WELGO-ME



Welcome to the 2003 UPA Club Championships and congratulations to the teams and players who qualified for this prestigious event. As the culmination of the UPA Club Championship Series, this is the grand finale of the largest series of Ultimate tournaments in the world (close to 600 teams and over 10,000 players). Having made it to this stage is no small accomplishment, and we hope the experience is worth all the time and effort it took to get here.

So what should you expect at this year's tournament? It is after all the qualifier for U.S. teams going to the 2004

WFDF World Championships in Finland. In the open division there is as much parity as there has ever been at the top. U.S. teams will be looking to knock off the reigning UPA champs from Vancouver, while also competing to be the top U.S. finisher. In the women's division, Lady Godiva looks to continue their stranglehold on the UPA championship. They won their 7th in 8 years in 2002 (by one point), extending the longest-running dynasty in UPA history. Can they make it 8 of 9? Hang Time and Donner Party have dominated the mixed division for the last year. Both teams have their eye on Worlds, but the mixed division changes a lot from year to year, so you never know which teams will step up. Speaking of Worlds, teams and players have come out of the woodwork in the masters division this year, almost definitely inspired by hopes of a shot at Finland. Perennial masters powers KWA, Old and in the Way, and OLD SAG will be challenged by former open division powers from San Diego, Miami, and elsewhere.

What else will be going on? With the backing of VC Ultimate, Bodhisattva Films will be on hand to capture the excitement of the event. They will be producing videos/DVDs of the finals and a "lifestyle" video documenting the 2003 competition, teams, players, and the culture of our sport. Look for it to be available this winter.

Check out the schedule of activities in the program to find out where and when non-game activities are taking place. Everything is pretty much happening at the beautiful field site, so stick around after games and enjoy the atmosphere and the company. Please be respectful of the site, site rules, and other people's property.

Because of the time change last week, we don't have as much light, but we've kept the first day start times at 9:30 a.m. to help with the impact of travel. The final three days will start at 9:00 a.m. so we can be sure to get games in before dark. Don't get confused about start times!

Finally, be sure to let the tournament staff (red tournament shirts and UPA staff shirts) know if you need anything, and be sure to thank them for their efforts. Play hard, play with spirit, and good luck. See you on the fields!





- No Glass!!!!! This is important. We're at a national class polo facility. Some of these
 horses are worth more than your homes. If you are found on the fields with a glass
 container, you will be told to leave the Polo Club for the duration of the tournament.
- No Dogs! Leave your dogs at home. They can spook the horses, which could cause
 us to lose our privileges at the Polo Club.

COMPETITION-RULES

- . All games (except finals) to 15, win by two, cap at 17. Finals to 17/19.
- · Halftime is 10 minutes.
- · Each team has two timeouts per half.
- Regardless of how many timeouts a team has used before overtime, during overtime each team has one timeout.
- Overtime: A game is in overtime if tied at one point less than original game total, and the winning score
 will exceed said game total. (e.g., in a game to 15 goals, overtime occurs when the score reaches 14-14
 and the minimum winning score is determined to be 16.)
- Time-cap goes on at end of round time on schedule. Add two points to higher score after first score after time-cap. Play to that total. No more win by two.
- . The time-cap does not affect timeouts,

Placement Game Rules (5-8 and 9-16 on Saturday)

For games that could affect the strength wildcard:

- If a game will determine a strength wildcard, or leads to a game that might determine a strength wildcard, it must be played. If a team still chooses to forfeit such a game, that team's region/division will not be eligible for any nationals' wildcards the following year (size, strength, growth), unless given a specific exception by the National Division Director.
- Special case: In the first round of the 5-8 bracket, if there are exactly two teams in contention for a strength wildcard, those teams will play each other in that first round regardless of the originally scheduled match-ups.

For games that do not affect the strength wildcard:

- If neither team wants to play a scheduled game that leads to another round (i.e. semis for the 5th, 9th, 13th brackets): Those two teams finish tied for the placement of the lower portion of their bracket and the other game is now for two higher spots. (e.g. In a 9-12 semifinal game, the two forfeiting teams would be tied for 11th and the other semifinal would become the game for 9/10.)
- If neither team wants to play a scheduled game that does not lead to another round: Both teams will finish tied for the higher placement, since they went out at the same time.
- If only one team wants to play a scheduled game that leads to another round (e.g. semis for the 5th, 9th, 13th brackets): The forfeiting team will finish at the bottom of its respective bracket (i.e. 8th, 12th or 16th).
- If only one team wants to play a scheduled game that does not lead to another round: The game will be treated as a loss for the forfeiting team and a win for the other team, with final placement reflecting that outcome.

INFORMATION TRAINERS, MEDICAL, MASSAGE

Athletic Trainers - Will be available 1.5 hours prior to the start of play through the end of the day to tape and provide advice and injury assessments.

Loosen up those sore muscles after a day and a half of Ultimate. Students from the Florida College of Natural Health will be giving massages to tournament participants and spectators on Friday (and possibly Saturday) between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Look for the massage table near the medical tent. Massages are free of charge, and students are not allowed to collect compensation. So be sure to thank them for their help.

SPIRITAWARDS

Ultimate has traditionally relied upon a spirit of sportsmanship which places the responsibility for fair play on the player himself. Highly competitive play is encouraged, but never at the expense of the bond of mutual respect between players, adherence to the agreed-upon rules of the game, or the basic joy of play.

- UPA 10th Edition Rules of Ultimate

TEAM AWARDS - Following every game, each team will be asked to rate its opponent on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being the rating for the highest level of sportsmanship. These ratings will be averaged and the team in each division with the highest rating will be awarded the Team Spirit Award after their division's finals.

INDIVIDUAL AWARDS - Teams will be each be asked to nominate a player from their own team who they feel displays the highest level of spirit. The definition of spirit is up to each team, but should include elements of sportsmanship, leadership, perseverance, fire, etc. Choose the person whose attitude you wish other people on your team would emulate and who other players off your team admire. Individual spirit winners will receive a medal and donated merchandise from Chasing Plastic Magazine.

PETER FARRICKER SPIRIT OF THE GAME AWARD - The spirit award in the open division is called the Farricker Spirit Award, named for Peter Farricker, a player who embodied Spirit of the Game to those who knew him and those who played with or against him. This award is given to a player in the open division of the UPA's Championship Series adjudged to have exhibited personal responsibility, integrity, and fairness combined with a high standard of playing ability. Each qualifying open team nominates one player from their own team as the person who best represents the Spirit of the Game. At the open championship, each nominee is honored with a disc, pin or set of Mardi Gras beads. Our hope is that the people wearing the Mardi Gras beads will be connected to Pete, each other and the Spirit of the Game, and become role models for their teammates and opponents. A selection committee watches the open semis and selects one of the four semifinal nominees as the winner. The award will be presented before the open finals. Last year's winner was Moses Rifkin of DoG.

OZONE
