be a large tent, which will serve as tournament headquarters. In addition to First-Aid information, directions to various points of interest, and general tournament information, Frisbee discs and Tee-shirts commemorating the 1989 UPA National Championships will be available.

A large scoreboard will be set up at the main tent to allow participants and spectators to get a quick "snapshot" of the day's action. This scoreboard will be updated frequently.

Each field will also have a scoreboard, which will be operated by a tournament-provided scorekeeper. Working along with each scorekeeper will be a tournament-provided field official, whose job is to make sure each round of play begins and ends promptly at the scheduled times. Please respect these people. They are volunteering their time to make *your* tournament run as smoothly as possible.

Sports Massage

In keeping with our tradition of firsts, WAFC has invited the Sports Massage Team of the National Capital Area to offer their services to players and spectators.

The Team's tables will be set up next to the Main Tournament Tent, and massage tickets will be available at the Sales Table. They're even offering massage sessions at the hotel, which are available by appointment only.

You've made it this far. You owe it to yourself to indulge in a massage.
