Ultimate was invented and had its early growth in North America. Despite these roots, and the ever-increasing popularity of the sport on the home front, Ultimate remains relatively unknown from the perspective of the North American public. One reason for this may be participant inertia, which has often focused on keeping the sport "underground". Another, and perhaps more important one is that all previous World Championships have been held in Europe. Thus, one of the themes we have stressed in promoting this event is that "Ultimate has come home", which has helped to make the demographics of participation and the historical perspective more relevant. In our billets, posters, programs and radio and T.V. ads we have stressed all the other usual themes as well; athleticism, personal responsibility and the sports egalitarian nature among other things. However, our focus has been on the one aspect which we believe essential to the promotion of Ultimate — that it is a fast-moving and exciting sport whose visual impact is difficult to describe. In other words it must be SEEN. Hence our use of slogans (no matter how cliché) such as "You have to see it to believe it!", "You've never seen anything like it!" and "Catch it!" We hope this approach will engender, in both sports writers and the general public, the kind of pride and interest which we as participants have come to have in this game. After all, have you ever known anybody to watch their first high-level competitive Ultimate game who wasn't able to remark; "That's fantastic!"

There are three accommodation facilities which house the players of the World Ultimate Club Championships: University of Toronto's New College, York University's Glendon College, and the Town Inn. All three facilities are accommodating players from a variety of countries, creating cultural mosaics which enhance the experiences provided by this tournament. The University of Toronto's New College is situated on the St. George campus, in downtown Toronto. The facility provides modern rooms and access to many facilities offered by the University. The Athletic Centre is located adjacent to New College, and is available for use at very affordable rates; passes for the Athletic Centre may be obtained at the accommodation check-in desk. Nearby parking for cars is available at a discount for players and inquiries should be made at the accommodation check-in desk. Breakfasts will be served at the dining hall in New College, and **please ensure that upon accommodation check-in, you have obtained the correct type and number of meal tickets.** York University's Glendon College is located in midtown Toronto, in an area known as Bridle Path - the city's most affluent neighborhood. The very attractive surroundings and its ideal location adjacent to the tournament playing fields, make Glendon College a pleasant and very convenient facility to be staying at. As well, for those wishing to see the many sights that Toronto offers, the city's efficient public transit system stops right at the gates to the College. Parking is also available at this location at a moderate cost. Breakfasts will be served in the College's dining hall, and again, please obtain the correct type and number of meal tickets from the check-in desk. The Town Inn is also located in downtown Toronto, two

blocks from the busiest pedestrian intersection in Canada - Yonge St. & Bloor St. The property is largely refurbished and provides recreational facilities, as well as, very reasonably priced guest passes to a nearby weight training facility. Parking is available in its own underground garage, and passes for the week may be purchased at the front desk. The price for parking is reasonable for that area, considering the passes allow in/out privileges. Breakfasts will be served in the dining room of the Town Inn. There are no meal tickets required for breakfast meals; however, staff may ask you to present your tournament identification. At all three locations, your accommodations and breakfasts are paid for during the week of July 21 - 28. Any extra accommodation/meals prior or after that week are the responsibility of each individual. Any bills should be settled directly with the accommodation facility. Other incidentals such as telephone charges, movies, parking, or room service must be paid for by the individual. Whether you are staying at New College, Glendon College, or the Town Inn the facilities are very good at all three, and you, the players, will enjoy your stay with us in Toronto. With similar intentions on your part, we urge you to display common courtesy and respect toward the facilities and further the respect that the sport of Ultimate has achieved.

This has been a most momentous task: To assemble food for over a thousand athletes everyday for dinner, and for the general public. Our meal service boasts organic product and a wide variety of foods. We have gone to every effort to provide the participants and attendees of this event with the highest quality food. Martin's Catering is the purveyor of all the delectable delights that you will sample over the course of the week. His superb staff including Martin Ritins himself, Ali Millar and Nick Parras, as well as a cast of many skilled people assist in this undertaking which has taken over six months to prepare for. In this brief we will give you the meal times and the menus that you will be given under the meal plan. For those of you who did not buy a meal plan we will make every effort to accommodate you at dinner for a cost of \$12.50 per person. Please bear in mind however that the quantities may be subject to limitations and therefore we may be unable to serve some of you if you did not pre-pay. Vegetarian meals are available and those of you who have requested them will be accommodated. Meal times are as follows: For the Pre-Paid meal service dinner will be from 4:30 pm- 8:00 pm everyday with the exception of Wednesday, on which day the General meal service will be available extended hours. Otherwise you're on your own for that day. The menu for the Pre-Paid meal service is as follows:

The servings are generous but only one entree per person is allowed with refills permitted on the accompanying side dishes. Breakfasts for all of you staying at the colleges will be from 7:00 am-11:00 For those of you staying at the Town Inn, due to circumstances beyond our control, breakfast will be a forage on the town. Sorry. The General meal service will provide a large selection of sandwiches, salads, hot and cold beverages and hot BBQ items which will rotate everyday (so you don't get bored). Service will be provided from 11:00 am til 5:30 pm with service being extended at the discretion of the caterer. The cost of the items will be comparable to anything you are likely to find in Toronto and the quality will be superb. So don't miss out, and don't worry about packing a lunch 'cause it will all be there. Beverages will be provided for you to a limited degree out on the field (■■■■■ Springs water and Gatorade). Our beer supplier is Upper Canada breweries, world famous for their all natural ales and lagers. Their quality products will be on tap in the players tent throughout the tournament. Tickets for beer will be vended on site, unfortunately beer sales must end at 4:30 pm with service to the general public ending at 5:30 and service to players and staff ending at 8:30 pm. Enjoy yourselves!

PLAYERS' TENT: The Players' Tent is the main facility for the use of players, coaches and other participants. Use it as a rest area, a place for refreshment, or as a relaxing spot to see some of the demonstration sports and featured games as the week goes on. It is located on the upper area near the Pavilion. **FOOD:** The Players' Tent will be the site of on-site food and drink (alcoholic and non-alcoholic service). All food service for players will be located in the northwest end of the tent. On great advantage of the Players' Tent is the beer patio in front of the tent. This is a great place to see some interesting demonstration sports and some great Ultimate games while enjoying a cold beer. Please remember that areas outside the Players' Tent and the patio area are not licensed and beer cannot be taken out of these areas. **MERCHANDISING:** The merchandising area is located in the south end of the Players' Tent. We will be selling hats, discs, T-shirts, posters, and other items here. The organizing committee will sell tournament items as well as your own team items on a consignment basis (for a fee). This fee will be negotiated with the merchandising manager. **No merchandise may be sold in the playing area.** Also on sale here will be WUCC 91 lottery tickets. You can win an around-the-world trip, a trip anywhere in the world, or a trip to California. It's a great deal and you will be helping to sponsor the tournament with your purchase. **OPEN MICROPHONE AND STAGE:** For those of you who like to sing, dance, play guitar, flip a yo-yo, or otherwise entertain, we have set up an open microphone and stage area. You are welcome to come up at anytime to perform (as long as the audience will put up with you). Have a great time but please be careful with the equipment and be mindful of the other

players who might be waiting to perform. **GARBAGE AND RECYCLING:** Washrooms are located next to the tent and in the Pavilion area for your use. Waste recycling is being done in order to promote an environmentally friendly tournament. **Please recycle all plastic and polystyrene materials (plates, forks, spoons, etc.) in the Players' Tent by using the containers provided.** **PAVILION** The Pavilion is on the upper field area and houses the main organizational and technical facilities of the tournament. Please respect the signs that are posted so that we can assure the proper use of this facility. **MEDIA CENTRE AND ULTIMATE CENTRAL:** The media centre and Ultimate Central are located on the main floor of the Pavilion along with the medical centre. The media centre and UC are for the use only of media and the tournament committee. **MEDICAL CENTRE:** The medical centre is to be used for the treatment of serious injuries. Located next to the Pavilion will be a St. John's Ambulance trailer which will be used for treatment of minor injuries, cuts and scrapes. Both players and the general public will have access to medical facilities as needed. **BAGGAGE CHECK:** A baggage check has been set up in the basement of the Pavilion. You are encouraged to use this area to store all of the bags and personal belongings which you will not need during the day. We have staffed this area with personnel who will ensure that all items are secure. However, we cannot take responsibility for items which you leave in the baggage check. The entrance to this area is clearly marked at the front of the Pavilion. **SHOWERS AND CHANGEROOMS:** Showers and changerooms are available in the Pavilion on a first come, first served basis. That is, if the showers are full when you get there, you will have to

wait your turn. Unfortunately, there are a limited number of showers and changerooms available here so you may wish to return to your accommodations to clean up. **YOU ARE NOT ALLOWED TO WEAR CLEATS OR DIRTY SHOES IN THE PAVILION.** Please respect this so that clean up will not be necessary. **FIELD SERVICES: SHADE TENTS:** Shade tents are located throughout the lower playing area. These tents will be equipped with water and picnic tables. They can be used to rest, watch a game, or just to get away from the sun. **TOILETS FACILITIES:** Portable toilets will be located along the fringes of the lower playing area. These toilets will be cleaned and emptied daily. Please keep them as clean as possible (**LIFT THE TOILET SEAT, GUYS**) and respect the Ultimate Spirit. **RECYCLING:** There will be recycling stations spread throughout the lower playing area. These stations will allow you to recycle most of your materials so please take advantage of them. **FIELDS AND PLAY:** At all 16 fields which will be in use during the tournament, we will have coolers with water and Gatorade. Use these as you need them. Scorers will also be located at the picnic table at each field. This table is for the use of the scorer and tournament officials only. At the same time, **please keep the sidelines near the scorer's table clear** so that they can see the game. The scorers are busy trying to deal with the fast-paced movement of this great game, so give them enough room to do their job. Help them out if you can! Clocks are located on the scoreboards at each field, if you need to know the time.

You have finally arrived and want to know how to get around. When you checked in you were given A Toronto Transit Commission Ride Guide and that's your bible to the public transportation system in Toronto. You should also have received directions to get you from your accommodation to the games site. It takes approximately 40-45 minutes from U of T to get to the entrance at Sunnybrook, and Glendon is a good healthy walk. From the Town Inn allow yourself approximately 40 minutes to get to the fields. So is that all? NO! You'll find below A list of alternate transportation options for your moving pleasure. **TORONTO TRANSIT COMMISSION** Clean, safe and efficient, it's the environmental choice for getting about in Toronto. With 839 miles of service they can get you where you want to go, most times faster than by car. Fares are \$1.30 for a single and you can buy tokens for a discount. **Information: 393 4636**, between 7am and 11.30 pm **TAXI SERVICE** A number of taxi services are available 24 hours a day on the streets. **Fares start at \$2, and go up in 25 cent increments.** If you have A problem involving a Toronto taxi cab call the Metro Licensing Commission at 392 3000. Here are some numbers to call for pickup. **CO-OP CABS 364 7111** **DIAMOND TAXI CABS 368 6868** **METRO CAB 363 5611.** **CAR RENTAL.** What can be said about rentals? They're out there and you can shop around. Most companies have weekend specials and all can be found in the phone book. Towing is common! be careful!!! Don't be afraid to ask any volunteer for any more information you need, they should all be able to help you. We have tried to get everyone moving around Toronto with the greatest of ease. Good luck and remember, have fun at all times.

Here is a little bit of information that may make your stay a little bit easier. **SALES TAX:** There is, as you will no doubt find out very rapidly, numerous taxes on everything. There is a provincial tax of 8% on goods and services purchased for use or consumption in Ontario. There is also a 7% General sales tax on certain items and services. We are all very confused about what deductions are allowed for visitors, so if you want more information call **487 1361 Taxation Canada**. We are certain though that anything you buy that is not a service or a food item you will receive a rebate on the GST portion of tax when you leave the country providing that you have receipts. **VISITOR**

INFORMATION: The Metropolitan Toronto Convention and Visitors Association is the resident authority in goings on about town and can provide you with mountains of pamphlets leaflets and assorted and sundry savings certificates if you want them. Give them a call if you have some free time and just want to look around. **368 9821. MONEY EXCHANGE:** There are many banks that will willingly change your foreign currency for you. The hours vary greatly but are very generally 9:30 am to 4:00 pm everyday except Sunday and most are not open on Saturday with the exception of some Trust companies. Many hotels and restaurants will change American currency but you are not guaranteed the official rate of exchange.

CUSTOMS: Every 30 days U.S. residents are allowed to bring back \$400.00 U.S. duty free there is a 10% tax (8% on Canadian made goods) on any amount over \$1000.00 worth of merchandise providing you have been out of the country for 48 hours. So be wary of going on any shopping sprees while you're here if your American. For our other foreign visitors you can call **Customs and Immigration Canada at**

676 2606. If you are going to drive in Toronto remember that the traffic is very bad during the rush hours which are in some areas almost all day, otherwise approximately 7:30 am til 9:30 am and 4:30 pm til 7:00 pm. As well be aware that parking is scarce and horribly expensive. You may have to pay \$26.00 to park all day in downtown lots. Beware of the Tow Zone signs because the police will tow your car if it is parked illegally.

EMERGENCY: 911 is the number to dial for urgent medical help or for a fire.

HEALTH CARE: For information about health care in Toronto call Community Information Centre of Metro Toronto 392 0505 24hrs. **John Ingle Travel Insurance** also provides travel insurance for visitors to Canada. **961 0666. DISCANADA is 474 0404** and the pavilion at Sunnybrook is unknown at the time of printing but you can find out by dialing 411 and asking for the new listing at Sunnybrook Park

After playing at tournaments where there has been no ice or first aid staff our goal for WUCC was to provide the best on-site medical staff and facilities. To this end we approached Dr. Doug Richards of the University of Toronto Sports Medicine Clinic with the opportunity to oversee the Medical Services. Dr Richards' credentials are impressive as was his proposal for medical coverage. Dr. Richards' medical team consists of Sport Physicians, Registered Physiotherapists SPD II and/or III, Certified Athletic Therapists, Massage Therapists and Therapy Aides. Many of these people are regular staff members at the University of Toronto Sports Medicine Clinic. The Medical Facilities are located on the ground floor of the Pavilion. There will also be sideline coverage of games by Certified Athletic Therapists. We have also obtained the services of the St. John's Ambulance First Aid Brigade which has provided a staff of First Aid Volunteers, Mobile Vehicles and a First Aid Trailer which will be parked in the upper parking lot next to the Pavilion. Without question, this will be the best medical coverage you have been at an Ultimate tournament

MERCHANDISE SALES AT THE EVENT. Welcome to the 1991 World Ultimate Club Championships. We are sure that this will be a very exciting and enjoyable event for all of us, making new friendships and renewing old ones. As always an important part of the event will be the memories and memorabilia that we take home with us. As part of the event there will be merchandising area open to supply tournament sanctioned clothing, discs and other items. This area is located in the main tent and will operate from 12:00 am to 8 pm each day. **An important part of our fund raising activities this year is a lottery,** the draw for which will take place at the end of the tournament. First prize is a trip for two around the world with \$5000 CDN in travelers cheques. Second prize is two airline tickets anywhere in the world with \$2500 CDN spending money. Third prize is two airline tickets to California with \$1500 CDN in spending money. Only 7500 tickets have been printed. Tickets are available in the main merchandising area. Tickets prices are \$20 for one, \$35 for two, \$50 for 3 or \$150 for a book of ten. **We encourage everyone to support the tournament by participating in this lottery.** In addition we are sure that many of you will have items of your own that you wish to offer for sale. The City of Toronto Department of Parks and Recreation requires that you have a vendors permit to sell any goods or services within Sunnybrook Park, (the tournament site). This will make it impossible for any attendees of the tournament to sell items at the site. However we have provided for two ways that you may sell and trade items during the event :1. Consignment sales We sell your goods on your behalf, at the central merchandising area located in the main tent. This merchandising outlet is targeted

primarily at sales to the public. 2. You sell your items at the Fly market to be held Wednesday July 24 at University of Toronto (New College). More information available in schedule of events. The sales policy through us will be as follows :1. Bring the items you wish to sell to the merchandising area at 11:30 am 2. Goods will be received and a receipt issued. 3. Items not sold over the course of the tournament will be returned. 4. At the end of the tournament you will receive payment for items sold. In order to cover our costs for running merchandise sales at the event we will charge a small commission on all sales. Note that we will be setting standard prices for clothing and discs. These prices will be set once we determine the items made available to us for sale. We hope that this will accommodate most attendees of the tournament. For you blues fanatics there's **Alberts hall** 481 Bloor St. W. at Brunswick (964 2242) in the heart of the Annex and usually **Clintons** 693 Bloor W (Christie Subway) (535 1429). They both feature a live band every night. Also in the Annex is **The Dance Cave** and **Lees Palace** 529 Bloor W. (532 7632) which have hard core dance grooves and assorted live bands respectively. A definite winner in the dance department is **The Big Bop** 651 Queen St. W at Bathurst (366 6699) playing dance tunes on three levels 11

from various eras. Also in that same area is **The Claremont** 732 Queen St. W. which has sometimes lewd and crude clientel and heavy DJ's. If you want to check out the Queen W. strip. There's a number of clubs steps from each other at Queen and Spadina: **The**

Horseshoe: C&W types; **The Rivoli:** sometimes heavy trash always ultra-trendy;

The Bamboo: Reggae mon, always groovy, good food too; **Chicagos:** A good old rock & roll bar; **The Black Bull:** Excellent people watching on the patio and rock inside;

The Ultrasound Show Bar above X Rays: Live bands every night with a great room to hear them in. Just west of Spadina on Queen is the Cameron house if you're interested in

some potentially very weird conversation and good bands in the back room. Also W. of Spadina is **The Bovine Sex Club:** A raunchy rock & roll bar with mega TV & huge amounts of sound and light emitting entertainment apparatus. There are lots of other places to go for entertainment, we suggest that you check out **NOW magazine** for what's happening where as they have a very comprehensive entertainment guide. Make sure that you call and find out how much the cover is, at some of these places it can cost \$10 to get in. Avagoodwonmon and remember the subway does not run all night although there are numerous busses which do.

Okay so its Wednesday night you're tired you're hungry and you want a cheap easy to digest meal. Well there is no shortage of restaurants in Toronto. If you crave Chinese food we suggest that you go down to one of the two **China towns**; One is located at Spadina and Dundas and the other at Gerrard and Broadview. Both are easily accessible by TTC. There are also lots of **Vietnamese** restaurants in the same vicinity as the Spadina/Dundas china town area. **Vietnam House** near College on Spadina has great cheap food. For good burgers and fries etc... there's **Licks** at Eglinton and Yonge, Yonge and Dundas and in the Beaches at Queen and Woodbine. Also passable burgers is **Toby's Good Eats** on Yonge near Finch, Bloor and Bay, Church and Wellesley etc... If you want a late night munch there's **Peoples Foods** at Davenport and Dupont and Vesta Lunch at Bathurst and Dupont, not much for atmosphere but both open 24 hours. **C'est What? Cafe** is also on open late at Front and Church. Good Sushi can be had at any of the **Ichiban** locations 668 Bloor W (Chrlistie subway), 108 Yorkville & 971 Eglinton ave W (Eglinton W subway). For Pizza there is the ubiquitous **Pizza Pizza** (967 1111) or if you prefer your Pizza and Italian dining out with a little more style there is any of the **Il Fornello** locations 486 Bloor St W (Spadina subway) 214 King W. 55 Eglinton Ave W. 1218 St Clair ave W & Yonge at St Clair. There is also lots of other Italian food around, not much of 12

It is cheap but alot of it is very good. There's **Porrettas** at Harbord and Spadina and **Marios** on Yonge near Summerhill as well as numerous others. There is an enormous sports bar called **The Sports Cafe** (occasional major line ups) just west of Yonge on St. Clair

where if your lucky you'll get to see that pass you dropped in the endzone on TV replayed to 2 million people. There is an amazing **India town** way out east on Gerrard ave. near Jones ave. for you adventurers, it's well worth the trip. If you'd rather stick closer to home for Indian though there is **Sangam** on Bay near Wellesley and **Le Kashmir** Bloor at Bathurst as well as a smattering of other good ones throughout the city. For an ultra-cheap Sri Lankan meal

(similar to Indian) try **The Savunth** just south of Wellesley east off of Parliament st. Don't blink though or you'll miss it. You will find lots of West Indian and Roti shops around the city. Some are in Kensington Market (worth a trip) and there are lots more on Eglinton W of Eglinton W subway (The **Real Jerk, Raps**) and also on St. Clair W of Bathurst (**Alberts Real Jamaican**). For Greek food you can't really go wrong if you go to Chester subway and walk E. A great place is **Ouzeris** but it's a little more expensive than say, **Mr. Greek**.
