## Spectacle of colour and energy




19 nations together in Heilbronn's Discraft Arena

Last night saw the WJUC fly into action with a spectacular opening ceremony. Excitement in and around the stadium built up fast with impressive chanting and cheering from all nations and in the build up Columbia probably just edged it in the noise and colour stakes. To start the ceremony the 19 competing nations all entered the main stadium, majestically lead by an excited Australia equipped with the ubiquitous inflatable Kangaroo. Atmosphere within the stadium built and built as Rue Veitl, the stadium announcer, namechecked the national teams one by one. We were next treated to a song from Irma Goehring who beautifully sang „We are the World“. Next up was an official welcome from the mayor of Heilbronn Margarete Krug who was delighted to see so many athletes in the town all enjoying Ultimate the sport she described as „A jewel in the crown“ for its competitive edge but mainly for the spirit of fair play that epitomises the sport. A second speech was heard from the president of German Ultimate Volker Schlechter who was excited for the tournament and expressed many thanks to everyone for helping to organise and stage this spectacle. A speech was then

heard from the President of the World Flying Disk Federation, Mr Johnathan Potts, whose speech expressed thanks to tournament organisers, helpers and players and how he thought „that this tournament would produce the best under 20 Ultimate seen in the world!“ He also talked of his work in Turkey and how vital younger aged ultimate players are for the sport to grow even stronger. To close his speech he officially declared the WJUC open, which was met with huge roars of excitement from the players and crowd. The finale was another crowd pleasing sing-a-long from Irma Goehring that really did „get the party started“. Lets hope the fun, colour and excitement of the opening ceremony permeates throughout the tournament.

# Germany dominates opener

The tournament starts with the buzz of a helicopter engine as it delivers the game disc amid a haze of black, red and gold smoke and aerial stunts. The colour theme continues as the German team remove their caps for the national anthem to reveal the same black, red and gold haircuts. The match itself is one that is worthy of opening any Ultimate tournament. Germany are just too good for a battling Austria who concede in just two minutes. Exactly two minutes later Marvin Waldvogel claims his first score and signals his intent to exert his influence on the match. Austria react with the first timeout of the match but this attempt to steady the ship is dealt another blow with the score going to 3-0 in just nine minutes. This pattern unfortunately continues for Austria and within 25 minutes they find themselves trailing 7-0 to a seemingly unstoppable Germany. Two minutes later however and Austria eventually make it onto the scoreboard through Matthias Neubauer and four minutes later it is 7-2 as Daniel Winkler

imposes himself on the game. However not to be outdone, Germany claim two more and with a catch from Michael Beuttenmuller taking the score to 9-2, it is half time.

The second half starts with Austria looking and playing in a much more relaxed manner and within a minute of the restart they pull the score back to 9-3 with a catch from Stefan Ziffer-Domitzhuber. This brings a quick response from Germany who bag three more in quick succession only for Austria to do exactly the same with some superb play following a turnover and a massive D from Austria's number 81 Michael Gaisl. Germany respond with a blond double act as captain fantastic Marvin Waldvogel throws to Friedger Freytag to make the score 14-6. Near the end Austria take the game to 16-9 with a hammer but not to be outdone Germany finish with a hammer of their own to nail down the coffin lid on any Austrian comeback and the game ends 17-9.



## Match reports

### Focus on Junior Open A

The first match of the day on pitch 1 sees one of the tournament favourites team USA get off to a great start with a 17-4 victory over Belgium. USA started with a first minute score and despite an early injury to number 4 Matt Barnes they dominated the game. First half highlights included a full length layout Callaghan by number 5 Elliot Erickson to take the score to 6-3. Belgium got off to a great start in the second half and number 69 Tom Dewilde scored with a great layout from a hammer pass from Wannes Kestens to briefly bring the scoring gap down to five but a superbly efficient USA played with great patience and determination which Belgium eventually had no answer to.

The second match involves Great Britain and Colombia. In this match GB get off to a great start with a lay-out score. After

this the two teams trade points back and forth to reach 6 - 6. There are a lot of contested calls but the game atmosphere is still good and the match is still being played with spirit. The Colombians manage to score next and go into half time leading the Brits 7-6. The sun arrives during the break and seems to lift GB who equalise quickly after the restart.

Lots of noise and emotion from the fans and players accompany the game which steadily sees the score grow to 12-12 with neither team managing to pull away. With the hard cap set at 13 the vital point is contested a few times as GB come close to ending the match but eventually they get the job done and score the vital point to win 13-12.

**Focus on Junior Women A**

The first match of the day in this pool sees Japan take on one of the tournament favourites Canada. Japan unfortunately get off to a bad start with an early injury to number 26 Takaishi Sakura. This proves to be a bad omen for the team and they trail 1-9 at half time.

Canada are very dominant in defence, containing Japan's short handling game and forcing early turnovers and this strategy proved equally effective in both the first and second half.

In this reporter's opinion the outstanding player for Canada is number 42 Helen Thompson who made many good D blocks allowing quick transition to O. For me, the best point of the game involves a going away hammer on the break side from number 22 Erica Tucker to number 16 Adriana Roe. Canadian dominance is reflected in the final score which reads Japan 2-17 Canada.

**Junior Women B**

Lots of noise from both teams signals the beginning of the Australia v Sweden game and pool B in the junior womens competition.

Early in the game it is apparent that these two teams are very evenly matched and lots of long plays and good D's back this up. Sweden pick up a lead and manage to hold this until half time despite a dominant display from number 13 Cat Phillips on O and D for the Aussies. The half ends 9-6 to Sweden.

What ever is said at half time to the Australian team seems to do the trick though and they battle their way to 10-10. Cat Phillips again is proving her worth completely shutting down the Swedish hucks, and this helps the Aussies to the lead for the first time in the game at 11-10. Sweden however manage to respond and get ahead to finish the game with a disc into the corner for a solid 15-13 win.

**Focus on Junior Open B**

Whilst taking in the Junior Women A match between Canada and Japan on field 4 your roving reporter also keeps an eye on the Open pool B match on field 3 between Canada and Latvia. Whilst not as comprehensive a victory as their female counterparts, Canada still run out comfortable victors with a scoreline of Canada 17-7 Latvia. In this reporter's opinion the big difference between the teams is that Latvia whilst clearly tall, fit, athletic and hardworking, struggled with their long game. Latvia can however take positives from this match as the general consensus of opinion is that the Latvian number 18 Igors Minoys was one of the standout players and even the Canadian team agreed that his „sweet layout“ was the best point of the match. However it would be remiss of me if I did not mention Canada's outstanding player number 47 Ryan Kremsater who contributed massively to a Canadian victory.



## More than merchandise

Many of you may have seen the 5 Ultimate tent as you have wandered the tournament village so we thought we would stick our journalistic noses in the tent to find out a bit about them.

5 Ultimate is a family company founded in 2006 by 5 siblings, Zahlen, Xtehn, Vehro, Rohre and Qxhna Titcombe. They provide lots of Ultimate gear; discs, kit bags, game wear and casual wear. Qxhna and Vehro are here in Heilbronn and are really enjoying the experience of the World Junior Championships. 5 Ultimate are mainly an American based company but have 20-30% of their business outside of the States and would like to try and establish themselves more in Europe. This is only their second large European Tournament, the first being the World Club

Championships in Prague in July. Vehro is a player for Emerald City Ultimate based in Seattle and is happy that everyone here has such a positive reaction to their merchandise especially the hoodies with tournament logo that have been the best sellers so far. When asked why they chose the Junior World Championships to sponsor Qxhna replies, "Juniors are the future of the sport", and Vehro echoes this saying that they feel that Juniors are an important market and modern, edgy designs appeal to younger players. But he also believes that 5 are a professional brand as well as trying to bring a new flavour to the sport. ## Match reports

### Focus on Junior Women B (Top Game)

The USA v Sweden match starts and in less time than it takes to unfurl the "stars and stripes" USA are one up and three up in five minutes. It is a blistering start by the US and a shaky one by Sweden but the ship is temporarily steered by Sweden's number 22 My Björnberg-Dillner, who in the opinion of this reporter is at the heart of everything good about Sweden. There is no doubt that Sweden are now pushing the US team hard but this seems to spur team USA onto better and better things. As the US grow in confidence their long game kicks in and there are many telling hucks. This is one of the best person to person defensive performances I have seen from the women's game so far and I can count the number of throwaway passes on one hand. As the scores rack up, the names Hannah Yee (2), Natalie DePalma (1) and Anna Reid (3) appear on the stat sheets with increasing regularity. The half time score 9-2. Just before the restart a chant goes up from the US team, "Obama, Obama, Obama." I wonder if this is a secret play signal or just a chant in praise of the President. Following some intense research

a source "close to the president" reveals that "there are no Republicans in Ultimate." Mystery solved. The second half continues to follow the pattern of the first with some great D, some huge hucks and some really hard work, especially from Sally Landenfeld (16) and Ellie Shaw (17). The long and tiring game against Latvia earlier in the day may be starting to tell in the legs of the Swedish girls but their heads refuse to go down under intense US pressure but it is eventually all too much for Sweden and the game finishes 17-3. Despite the gulf in the scoreline the spirit between the teams was excellent both during and after the match.

### Focus on Junior Open A

Japan V GB

The third match of the day out on pitch 3 saw Japan take on Great Britain in Junior Women Pool B. The first score in the match went to Japan followed by another within 5 minutes. The disc was turned over numerous times in the next 10 minutes until eventually Japan broke through to make it 3-0 and another Japan attack produced another score to take it to 4-0. Great Britain showed some strong determination and fought back well narrowing the gap between the teams all the time, the toughest

point lasted 20 minutes! Japan were the eventual winners 12-8 but only after a strong fight back from the British resulting in a nail biting end to possibly one of the longest games in the tournament so far.

### Focus on Junior Open B

Cheerful chanting and loud singing from both Italy and Colombia signal the start of the pool B match on Field 4. Early on it is clear to see the teams are very evenly matched both for pace and height. Before the first point is scored there are turnovers, timeouts and some massive D's. Eventually Italy score the first point of the game. It continues to be tight and increasingly competitive with Colombia drawing level 6 minutes after the first point. The closeness of the game is reflected in the number of fouls called and contested decisions. This pattern continues all the way to half time as Colombia head into the break with a narrow 7-6 lead. After half time Colombia manage to grasp the game by the scruff of the neck and stretch out a 13-8 lead. Italy fight back well to close the gap to 3 with some great defence and equally impressive offence but a determined Colombia manage to win the game 17-10.





## Ouch!

Ultimate may be a non contact sport but our competition is really keeping the local German health service busy. Sprained ankles and knees, cuts, bruises and blisters have been the most common injuries along with the odd broken toe, suspected concussion and bruised rib. This all seemed to come to a head on Wednesday when ten people were taken to hospital or medical centre and at one point there were three ambulances outside the stadium at the same time.

Your resident newshounds made a bee line for the first aid tent to get some answers and you may be surprised to read what we found out. First of all there are fewer Ultimate injuries than in other sports such as football or handball. The first aid team were busy but reasonably laid back about the injury list and in fact their view is that it is just part of sport.

According to Robin Mueller from the tournament office there have not really been that many injuries but as tiredness sets in and athletes find it harder to concentrate there will be more incidents.



## Match reports

### Focus on EFDF Open (Top Game)

#### Germany v Great Britain

This show game has a great atmosphere from the outset and it is not damped by the weather. The first point is a long time coming but with the help of some massive D, team GB break the deadlock only for Germany to respond immediately. Defences feature largely here and a GB lead is cancelled out with a great German hammer. The home team support is as vocal as the GB supporters and the chants and points are swapped in equal measure but at half time Germany sneak into a 6-5 lead. The second half starts with a double goose fly by over the stadium, was this pre planned by the organisers? Today Heilbronn tomorrow paté? But back to the nail biting action. GB draw level, Germany take the lead again. A massive huck from Simo Low (13) to Will Allen (94) takes the game to 7-8. As the end of game time approaches Germany bring it back to 8-8 so the game is to 10. Both teams give their all but to the disappointment of the home fans GB grind out a victory, final score 8-10.

### Focus on Junior Open A

#### Germany v Belgium

Just to make things a little different this time,

your roving reporter decides to get a fan perspective on this game. Today I interview Lukas Kleinjohann aged 13, a Germany fan and Ultimate player for Muggeseggele Heilbronn. Lukas tells me that at first the game is very even. The first point goes to Germany, then Belgium and both teams swap scores. "At first I thought oh my God, Germany will lose because Belgium played stronger than I thought". He also tells me that, "There were some beautiful points from both Germany and Belgium". It is a very tight match and there are a number of contested decisions but in the end Lukas is a very happy boy because his precious Germany finish the game winning 17-11.

#### Ireland v Austria

Pitch 3 is the venue for Ireland v Austria. The Irish are very pumped up for the game after passionate singing of the Irish national anthem and the game starts with extreme pace and excitement shown by the players. The first half begins with the two teams very evenly matched. Austria get on the scoreboard first but Ireland respond quickly to draw level. Austria take the lead again and force some fantastic D from Ireland who continue to hammer away at the Austrian end zone with no reward. The Irish offence is as good as their defense and a spectacular Callaghan inspires the team even more. However, Austria weather the Irish storm and come out on top comfortable 17-6 winners.

#### Finland v Belgium

The rain may have scared away the spectators in this Pool A game but both teams certainly turned up for this match. Right from the start both teams are very competitive with the Finns leading 2-1 before a magnificent layout score, sliding along the wet ground levels it for the Belgians. Points continue to be traded back and forth, most of these coming from long plays due to the driving rain. At half time Belgium nose ahead leading 8-7. In the first point of the second half, the lead is extended with a score from a hammer but Finland score quickly after to reduce the deficit to one again. This half is as close as the first with very little to separate them. With five minutes to go the score is 14-10 to Belgium but by the time cap the score has changed to 15-12. With the hard cap set at 17 the Finns start their fight back and manage to score three points before the Belgians reach the cap with the final score at 17-15 to Belgium.





## FFabulous FFINDR FFacts!

This week your intrepid journalists have managed to track down the owner and creator of FFindr Christian Jennewein to find out a bit about the organisation that has supported our tournament here in Heilbronn. Christian has since May been on a sabbatical from his job as a web programmer and interaction designer for Mappy, a mapping solution company in Paris, France to allow him to put as much time as possible into FFindr.

#### What is the idea behind FFindr?

FFindr is a free online resource that helps finding any kind of Frisbee-related information. To achieve this, the website is collaborative, meaning that everybody is invited to add and/or update information. Next to a pretty complete Ultimate Frisbee tournament listing for each and every country, you have a listing of Frisbee teams, players and links. Furthermore FFindr aims to become the ultimate one-stop solution for organising and managing Frisbee tournaments and events online. The website allows a quick and easy to set-up Frisbee tournament online registration, thus taking care of quite a troublesome task from tournament directors.

#### What was the role of FFINDR at WJUC 2010 in Heilbronn?

FFindr took care of the whole registration process. I am not sure if all players are aware of the work-load of their team representatives, but somehow all that player data had to be transferred to Mark and his organisation team. FFindr provided therefore a state-of-the-art interface, allowing for quick data submission and modification. It also calculated the cost per team depending

on the selected accomodation/meal options, plus it allowed for the automatic generation of the tournament ID cards.

#### What do players and teams get out of FFINDR?

As the players should be aware, they all have a profile page on FFindr. Normally they received an automated confirmation mail to access this page and to



add or modify information. This page is meant to be an online Frisbee ID that can be re-used for future tournament registrations, meaning that all the personal data does not need to get entered again. In addition, player profiles get over the time a sort of history, with the tournaments and the teams they played. FFindr is evolving fast, so expect more things to come in the near future.

#### How is FFINDR financed?

Apart from the thinking and programming efforts, FFindr does not cost much. For the last three years I managed to

work on this project during my spare time. This was pretty stressful, I spent countless nights working on the website. One month ago I started a partnership program, people or companies can now buy banners on FFindr. For now I restricted the program to Frisbee companies, hopefully this will continue to work. I would also like to thank NewGames Frisbeeshop for their confidence to be the first to start a partnership with FFindr.

#### What are the plans for the future?

There are many ideas that I would like to implement, first and foremost is to im-

prove the online registration for Frisbee tournaments powered by FFindr. I dream of an online payment for tournament registrations, I am convinced that this would be really helpful for the Frisbee world. There will also be a smartphone version soon, this includes the iPhone. I will also work on an extended API to enable other websites to build on data coming from FFindr. All the rest also depends on YOU, the players of Frisbee, since the users are the by far biggest source of inspiration. Keep on contacting me with your wishlists!

## Si Hill interview

Today your tournament newshounds have tracked down Simon (Si) Hill (38) who is the CEO of UK Ultimate, Chairman of EUF and WFDF committee member and player for Clapham Ultimate in London. We were interested to find out exactly why Si is here. He informed us that as the lead member of UKU part of his role is to help develop a closer understanding of what GB juniors are doing, how UKU can support the juniors, what goes well in the tournament and what lessons can be learned for the future.

Since Si started working with UKU approximately 5 years ago he has seen membership build to the current level of 2500 and in 2009 he became full time.



The latest development in UK Ultimate is the roll out of Ultimate Leaders Course qualifications for school sports teachers. This, along with membership fees and competition profits, helps to ensure that UKU a secure financial base to develop. As Si says „we aim in the future to have more players, more school involvement, more school competitions and in 10 years time a membership of 10,000.“

Si also highlighted the role the World Games has played in raising the profile of Ultimate. „Taiwan 2009 was a great help and in 2013 in Colombia Ultimate will be the stadium showcase sport.“

## Frisbee touches down in Ideas Land

WJUC 2010 is now one of the "365 Landmarks in the Land of Ideas". Since 2006 the 'Germany - Land of Ideas' initiative has teamed up with Deutsche Bank to run the contest. Peter Deissler Tournament director, head honcho and general Mr Fixit has with the help of the guy on the right Mark Kendall Sporting director made this week happen. Without their superb organisation WJUC and EFDF would not have been possible. Behind the scenes Volker Schlechter and Robin Mueller have helped the tournament run smoothly. Thomas Griesbaum presenter of the top game and responsible for WJUC on Twitter and Facebook along with David Kendall have kept everyone tuning in online fully up to date with the tournament progress. Sophie Baillet and Sven Protzer the logistical geniuses who have efficiently organised the schedule and collated all the results as they come in. There has in fact been a small army of around 50 green t-shirted staff members who have helped out by scoring, distributing fruit and water, selling tickets, taking photos and video, collating spirit scores, cleaning up, keeping you informed with your daily tournament newspaper and many more unseen tasks both at the tournament offices and at the school. There has in fact been a United Nations style band of helpers not only from Germany (including the regional federations) but also from Latvia, Czech Republic, Colombia, Australia, France and Scotland.



## May the Spirit be with you!

### The thoughts of Rü Veitl WFDF Ultimate Chairman

"Ultimate has been around now for over 50 years. When Ultimate was invented, one of the main goals of the inventors was to create a sport where the Olympic spirit of "fair-play" would be the basis of the rules. Ultimate has proved since that self refereeing will educate players to act like referees themselves and to take on responsibility.

Currently Ultimate is played by 2 sets of rules: WFDF rules and UPA rules. One main goal of the WFDF rules committee is to converge these two sets into one. The biggest gap for this venture is the different stance of both organizations regarding Observers.


Proponents of Observers claim that they have helped improve the spirit of the game – but I think what they mean is that Observers have helped speed up some games and solve disputes quickly. While I agree that Observers may be good for those purposes for certain games, the question is if the use of Observers will not have negative effect on the future of Spirit of the Game?

The argument against Observers is a

more long term view of our sport. The use of Observers will slowly kill self refereeing as players will more and more rely on the Observer and less and less feel responsible to protect the good spirit that our sport is built on.

The Spirit of the Game promotes that players take on the responsibility of being fair and unbiased while at the same time playing hard. The Spirit of the Game requires us to know the rules and use them in the correct way. The Spirit of the Game requires that you treat your opponents with respect and display a positive attitude. The Spirit of the Game has helped to build strong bonds and friendships between players from different teams and nations.

The fact that our sport is self refereed and that we can play this sport even at World Championship level without external interference is one of the things we can be most proud of when we tell other people about this wonderful sport. Our sport of Ultimate and its entire rule-set is built on the foundation that you can trust your opponent to not intentionally violate the Spirit of fair play. Like in any relationship this trust is the most important factor



and can hold our sport together the way it was invented and intended. This strong bond of trust must not be broken. In the end the players must always remain the ones to finally agree and make the call. Please keep the Spirit of the game alive."



# Match reports

## Focus on Junior Open Pool B

### France v Italy

This is a close game from the start. Both teams are trading points back and forward. It is obvious that both teams want to win and yet the spirit of the game is absolutely outstanding. France are the favourites and although they lose two early scores, they are back level in the 9th minute and in the 10th minute they take the lead. As the half hour mark approaches France stretch their lead to 6-3. However the three point cushion does not last as Italy begin to claw their way back. Despite the high stakes and the ultra competitive nature of this match the spirit continues to be everything it should be in Ultimate and makes this reporter proud to be associated with this sport. France maintain their lead throughout the second half but the 90th minute proves to be the turning point as Italy regain the lead for the first time since the second minute of the match. As regulation time ends the score is 11-12. The next point is played out and the score is 11-13 so the hard cap is set at 15. Nerves are raw, the players are giving their all and yet amazingly there are almost no fouls whatsoever, the score goes to 12-13. Italy still have two timeouts and in my opinion this proves to be crucial. Timeout one is called by Italy and within two minutes it is 12-14. The final timeout is called, the players are still playing with fantastic spirit and determination, neither team deserves to lose but Italy hold their nerve and in the 110th minute they score to take the victory, 12-15, Italy are ecstatic, France are distraught. In my opinion I have just watched the game of the tournament, a sentiment echoed by the scorers Anete and Toms who describe the game perfectly "real Frisbee, great spirit."

I allow the dust to settle and leave it an hour before interviewing the players and coaches. The Italian players are amazingly complimentary of their opponents but single out French number 23 Valentin Gueho for particular praise. The Italian coaches Giacomo,

Davide and Enrico are equally complimentary and heap praise on French number 10 Flavien Leygues.

The French, although emotionally and physically drained, both players and the coach agree that Italian number 34 Bruno Mine deserves special praise, as does number 41 Steven Uthayakumar. The interview with French coach Frederico is my most difficult so far, he is clearly still very upset and although close to tears he says, with typical French philosophy "it is difficult to accept but that is sport." There is no more to be said.

### U17 Open Semi-Finals

The semi-final between Germany and Sweden starts amid huge cheers for both sides, the hosts Germany being cheered for by the locals and the Swedes by the other Swedish teams. This noise seems to motivate the players on both teams, even though the prospect of a final place already has both teams hyped. The teams fight hard for points and neither pull away until the score reaches 6-4 when the Germans seize the initiative and score twice to go into the break leading 8-4. At the start of the second half Sweden's play seems to have kicked up a notch but they struggle to finish moves off. When the Germans hit 13 points this seems

to concentrate Swedish minds and they manage to score 3 unanswered points to raise their score from 8 to 11. Germany then call a time out and whatever is said seems to do the trick as Germany manage to score from a long huck down the sideline to win the game and progress into the final.

As the above action ensues, on the next pitch, Belgium do battle with Great Britain in the other semi-final. So your reporter turns from a boy into a girl in order to allow him/her to multi task and cover both at the same time. To begin with this match starts in the same way as the other, both teams are very evenly matched. Points are traded between teams and strong defence made for interesting watching as both teams pull out all the stops to get their noses into the final and the match stays close into half time as the score reaches 6-5 to GB. In the half time break it is clear to see both sets of coaches trying to motivate their respective teams and whatever the British coaches do, it really hits the spot as they came out all guns blazing. They are extremely strong on defence and very efficient in offense. GB managed to score 9 points in the second half and Belgium just can't manage to break down their defence with the final score at 14-5 to the Brits. This impressive win over a strong side sets up a mouth-watering rematch against Germany in the final, and if the semi-

finals are anything to go by it will be an extremely competitive and entertaining game.

### Colombia v USA Junior Women

This is an eagerly anticipated match between two of the top women's teams. My inside sources tell me that there is a good relationship between the teams and trading between them has already started. Colombia play very physical dump defence and the USA struggle to create openings. It may be a physical match but it is within the spirit and despite the stakes involved very few calls are made. USA are the taller team and have been winning by hucking off the second or third pass so Colombia play a transition zone defence to break up the play and apply hard handler pressure. USA play their best game so far and Colombia respond to this and raise their level too. USA create enough chances to win but the pressure that Colombia apply forces US mistakes. USA are 11-10 up when the match is capped to 13. Colombia remain cool under pressure and according to their coaches Jeremy Norden and Jaime "Idaho" Arambula, the difference in the end is the support the girls get from the very vocal Colombian boys which provides the extra energy they need to take the game 13-12.

### USA v Germany Junior Open

There is a sizeable crowd here at pitch 3 to witness this match and a very noisy atmosphere, lots of locals cheering on Germany and the USA girls, friends and families of the team providing the vocal support for the States. USA score early and keep doing so, Germany try to hang on but they are being blown away by the massive USA defence. Germany are forced to throw long hucks because the US keep shifting the D to restrict the handler and this forces him to keep looking upfield. A hammer takes the score to 5-1 and the half time score is 9-2 following a massive layout from Jordan Taylor (27) from a pass from Casey Bateman (88). Two players of note in the first half for this reporter are Matt Rehader (31) and 17 year old number 37 Amos Adams. Second half evidence of the USA defence pressure includes an end zone stallout. USA are also using their height advantage to great effect however it is one of their smaller players, Jericho Barbour (0) who is the team mascot/talisman and executor of some key plays. Germany appear to have no answer yet there is no doubt in the mind of this reporter that Germany are a great team but they are being made to look somewhat ordinary. Germany to their credit still make some chances but there are a few crucial drops. A

"greatest" back into the end zone for a scoring catch deserves to be the winning point but it takes one more for the USA to secure victory 17-4.

### U17 Girls Final

The main stadium is the setting for the U17 girls final between Germany and Sweden. The noise and support inside the stadium is very loud and adds more excitement to the already hyped up players. The first half begins after renditions of both national anthems with the initial pull being made by Germany. The first chance of the final goes to the Germans whose offensive players make good cuts into position but they are beaten by the strength of the throw. The first point is a long evenly matched point with a number of turnovers, Sweden are the first team on the score sheet and threaten to score again quickly afterwards but the German defence holds strong. Germany seem to get off to a slow start and struggle to reply but eventually they do and this spurs them on to a second score not long after. Germany begin to take control of the game and build up a lead of 6-2, after this score Sweden take a timeout and gather their thoughts and begin a fightback but by half time Germany lead 7-4. For this reporter the outstanding player for Germany so far is Sophie Röttger (42) who is on the O line and every second pass goes through her hands. She also throws some spectacular forehands down the line and long range end zone throws.

The second half begins again with pace and excitement but Germany get on the score sheet first this half with a spectacular throw down the side line from Sophie Röttger (42). 

# The Final Day

## Match reports

### **GBR v GER U 20 OPEN 3rd 4th PLAYOFF**

Field three, in some of the best sunshine we have seen all week, is the venue for the U20 Open 3rd/4th place playoff. There is a fantastic atmosphere round the field with many German fans chanting their loudest and British fans singing the "Chocolate Biscuit" song. After the break it looks like USA will continue to dominate and they score again but in the next play a huge cheer goes up as Australia manage to get themselves onto the score board. USA score next and then the Aussie manage to post their second. This seems to stimulate the Americans who step up their game; they give away very little on O and D and this is a winning formula for the States who take the game 17-2 and finish in 3rd place. After the game both male teams form a tunnel for the playing teams and this I feel is a fitting send off for two great teams who played in excellent spirit.

### **EUF Open Final Germany v Great Britain**

Music fills the air as the crowds begin to gather. There is a slight delay in proceedings as the show pitch is rolled in preparation for this final. This only adds to the tension and excitement. As Robbie Williams blasts out of the PA with "Let me entertain you" everyone hopes this is some kind of signal for the match itself. For the benefit of the less experienced spectators, Thomas the stadium announcer gives a brief outline of the way the game is played and soon the game is underway. It is now 10-10, sudden death and the noise is deafening from up in the announcers box. As the nerves jangle a GB time out is called. The game restarts with more massive D from both teams forcing turnover after turnover. However it is a speculative hammer from Marcel Hartmann to Mo Brucklacher who leaps under pressure to secure the victory for Germany, final score 11-10. This reporter is pleased to inform Mr Williams that we have in-



deed been entertained. Germany are EUF under 17 Champions, well done to the hosts and commiserations to GB who put up a great fight.

### **WFDF Womens Final Canada v Colombia**

There is no time for the dust to settle or for the atmosphere to die down as Colombia and Canada take the field. If this match is to be decided on noise levels then the Colombian fans have this match won already however it is Canada that takes the lead yet it is the Colombians who dance and skip their way back to the line. A "sick" huck from Canadian number 19 Mira Donaldson to a full layout from number 88 Katie Scarth takes it to 2-1 Canada and another layout from Jo-Hannah Yeo makes it 3-1. Not to be outdone Colombia produce a huck of their own to set up a score from Valentina Obregon Valencia (9). The standard of play is outstanding and both teams are matching each other in every department. There are layout passes, layout scores, awesome D's, monster hucks, this game really has it all. ### **WFDF Junior Open Final Canada v USA**

The stadium DJ gets the crowd really revved up, the main stand is full and the terraces around the ground begin to fill up. Once again Robbie Williams wants to entertain us and hopefully so will the North American neighbours, Canada and USA. The States make the better start as signalled by the "pull" which is right to the corner of the Canadian end zone. USA make two textbook scoring plays early on epitomised by the straight up the line 2nd score but a Canadian layout brings it back to one point only for Elliot Erickson to restore the two point gap. A pattern is now developing and Tim Tsang brings it back to 2-3 but with some solid D USA force a turnover and this results in another Elliot Erickson score. Matthew

Rehdar and Simon Montague combine for team USA to take it to 5-2.
