



Although ultimate is only 22 years old, there are currently over 50.000 individuals playing in over 25 countries throughout the world. Guts, the grand-daddy at all disc sports, is over thirty years old and is enjoying a revival so interest.

We would like to thank our hosts, the Norske Frisbee disc Forbund and Tournament Director Eirik Pettersen and his staff for their hard work in organizing this most memorable event.

Comment: Ultimate is a team sport in which the team with the higher point total at the end of the game wins. It is played with 2 teams of 7 players on a rectangular field with an endzone at each end. A goal, worth 1 point, is scored when a player/thrower passes the disc to a teammate and it is successfully caught within the confines of the endzone his team is attacking. The disc may be advanced solely by passing the disc from one player to another. A player may not run while in possession of the disc. While the team in possession of the disc seeks to advance the disc toward the endzone it is attacking, the opposing team seeks to thwart advancement and obtain possession by forcing a turnover. A turnor results whenever a pass is incomplete, caught or knocked down by an opposing player, touch a ground at any point or is caught by a player out-of-bounds. No overt contact or tackling is allowed. The sport is played on a self-officiated basis, with no referees. All line violation, possession and foul calls are made by the players on the playing field.

GUTS

Comment: Guts is a sport played between 2 teams of 1 to 5 players each. The objective is to be the first team to score 21 points. To start play, each team lines up facing each other 14 meters apart. Play is accomplished by a player attempting to throw the disc toward or at the opposing team and within the reach of at least 1 player of that team, in such a manner that the opposing team cannot make a clean catch. Scoring is contingent on the success or failure of the throwing team. A good throw, without a catch, results in a point for the throwing team and a bad throw results in a point for the receiving team.

The PLAYDISC journalist saw the match, and elected it to the most entertaining game on tuesday. It was a match filled with excitement, adrenaline and GUTS.


Even with Canadiens self-confidence and quotations like "There is nothing I cant stop", they couldent stop the swedich machine.

Ultimate was invented in 1968 by students at Columbia High School in Maplewood, NJ, USA who sought to combine the fun of playing frisbee with the challenge of conventional competitive sports. From its modest beginning in a high school parking lot the sport spread to other local high schools. CHS graduates later introduced the game to their respective colleges and universities. The first intercollegiate competition was held in 1972 between Princeton and Rutgers, on the 103rd anniversary and on the exact site of the first intercollegiate American football game.

By 1975, approximately 25 teams had been organized and the first college championship was held. The sport continued to spread, with many highly competitive club teams forming as college players graduated. The first U.S. national championship was held in 1977; the Ultimate Players Association (UPA) was formed in 1979 to organize, promote and direct the sport of Ultimate. It was the period of the late seventies and early eighties that the first European teams started. The World Flying Disc Federation (WFDF) was formed in 1985 to oversee all international disc sports and provide a forum for communication.

The first world championship was held in Gothenburg, Sweden in 1983. Subsequent championships have been held in 1984 in Lucerne, Switzerland, in 1986 in Colchester, England and in 1988 in Leuven, Belgium. This year in Oslo, there are over 650 competitors from thirteen countries in four divisions: open, women, masters and juniors. Ultimate is played currently in over twenty-five countries in six continents on a competitive basis. It is estimated that over 50,000 enthusiasts on 3,000 teams actively participate in Ultimate.







PROTEST DECISION EXPLAINED

by Robert L. "Nob" Rauch Chairman, Tournament Rules Group

By now all of you know of the protest filed by the Finnish team after the conclusion of their 14-15 loss to Sweden on Wednesday. I will outline in this short article the facts of what happened and the reasons for the decision to replay the game Thursday morning.

The Tournament Rules Group (TRG)

The WFDF Statutes stipulate that a TRG be designated at each tournament to adjudicate issues relating to the rules, protests, etc. This group is comprised of three members: a representative of the WFDF Rules Committee, the tournament staff and the players. The TRG at this tournament is me, Ola Torp and Rock Searle of W. Germany, respectively.

Finland's protest was based on its feeling that it had been incorrectly assessed a point at the start of its game.

It had been determined at the captain's meeting that one point would be awarded to the opposing team for each minute a team was late in starting its game. In the game in question, the scorekeeper states that Sweden was on the line perhaps two minutes late, whereas Finland broke from its huddle and was on the line perhaps three minutes late (one minute after the Swedes)

No specific warning was given to the Finnish captain that a point was about to assessed. Rather, the game began with Finland scoring the first point, and then looking up at the scorecard to see the score posted as 1-1. Finland immediately questioned the decision and a long discussion ensued. Sweden did not agree to erase the point assessed and Finland decided to play the game under protest. The TRG was not informed of the protest until after the game.

Sweden won the game, which was subject to the time cap, 15-14.

#### Decision

After the game, the Finnish captain offered a compromise to the Swedes in order to avoid a conflict. Finland was willing to concede victory to Sweden, if the Swedes would agree to naider the point differential of the game to be zero. den did not agree to this offer.

Before the formal meeting, both teams were again asked to work out the matter between themselves. After twenty minutes of discussion, the TRG was asked to formally consider the protest. Both teams presented their case and were excused as the TRG discussed the situation for 30 minutes.

The TRG voted 2 for, 0 against and 1 abstention to uphold the protest. I abstained from voting due to the possibility of a conflict of interest. We presented several options to the teams for consideration and required them to choose an alternative acceptable to both teams. It was decided that a game to 15, cap at 15, no time cap, game starting at 8:30 am on Thursday was the proper way to resolve the matter.

The TRG's decision was based on several factors. It appears that inadequate warning was given to the Finnish team. Although the official had informally mentioned that the game was about to start late, no formal announcement or warning was given to the Finnish captain.

Next, I wish the captains had decided to take responsibility for the situation themselves. The game should not have been played without a resolution of the issue. One can understand why the Swedes did not wish to give up a point which they had been awarded by the official, with an interpretation of the rules which was possibly technically correct. Yet one also can bring up spirit of the game issues and question why it was felt necessary to stick to the letter of the rule instead of the spirit of the rule (i.e. to get the game started as close to on time as possible to avoid time caps). It is ironic that the argument over the assessed point caused the game to end twenty minutes into the next scheduled round.

st, it was unfortunate that the game had to be replayed.

Le tournament schedule is already rigorous enough. Despite
this drawback, it was agreed by both teams that it was the
only fair way to resolve the issue.

The TRG has several recommendations after reviewing this

- There is a reluctance in Europe to use observers because it is felt that it detracts from the primacy of the players on field. In the same way, players and captains should also accept responsibility for off-field issues and not turn so easily to a third party arbitrator.
- 2. The principle of the "spirit of the game" only works because players are willing to follow not only the technical aspects of the rules but to interpret them in such a way as to follow the spirit of what they are trying to accomplish. This should cover both on- and off-field behavior.
- 3. One of the major reasons for issues arising this week stems from the lack of a comprehensive "protocol" manual, which outlines the tournament rules governing off-field issues. The WFDF Ultimate Committee will prepare such standards as soon as possible so that it can be disseminated' before tournaments to players and officials so that everyone can be certain of the rules.
- 4. Finally, we must better balance the organizational demands of standards set with the realities of staffing levels, experience, infrastructure and financial constraints. By making tournaments more complicated to run, we are increasing the possibilities for problems and making it more difficult for the events to be run in the players' best interests.
