Few first day upsets

The World Ultimate and Guts Championship 2016 is finally under way, with varying levels of success for the home sides. Great Britain's Women matched Canada's energy in the early going, with captain Jenna Thompson showed the watching world what British players are familiar with by bringing fire on defence with a goal-line block while leading on offence with Becci Haigh and Jacky Verralls. After their promising start, the tide turned in Canada's favour and they ran away with the game 15-8 against a disappointed but not disheartened GB. The Men's team made efficient work of their opener against South Africa, winning 15-4. The GB Women's Masters were equally successful with a 15-5 win over the Czech Republic, a score matched by the GB Mixed team against Hong Kong. The tightest game saw the Men's Masters fall to perennial powerhouse Canada, who boasted some of the players from the gold medal team from WUGC 2008 in

Vancouver. GB weren't overawed, though, and had the disc on offence with the scores at 14-13 after they prevented what would have been the winning goal. Unfortunately for them, and for all the home fans, the result went against the Brits, but their promising start nevertheless bodes well for the tournament.

Away from the home sides, there were few upsets, though Switzerland and Lithuania Men's teams notched wins against France and Latvia respectively, while the USA looked about as imperious as everyone expected - across the Men's, Women's and Mixed divisions their teams conceded five points in four games.

Pool play continues today, with each team playing a full schedule after the pagaentry of the opening ceremony truncated yesterday's play. Good luck to all!

Winning in the rain



Spirits not dampened

The heavens opened yesterday morning, and the early games were heavily affected by the downpour. Discs were greasy, the ground was slippery and players confined to the sidelines must have had a pretty miserable time. Despite that, there were some intense and exciting games, including the upset of the tournament so far as the Swiss Women's team defeated the touted Germans on universe point, 15-14.

Men's Masters pool C is worth a mention as well-the Spanish defeated India 11-10 and Singapore 12-10, while Japan defeated Switzerland 14-12. The abundance of close games in that pool suggests it will be very tight for placings but the key game will be Spain facing the Swiss tomorrow morning for second place.

The Guts division is moving along at a quick pace, with every team playing at least four games. The

USA 1 team remains undefeated, the only team to do so, while Japan and the USA 2 team have only one defeat. The home team is faring well, with Great Britain on four wins from six games. They lost to USA 2 in a nail biter, 23-21, but were soundly defeated by USA 1. Still, it's an encouraging start for a team that has never played a competitive Guts championship together and hopefully is a good sign for the medal rounds.

Today is the start of power pools in the Men's and Mixed divisions, as well as Men's Masters. The Women's and Women's Masters will continue with pool play in the absence of power pools, while the Guts division round robin will carry on until Wednesday.

The weather forecast for today is much less damp than yesterday. Enjoy the clouds, they won't drop rain all over you this time!

Power pools begin



High stakes, high excitement

The Mixed and Men's divisions began power pools yesterday as the stakes were raised even higher following the first set of games. There were some huge upsets, none more so than the Czech Mixed defeating the mighty Canada on universe point, 15-14. The Czechs managed a break late in the game and held their nerve on universe, converting a long point to steal the impetus in the group. However, the Philippines then beat the Czechs 15-11 to take top spot from them. The game between the Philippines and Canada tomorrow morning will decide the group and could bring about a three-way tie at the top to decide who takes the top overall seed in the division.

In Men's, Austria scored an upset by defeating Switzerland 14-10, but the Swiss managed to win a tight, intense game against Sweden, 15-14. The most important games in Men's are tomorrow, though, with two tantalising fixtures: Australia face

the United States while Canada face off against Japan. Both games are on the show pitches and will be the main attraction for spectators.

The top four in the Women's division has been set unless something totally unexpected happens - Colombia defeated Australia to join the United States, Canada and Japan in the top four. Those four will almost certainly meet this afternoon to decide the seedings going into quarters.

It's worth mentioning the state of play regarding the United States overall. So far, only one foreign team has defeated the USA in any division - the Japanese, in Guts. They beat USA 2, who then avenged the loss. The other loss was USA 1 defeating USA 2 and I don't think that counts...

On to knockouts



Brackets set in three divisions

Power pools concluded yesterday, and were followed by pre-quarters and crossovers. The final championship brackets are now set in the Men's, Women's and Mixed divisions. The Masters Men's division will have a round of crossover games before quarter-finals, while the Masters Women's divison have one game of power pools left before they go right to semi-finals today.

The Men's division features surprise quarter-finalists Belgium, who will face a typically quick Japanese team. The other teams in the final eight are more predictable, with the USA facing Colombia, GB up against Australia and Canada will face Germany.

The Women's division saw a fantastic game between Japan and Canada featuring lead changes, layout blocks and a fantastic greatest for a goal by Canada. Japan prevailed, though, and will see Australia in the quarter-final today. The Canadians will meet a resurgent Russian side, while unbeaten USA will play Switzerland and Colombia face Germany. The final game should be a great match-up for a spot in semis.

The Mixed division features six of the same teams as the Men's - Colombia, Canada, Japan, GB, Australia and the USA - with the addition of France and the Philippines. France face GB, Canada face Colombia and Australia face Japan, while the Filipinos face the juggernaut American squad.

After today we will know the top four teams in every division other than the Master's Women, where we will know the finalists. The Guts division goes to knockouts as well today, so the stakes are even higher still in every division. Enjoy the games, and stay dry where possible!



Rain stops play



Huge effort to reschedule

The brutal storm that battered London did not spare Hertfordshire. All games were called off first thing in the morning yesterday, and when they resumed at 11.30 only two pitches were playable. Priority was given to the quarter-finals of the Men's, Women's and Mixed divisions.

No strict schedule was drawn up, with teams being placed on whatever pitch was available to get through the games as quickly as possible. Later in the day two more pitches were opened, but another deluge meant that they were rendered unplayable. The rain intensified again, more lightning appeared and games were suspended.

However, the teams elected to resume later on in order to make sure that all semi-finals were set ahead of today.

The Women's quarter-finals went to seed, mostly

emphatically. Canada beat Russia 15-8, Japan beat Australia 15-6 and the USA beat Switzerland 15-4. Colombia defeated Germany 15-12, but in truth the Colombians were comfortable in the second half and their place in the semis was rarely in doubt.

Canada and the USA were untroubled in Mixed (although the Philippines did start off 2-0 against the USA), winning to three and nine respectively. Great Britain fell to France 15-8 in an upset, a game that was stopped after half by the lightning. Australia also managed to hold on despite a furious late run from Japan, winning 15-13.

In Men's, the USA soundly defeated Colombia 15-2, while Canada topped Germany 15-12 and the Japanese beat a game Belgium 15-10. The British Men fell to the Aussies 15-11 to cap a bad day for the host country.



Finals day is here



Only four games left

The fields had recovered somewhat from yesterday, enough for 11 of the pitches to be used and for all quarter and semi-finals to be held. There were also three finals, and some medals placings decided.

In the Guts division, the dominant USA 1 squad beat Japan in the final comprehensively. In something more of a surprise, the first-time Great Britain team managed to defeat USA 2, who had just come out of a thrilling semi-final with Japan, to earn a bronze medal at the first time of asking.

In the Masters Women's division, the USA defeated Canada 15-10 to earn the first gold of the tournament. The Australian team topped Japan in the bronze medal game 14-12 to round out the medals.

The Masters Men's final was another USA vs Canada match-up. It was exactly the same scoreline, the States triumphing 15-10. In the bronze medal game, Great Britain delighted the home fans by defeating Denmark 15-10 with an excellent performance of their own.

The Women's division final has been set; USA beat Canada 15-10 in one semi, while Colombia stunned the favoured Japanese in the other 10-7. Japan could not pick themselves up after the semi-final and Canada secured the bronze medal.

The USA extended their dominance in the Mixed division, defeating France 15-4 in their semi. Australia defeated Canada 15-12 to ensure the two best teams will meet in the final. Canada secured another bronze here, too.

Finally, in Men's Japan managed to beat Australia with a great second half, final score 15-9. The USA were dominant against Canada with a 15-8 win. Both the final and the bronze game will be tomorrow.

This all means that the United States have yet to lose, in any division (other than their second team losing in Guts). It looks very likely that they will run the table, an unprecedented and hugely impressive feat. Only four games left - enjoy finals day!
