



Congratulations on earning your spot in the 1994 UPA National Championships!

Lexington's ultimate teams, Black Lung and Heidi Ho! welcome y'all to the Bluegrass state. For the first time Nationals is being held in the Central Region; we hope to make this a fantastic event and your stay enjoyable. Feel free to ask a Lexington player for advice on nightclubs, restaurants, or whatever else you want to discuss.

For the last three years the Kentucky Horse Park has been the site of our summer and postseason tournaments. On the last weekend in July, we host the Mason-Dixon Tournament - you are cordially invited to participate in 1995. We would like to thank the Polo Association for the use of their fields. Let's all show our appreciation by keeping our vehicles on the roads and parking areas.

The Horse Park boasts a beautiful museum devoted to the horse. You may view it, or take a horse ride, or see a movie about horses, all at a discounted admission fee because you are a ultimate player - just let them know at the Guest Services door, near the visitor center. The park is also the final resting place of one of the world's greatest thoroughbreds, Man-O-War, his whole body was buried here, not just the head and hooves which is customary for horse burial. If you are camping here, showers are available at the campgrounds (during the summer tournament the pool is open and we have the party at the fields where all the teams are camping).

The party will be Saturday night at the Holiday Inn poolside. Beer and music will be provided, wine and mixed drinks may be purchased at the lounge. Sunday evening will see a celebratory get together at the LA Olivers Lounge, in the Holiday Inn. There are no legal package liquor sales in Kentucky on Sunday, and if you drink at the park, please do so from a cup.

Proceeds from the food sales are going to Life Adventure Camp, a local non-profit organization helping emotionally and behaviorally disturbed children through wilderness camping. The more you eat the more your help.

We learned a terrible lesson in Nashville this spring when Shawn Adams, Carmen Lipoma were struck by lightning. If we hear thunder, play will be stopped for an indefinite period until the weather improves. Across the fields and at the main tent are jars where contributions are being collected to help pay off her hospital debt, there are also Carmen shirts for sale at the main tent. The Open Division

Most of the participants this year have been here before, but there are some new faces as well. Three of the four last year's semifinalists have returned — Boston's Death or Glory, and the Northwest's Double Happiness and Rhino Slam. The absence of the other semifinalist, five-time National Champions New York, New York, guarantees that this year's Nationals will produce a new champion for the first time in five years.

The two top-seeded teams, Death or Glory and Double Happiness, have both made final appearances in the past, with their opponent and defeater always being one in the same — New York. This year there is no chance of such repeat matches, and the finals for both may seem a bit closer. But while the Northeast and West have dominated the division in recent years, other regional teams have been working hard to turn the page. The Mid-Atlantic's Ring of Fire, a World Club semi-finalist and a near-miss to the semis last year, is looking for a hit this year. Z from Chicago is new to Nationals, but with some veteran Windy City players, is sure to be a team to be reckoned with. The South's Miami Refugees, who qualified an Open and a Masters team to Nationals last year, has re-merged and is stronger than they've ever been. The Boulder Stains, from the Mountain Beach Conference, is the first Open team from Colorado ever to compete here, making them an unknown quantity.

The other qualifiers, the second place finishers of Regionals, boast strong teams as well. As previous years have shown — with two second regional placers making it to the semis of Nationals —second place at Regionals means a chance at the number one title. In fact, in 1991 and 1992, New York took the title after finishing second in their region. Cojones, the new New York team formed by some of the core players of the great New York dynasty, will be a dangerous opponent. Burning River, St. Louis's newest formation, is sure to make their first appearance a memorable one. Chesapeake, yet another DC/Baltimore conglomerate, is hoping they have the right chemistry this year. Chain Lightning, a veteran team of Nationals, is out to prove that last year's performance was a fluke. And the wildcard qualifiers: Cornell, from the Northeast, remakes history as the first college-based team in years to qualify for Open Nationals (the 1984 Univ. Florida's Fat Women were probably the most recent). And last but not at all least, Rhino Slam, the wildcard from the West who have made two consecutive semi-finals, and barely lost to Double Happiness in the semis last year, is a favorite again this year.

A new National Champion of Ultimate will be crowned on Sunday, and though there are favorites and underdogs, surprises are a big part of Nationals. And as we go into the competition on Thursday, it is surely any team's championship. Spectators are encouraged to pull up a lounge chair and watch the action. My message to the players: Play hard, have fun, be spirited, and may the best team win! (Preferably in a one-point, overtime game ;-).

The Masters Division

While Ultimate is growing fast, the Open Masters Division is the fastest growing division in the sport today. In their role as elder spokespeople for the sports, the masters play a crucial role of schooling, I mean teaching, the future champions vital lessons such as they did at the Sectionals of the DC Metro Area and Northern and Southern California.

The Masters Division is where you can watch the championship dream teams of the past compete against each other again. Come watch the 1986 Windy City, 1981 Condors, the 1988 Tsunami, the 1982 Rude Boys, parts of the 1985 Circus, the 1984 Tunas, the 1989-1991 Philmore, and coming soon the 1989-1993 New York, New York.

Last years champions, the Beyondors have had a transfusion of Iguana blood that they hope will revitalize the surviving members. With Miami not fielding a team this year, US Tampico's Specials, last year's winner at the pool, might make it to the finals. Boston is back, as Guns and Hoses, and looking for their third title, and the new entries of Slack, Old Man River, Voodoo, and Old Bay have helped to create the toughest Masters National yet.

The Women's Masters Division hasn't quite boomed like the Open Masters, but nonetheless, expect some hot action from this year's teams. Returning once again are the ????, defending champions from the South, and Hot Flashes, the first Women's Masters Champions and last year's finalist. Masters of Destiny, Red Hots, Colorado's Front Range, and Philly's Pickled Peppers round off the division to make this year's one of the toughest.

The Fall In Ithaca, NY has traditionally been a building season for the College Buds. This year, however, the Buds were fortunate enough to have many college Ineligible players in town to help out the team, and give them a shot at the tightly contested last spot of the shaken up North East region.

Cornell's 1994 squad is composed of 17 college eligible players, and 9 ineligible ones. The ineligibles consist mainly of recent graduates. The mix of older, more experienced players and young runners enabled Cornell to reach Open Nationals for the first time since 1979.

The 1994 Buds pride themselves on thier Spirit of the Game, and hope to be adequate embassadors of College Spirit at this Autumn's Nationals.






