As one of the premier amateur sports venues in the nation (with, arguably, the best fields for ultimate in the nation), the NSC is serving as the site for the fourth major ultimate tournament in its relatively short history. With the UPA College Nationals in 1996 and both College Nationals and the WFDF Championships in 1998, we are rounding out our tournament experience with this year's Co-ed National Championships.

As you look around the complex, you will see the multitude of soccer fields, the Schwan's Super Rink (the largest ice facility in the U.S.), the track cycling velodrome, the track and field/soccer stadium (which is the home of Minnesota's professional soccer team, the Minnesota Thunder), and if you manage to get on the other side of the stadium/fieldhouse/offices, you will find more soccer fields and an 18-hole putting course (soon to be followed by an 18-hole championship golf course and training facility). Why is all this here? Look around. It's as flat as a pancake. In fact, one of the great advantages of the lack of exciting topography is that we will be able to see thunderstorms coming from quite a ways off. And, since every tournament I've run has produced a thunderstorm on the second day, I can only offer this advice: on Sunday, know where your car is and plan the fastest escape route to it.

From the National Coed Championship Director

Welcome to the Year 2000 UPA coed Championships!

The Ultimate Players Association held their first Open National Championship in 1979. The Women's Division made its debut in 1981. By 1984, the College Open Division was organized. College Women were added to the Championship schedule three years later in 1987. Masters came on the scene in 1991. In 1998, Coed and Junior's were both voted into the UPA lineup.

Joey Gray, leader of the initial charge to bring coed into the highest levels of the UPA, said, "even I underestimated the enormous infectious energy behind the coed movement. A monster wave swept right through that Board meeting, and sometimes, you just know you have to jump on and ride for your life."

That first fall season, 92 coed teams jumped on and rode the coed wave. That division grew to 122 teams the following year, surpassing the Women's Division to become the UPA's second largest division.

Now, in year number three, Coed was given a new experimental time slot in the summer, culminating in a Labor Day Championships. 151 teams from the United States and Canada competed in Sectionals events, and now it has all come down to this one last weekend here at the National Sports Center.

So much effort went into this year"s Championship Series, both on and off the field. I'd like to thank all the UPA Regional and Sectional Coordinators who ran the 26 qualifying tournaments required to select the 24 teams competing for this year's title. Thanks also to the staff at UPA headquarters — Executive Director Joey Gray and Assistant Directors April Hoskins and Joe Gorman — for their tireless efforts on behalf of our sport. Another heartfelt thank-you to Mike Remucal and his whole crew here in Blaine.

My last big giant thank-you goes out to the coed players themselves, who have weathered this season with me and never stopped believing that we were all fundamentally working toward a common goal, even if most of the time we all seemed to disagree on how best to get there. Without the players, none of this means anything.

The work is done; now it's time to play!

From the Executive Director

Men and women competing together on the same field... no net to separate them... no special rules to restrict the all-out athleticism of any player. When has such a thing been possible in the history of humans and games? Its not just Spirit of the Game that makes Ultimate special. Ultimate's the only field sport where men and women compete as equally valuable teammates at the national and international levels.

Five years ago, no one would have guessed coed Ultimate would become a national or world championship division. Outside New Zealand, no national organization held coed championships. Instead, the national organizations focussed on the traditional model - gender segregated championships. Why? Who knows... Meanwhile, coed teams often played in the "open" division of independent tournaments, sometimes informally agreeing to play with 1, 2 or more women on the field. Coed thrived at the local level, especially on the West Coast. In some places, coed was necessary because of lack of players. For many, coed was simply fun!

In 1990, a Seattle coed team called Yow Yow played against all-men's teams in the open division, losing most games. After attending the Calgary Ho-Down, Yow Yow wanted more coed play, so started Potlatch in 1990 with 10 teams. By 1997, Potlatch grew to 75 teams and the gender ratio evolved from 5:2 to 4:3. Many smaller coed tournaments emerged in Washington and British Columbia, as well as a thriving coed scene in San Francisco & Palo Alto. California's Red Fish Blue Fish began practicing and traveling to Open tournaments around 1994, even making open semis and finals, showing a giant leap in the level of coed play and strategy.

In 1996 I asked the UPA why there wasn't a coed championship. I was basically told there was little interest, coed was not competitive and players were being served already. I found the right mentor, Troy Frever, and I gathered some numbers, which was easy - there are so many coed leagues. We proposed that the UPA create a new National Director position. I was selected to fill that position and to create a network of volunteers. All their effort from mid 98 'til now is what brought you to Blaine, especially your Sectional & Regional Coordinators.

The first UPA coed championship was held in 1998, with overwhelmingly more participation than expected. Teams that had not been part of the UPA championship series before came of the woodwork to play in the new division, and players who had retired from championship play returned - again, for the fun as much as for the competition. Looking back, even as convinced as I was that coed was huge, I don't think any of us had any idea how big coed would be, or how fast.

In 1997, the Vancouver Committee for the World Ultimate Club Championships supported the proposal for international coed play - a coed demo game was held. In 1998, the first coed World Ultimate Championship was held in Minnesota with Brazil, Canada, Germany & the US fielding teams. In just 2 years, the international division more than tripled, with this year's addition of Japan, Finland, Austria, Switzerland, Ireland, New Zealand, Sweden, Czech Republic and the International team. Called "mixed" for international play, the division was the second largest of the 6 divisions in 2000. Brand new countries were able to participate in Worlds, even without enough players for a full open or women's team.

Will coed Ultimate be cursed by its own success? Only time will tell. 2000 has been an exceptionally difficult year for the UPA's fledgling division - moved on relatively short notice from the fall to the summer, as you obviously know. Your attendance this weekend is a testament to the resilience of coed and of Ultimate players in general. Jen, the Coordinators and your Minnesota hosts have pulled off an incredible feat to bring you this year's UPA National Coed Championship. There have been times this year that we've all been depressed about the schedule and players' reaction. Looking back to just 2 years ago though, there weren't even coed coordinators until June and July. This helped us keep the year in perspective. We knew we could do it, despite all obstacles. And here we are! Taking part, with you, in the highest-level of coed ultimate on the planet.

On one hand, one of the most surprising things to me, even as founder of the new division, is the sense of entitlement expressed so strongly by

coed players - as if coed had always been in the fall, for years and years and years. On the other hand, it is a refreshing sign of success, that so many players are now involved and so opinionated. I've said elsewhere and will probably say for years, coed is not "there" yet - there's still so much work ahead. It's out of my hands, and into yours. Get involved in the UPA. Get involved in the future of Ultimate. Pay attention to your Board Members - in both league & the UPA. Vote. Make coed what YOU want it to be, at the local, national and international levels. Be patient. Be tenacious. Listen, and learn.

The legitimacy of coed is not something to be forced - if it is to be, it will come on its time in its way, thanks to your sweat and your spirit. Players at the first coed World Championship in '98 showed that coed is not only possible, but exciting and competitive - just in time to solve a big problem for the upcoming World Games. With only 60 player spots for Ultimate, only one division would be possible. Would it be men? Or women? With coed, BOTH will showcase Ultimate to the World, together. Where will you take it next?



NYCE —New York, NY

Rules of Fantasy League Ultimate

First Edition with Variations

"No set of rules can replace a good argument."

Preface

The purpose of the rules of Fantasy League Ultimate (FLU) is to provide a guideline which describes the way the game is heckled. It assumed that no FLU heckler will intentionally violate the rules; thus there are no harsh penalties for inadvertent infractions, but rather a method for attempting to sway the other hecklers to your side of a dispute (i.e. arguing).

Often a heckler is in a position where it is clearly to the heckler's advantage to miscall an Ultimate play, but that heckler is morally bound to abide by the rules. The integrity of FLU depends on each player's responsibility to uphold the spirit of the game, and this responsibility

should not be taken lightly. However, a healthy argument is always encouraged.

Introduction

Description

Fantasy League Ultimate is a non-contact, non-motion sport played by any number of hecklers. The purpose of the game is to make watching Ultimate almost as exciting as playing it. The object of the game is to score points. A point is scored when a heckler's player(s) successfully completes one of a specific set of plays.

Spirit of the Game

Ultimate has traditionally relied upon a spirit of sportsmanship which places the responsibility for fair play on the player. Highly competitive play is encouraged, but never at the expense of the bond of mutual respect between players, adherence to the agreed upon rules of the game, or the basic joy of play. Protection of these vital elements serves to eliminate adverse conduct from the Ultimate field. Such actions as taunting of opposing players, dangerous aggression, intentional fouling, or other "win-at-all-costs" behavior are contrary to the spirit of the game and must be avoided by all players. However, in Fantasy League Ultimate, all of the above are encouraged between hecklers. Heckler's Clause

A game may be played under any variations of the rules agreed upon by the hecklers. In tournament play, such variations are subject to the approval of the tournament director. Such things as Carolina Rules and the number of players per heckler can easily be altered to suit the level of play.

Participants

1. A "player" is any of the people who are actually participating in the game of Ultimate.

2. A "heckler" is any of the people who are actually participating in the game of Fantasy League Ultimate.

3. A "metaheckler" is any of the people who are actually participating in the game of Fantasy League Fantasy League Ultimate.

The Draft

A game of FLU may start at any point during an Ultimate game. A game of FLU begins by each heckler drafting one or more players from either team. No score is counted until all hecklers have drafted their player(s). When all hecklers have agreed on their picks, each starts with a score of 0. After the game of FLU has begun, other hecklers may join the game, but they must start with the lowest current score of any heckler.

Field of Play

1. The field of play is any area outside of the Ultimate playing field.

- 2. The playing field may have any surface (although a comfortable lawn chair or Maine Lounger is suggested) which is essentially flat, free of obstructions and holes, and affords reasonable heckler safety.
- 3. During halftime, the Ultimate playing field may (at the discretion of the Tournament Director) be encroached for such games as milk, flutter-guts, box, or MAC lines. These halftime activities may optionally be played for FLU points.

Playing FLU

Scoring

Score When your player...

+1 ...catches a goal.

- +1 ...makes a defensive or point block.
- +3 ...completes a "Greatest Play."
- -1 ...drops the disc.
- -1 ...throws the disc away.

The distinctions between a throwaway and a drop, or a defensive block and a drop, are fuzzy. These issues may be decided in any manner agreed to by all hecklers; one method is a majority vote, with hecklers whose players were involved in the play abstaining from voting (but active in arguing).

Multiply by When...

2 ...the throw is a hammer (but only -1 for a dropped hammer).

...the throw is a push pass (for the thrower only).

...the game is capped, or after it reaches the first game point.

These multipliers are cumulative. So, for example, a push pass hammer (?) for a goal at game point is worth +8.

Time outs

There are no timeouts in FLU. A heckler must be present on the sideline to claim points; a heckler must also be present at the end of the game in order to win. No purchase is necessary.

Variations

Multiple players per heckler

Each heckler picks one or more players from each team. Hecklers may agree to restrict choices to a player and his or her defender. Each heckler must pick one experienced and one inexperienced player, from either team. A majority of hecklers must agree on a player's classification.

If your player throws a goal, you switch to the player who caught the goal. If another heckler already had the receiver, he or she now has your player. Similarly, when your player's throw is blocked, you switch to the player who made the block.

Fantasy League Fantasy League

Each metaheckler selects a heckler, much as hecklers select players. Score +1 when your heckler wins an argument or votes with the majority on a call, -1 when your heckler loses an argument, and +3 if he or she wins the Fantasy League.

Metahecklers may also be hecklers, but it is not permitted to choose yourself in Fantasy League Fantasy League.

Etiquette

- 1. Should a dispute or confusion arise on the Ultimate field, it should be common practice to offer your input.
- 2. In the case where a novice heckler is deciding on his pick, it is a violation against spirit to recommend a bad pick.
- 3. It is the responsibility of all hecklers to maximize the amount of heckling.

[Note: Points 1 and 3 will not be appreciated by the either players or the tournament directors — abide at your own risk...]

Examples

These examples to illustrate the rules only; they should not be taken as rules themselves. Hecklers are encouraged to amend or circumvent the rules when it is to their advantage.

Example 1

Player throws a hammer which is blocked, but receiver calls a foul (no scoring). Player then throws a hammer out the back of the end zone (throwaway; -2 for thrower's heckler).

Example 2

Player's push pass is point blocked at game point (+2 for marker, -4 for thrower).

Observers

Before the game, the hecklers may decide to select up to 6 experienced non-hecklers to act as Observers. In this role, their job is to carefully watch the action of the game. They do not actively score any points, but may lounge passively on the sideline.

When a dispute arises concerning any scoring play:

- 1. The observer with the best view of the play makes the call. If the observers so choose, they may discuss the play among themselves before rendering a decision.
- 2. All hecklers loudly argue the observer's decision.

History

FLU apparently originated with the "Smoke 'n Gun" Boston-area club team in 1994 at the Hingham tournament. There is evidence that the first player drafted was Jim Parinella.

Several additions were suggested by Josh Faust from Cornell. Meta-fantasy league arose from a comment by a Williams College player. The 1st edition rules were written by David Bailey and Andrew Kirmse at MIT.



Trouser 2000


Chicago, Illinois



Format & Rules

- 1. Pools of four teams playing round robin on the first day. All teams will advance to a single elimination round on the second day against teams with similar records. Example; teams with a 3 0 record play each other, 2 1 play each other and so forth.
- 2. Four players on the field per team. The game starts with both teams lining up on opposite goal line, pulling the disc with an inverted throw (hammer, blade, etc.). The stall count is six seconds. Teams can score either one or two points. One point can be score when the disc is thrown from the playing field and the receiver catches the disc in the attacking endzone. Or two points can be scored when a player throws the disc from one endzone and the receiver catches the disc in the opposite endzone.
- 3. Matches are the best two out of three, 6 point games. Games are played straight to six points. Each team is allowed one time out per game and may not carry the time out to the next game. The team that wins the previous game will pull from the side they scored on in the next game. There will be a 1 hour time limit per match.
- 4. Each field has perimeter lines (similar to Beach Volleyball lines). The lines are considered in bounds. The goal line is an imaginary line stretching between the cones on each side. The goal line is considered part of the endzone. The field will be marked with 8 cones. The brick (imaginary) mark is 5 steps up from the goal line.


