ULTIMATE


Precis som det låter; det ultimata spelet. En lagidrott där spelarna själva dömer. Man spelar helt enkelt **utan domare**. Många är de som har undrat hur detta kan gå till. De flesta är ju vana vid att det finns en domare som blåser i pipan eller på annat sätt markerar när någon har överskridit reglerna. I ultimate är det kutym att visa respekt för motståndarlaget och att spela efter reglerna.

Planen består av tre delar. Ett spelområde som är 65 x 35 meter och två målområden som vardera är 22 x 35 meter. Totalt utgör detta en plan med måtten 109 x 35 meter.

Varje lag innehåller sju spelare och ett fritt antal avbytare. Det gäller för anfallande lag att passa frisbeen inom laget, detta utan att frisbeen går i backen. Den spelare som har frisbeen får inte springa utan måste försöka hitta en medspelare som har sprungit sig fri. Mål görs genom att en medspelare befinner sig i motståndarlagets målområde och tar emot en passning.

Ultimate ställer stora krav på spelaren; koncentration, spänst, snabbhet och respekt för motståndaren inte att förglömma.

GUTS

Här ställs stora krav på koncentration, uthållighet, kast och fångst. Som namnet antyder; det krävs guts för att spela guts!


Två lag med vardera 5 spelare. Lagen står uppställda på en linje 14 meter från varandra. Spelarna ska stå bredvid varandra så att de kan vidröra medspelarnas fingertoppar.

Det gäller för det kastande laget att kasta så hårt och svårt att det mottagande laget inte kan ta emot frisbeen med en hand. I över 100 km/h kommer frisbeen farande och då gäller det att hålla koncentrationen på topp för att hinna med. Även när matchen har pågått i två timmar! Matcherna spelas nämligen inte på tid utan bäst av tre set till 21 poäng. Ett poäng för varje lyckat kast. X X X X X 14 meter

SVENSKA FRISBEEFÖRBUNDET

Redan 1974 bildades Svenska Frisbeeförbundet, SFF. Men det gick ytterligare 9 år innan svensk frisbee blev ett av medlemsförbunden i det så viktiga Riksidrottsförbundet 1983. Idag är SFF ett förbund på frammarsch, och med många discipliner på sin repertoar gör sig frisbee passande för alla. Den stora delen kanske ändå finns inom motionsklassen. Alla har väl någon gång kastat frisbee mest på lek, på badstranden eller i en närbelagd park. Kastat och kastat och försökt sig på allehanda trick.

WETTERN FRISBEE DISC CLUB många år. Naturligt med tanke på den föreningstäthet som finns där och med dagens IT-samhälle är det lätt att kommunicera med RF som ligger i Stockholm. På kansliet administreras först och främst tävlingsformerna av frisbee. Men det är också hit som såväl nybörjare som elit kan vända sig med blandade frågor.

VM 1996 är det största svenska arrangemanget genom tiderna, 800 spelare från 20 länder. SFF har valt att lägga det stora arbetet på Wettern Frisbee med full insyn i hur arbetet fortskrider.



Föreningen bildades 1978. Till en början var det mest de individuella grenarna som dominerade. Men i början av 80-talet intog guts en central roll, och 1986 kunde det svenska gutslandslaget visa upp 4 spelare från WFDC. Sverige vann guld och många anser att det var ett av de bättre landslag som medverkat vid ett VM. Med en laggren följer nästa, och nu kom ultimaten in och det med stormsteg. Det började bäst på juniorsidan där pojkarna vann JSM inom- och utomhus 1989. 1995 hade pojkarna vuxit upp till män och det var dags att vinna SM-guld inomhus.

Men det är inte bara på lagsidan det har

varit framgångar, även på den individuella sidan finns det duktiga spelare. Då först och främst i frisbeegolf. I Wettern Frisbee finns det spelare som befinner sig bland de främsta i Sverige. För övrigt har Jönköping en av de bättre frisbeegolfbanorna, Knektaparken, med stora utmaningar i en naturskön park invid Rocksjön.

WFDC har axlat en tung roll i och med arrangörsskapet av VM i Ultimate & Guts. Men med stor erfarenhet av tävlingar genom åren, samarbetet med SFF och en positiv kommun i ryggen ska arrangemanget ros i land.







Vad händer var?

Rosenlunds Idrottsplats är vanligtvis arenan för fotboll, men nu ska det spelas Ultimate och Guts. Två laggrenar som har en sak gemensamt, spelet sker **utan domare**, mer om grenarna kan Du läsa på sidan 4 och 5 i programmet.

Mellan 9 och 10 planer (35 x 109 m) finns uppkritade, allt inne på området. Entrén är där den brukar vara. Problem med att hitta rätt ska Du inte behöva ha. Spelfält, restaurangtält, försäljning, nationsflaggor, frisbee och samtal på diverse språk leder Dig på rätt spår.

Parkering finns i anslutning till spelplanerna, med den lokala busstrafiken tar du dig nästan ända fram. Finalerna avgörs lördagen den 17 augusti på Stadsparksvallen, en arena värdig ett VM. En heldag utlovas för Dig som publik. Endast de bästa landslagen finns på plats.

Förutom ultimate och guts av världsklass bjuds spelare och publik på massor av underhållning och förströelse. Internationell stämning, mat för alla smakinriktningar och augusti brukar ju bjuda på bra väder. Lägg till detta en idrott där spelarna själva dömer, men likväl fylld av intensitet och spänning.

Redan lördag kväll den 10 augusti komer första smakprovet; invigning och kvällsmatch. Många trötta spelare på plats efter resor från "all over the world" och kvällen blir säkert tidig.

Söndagen är dagen då själva turneringen börjar. Redan klockan 08.30 är det avkast och sedan pågår det matcher hela dagen. De sista matcherna är klara ca 21.00. Och så ser det ut i stort sett hela veckan t.o.m torsdag. Fredagen ägnas åt semifinaler och finaler för masters och guts. Gutsfinalen kommer att spelas på Vätterstranden, strandsport? Döm själva.

På söndag kväll kommer en kongress att anordnas för delegater från de olika länderna, där man bl.a kommer att besluta vem som ska arrangera VM 1998.

Jönköping har mycket att bjuda på, alla deltagare är försedda med busskort för att kunna ta sig till och från spelplanerna. Så hör du japanska på bussen så kan du räkna med att du har ett japanskt landslag i närheten. Vi ska försöka visa Huskvarna och Jönköping från sin bästa sida, där Rosenlundsbadet är en del av utbudet. Måndag kväll anordnas ett poolparty för alla spelare i äventyrsdelen.

"Trading Night" är för alla frisbeespelare ett känt begrepp. Detta äger rum på tisdag afton då det byts och säljs frisbees, T-shirts och annat med anknytning till frisbeesporten. Gör ett besök!

På onsdag kväll är det disco på Gruvan, som då även är öppet för allmänheten, räkna med mycket folk. På torsdag blir det lite av vilokväll. Då får Racketcentrum och Scandic stå för aktiviteterna. Beachparty fredag kväll på Strand Ute, extra stort är det utlovat, ett helt träd ska utsmyckas med frisbees om du har svårt att hitta rätt. Alla är hjärtligt välkomna!

Avslutning på lördag med finaler på Stadsparksvallen. Bankett i Folkets Park lördag kväll och vi kommer att hålla öppet för allmänheten framåt kvällen.

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Tusen Ting

Allt har sin början långt tillbaka i tiden, så även frisbee. Om vi börjar med ordet "frisbee" som för de flesta är benämningen på en flygande plastskiva som används på badstränderna. Ordet härstammar så långt tillbaka som från 900-talet i Europa. Då med beteckningen "friser" för det folkslag som bebodde delar av områdena kring Rhens och Ems mynningar. Friserna var kända som ett flitigt handelsfolk och förmedelade varor mellan de brittiska öarna, Norden och övriga Europa. Efterleden -bi, kom sig av det nordiska namnet för by, ett ord som danska vikingar förde med sig under sin invasion av de brittiska öarna. Geografiskt kan man härleda ordet till byn Frisebi (nuvarande Frisby-on-the-wreake) belägen väster om Melton Mowbry.

En engelsk släkt utvandrade till Connecticut i Nordamerika omkring 1635, Frisby var släktnamnet, och vi är snart framme i moderna tider. William Russel Frisbie var grundaren av Frisbie Pie Company 1895 och det var där som första gången frisbeen såg dagens ljus.

Det var 1948 som innovatören Fred Morrison såg studenterna vid bageriet kasta tomma pajformar under lunchtid. Han tog med sig några pajformar till Californien och tillverkade den första frisbeen i plast. Han uppfattade även ordet Frisbie som Frisbee och därav dagens stavning. Allt från en gammal bosättning i England. Frisbee har alltså tusenåriga anor, och hur många visste det?

Frisbeen tillverkades under många år av ett företag i USA med namnet Wham-O. Idag har rättigheterna sålts till Mattel Sports, där också den kända Barbie dockan kommer ifrån! Men det finns också andra tillverkare som ligger bakom utvecklingen av frisbees. Discraft och Innova-Champion är två av de ledande. I USA säljs det fler frisbees än fotbollar, basketbollar och basebollar tillsammans!

Guts spelades redan 1954, då på Dartmouth University. Det dröjde knappt 15 år innan ultimate spelades för första gången, 1968 på Columbia High School i New Jersey. Sedan dess har utvecklingen gått fort. Första permanenta golfbanan för frisbee anlades 1975 i Oak Grove, Pasadena, USA.

Ultimate och frisbeegolf är de två dominanta disciplinerna, gäller över hela världen. Bara i Sverige finns idag ett 40-tal golfbanor, dit vem som helst kan komma och pröva på. Golfen har i stort sett samma regler som långgolf, skillnaden ligger i redskapet och golfhålet. I frisbeegolf är det ett s.k kedjehål, en metallställning bestående av kedjor och en korg.

Längd, kasta så långt som möjligt, rekordet är idag 200,01 m. 1978 var det 135,32 m. Fristil är den gren som många har sett i samband med uppvisningar. Två eller tre personer utför ett program till musik med en eller fler frisbees med så svåra trick som möjligt. Fler grenar finns och under VM-veckan kan du få mer information.

Det finns många "kändisar" som har ett förflutet som frisbeespelare. Annika Sörenstam spelade ultimate vid SM i början på 90-talet. Stakka Boo tillbringar gärna tid på Kärsöns frisbeegolfbana om tid finnes. Frisbee passar för alla!

Många av dagens förbund bildades på 70-talet, bl.a Sverige 1974. 1983 blev Svenska Frisbeeförbundet upptagna i RFs idrottsfamilj. Ett erkännande av vår idrott som har gjort arbetet lättare. Med VM i Jönköping tror svensk frisbee på en ljus framtid. Kanske blir det just du som tar kontakt med en frisbeeförening nästa gång?

Sverige har en stabil grund att stå på. Med tidigare guld i såväl ultimate som guts är Sverige en het aspirant till de främre medaljplatserna.

1983, när det första VM:et arrangerades, även det i Sverige, vann det svenska landslaget i guts. Gutslandslaget har sedan dess ytterligare två VM-guld. Men se upp för Taiwan och Japan, lag som kommer långväga, men siktet är definitivt inställt på guld.

I ultimate spelas det i flera divisioner. Juniorer, damer, open och master. Speciellt på juniorsidan har Sverige lyckats. Senast det begav sig var 1994 då det blev guld. Det svenska openlandslaget vann i Japan 1992, i England 1994 blev det en silverplats efter en tät final mot USA. Damerna kom på femte plats 1994, men 1992 i Japan gick det bättre; silver. Svenska mastrar har inte medverkat tidigare i VM-sammanhang.

Det är också ultimate som drar flest spelare till Sverige i augusti. Ca 50 lag totalt lär det bli när anmälningstiden har gått ut.

Frisbee finns utbrett över hela världen. Till Jönköping kommer representanter från USA, Kanada, Japan, Taiwan, Australien, i stort sett hela Europa och ev. även Lettland. Flest utövare finns i USA, landet där allt startade.

Frisbee är än så länge en relativt ung idrott och utvecklingen går fort. Medlemsantalet ökar och fler och fler länder får nationella förbund. Sverige lägger ner mycket arbete för att assistera nya länder.

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

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



Except from the good zone defence, Germany played really well from time to time. Short and easy passes which were finished with a nice goal. They also showed us that it doesn't hurt to make a dive!

WOMENS

Finland – Germany

The strength of the German team seems to be their great lust to play. They are hot in defence and they fight hard to win the disc back. This makes them a fun team to watch.

Get an extra look at number 20, Helga, who is strong and fast and who does lovely defence-dives. On the other hand, the ladies of team Finland have a really impressive throwing-technique. Time and time again they managed to pass through the zone-defence of the Germans with fast, hard and precise forehands. The staff of the Discoverer thinks that it was this difference in throwing-skills that finally made the Finish ladies winners of the game. Helga agrees, and tells the Discoverer that she and her team-mates didn't handle the wind as well as the Finish team. The Finish coach, Martin Glantz, says that their strength above all is that the players know each other well. That has become a fact after several trainingcamps together.

USA – Netherlands

The US team Lady Godiva started out convincing and played a simple and winning ultimate. The Netherlands fought hard against the zone-defence and swinged back and forth, sometimes for an extremely long time. The Netherlands has many strong and experienced players. However they weren't a threat to the American women.

MASTERS

Great Britain won their first match against Germany. The very tight match finished dramatically with the score 19-18 after the time had run out. In their second match the opponent was Switzerland, who did their best for the day but Great Britain was the better team and won the game with 18-5.

Sweden started really well against Japan and were in the lead by 11-1. Much thanks to their good zone defence in the strong side wind. It looked like they have played together for several years.

Japan made some good attacks towards the Swedish end zone but nevertheless Sweden won with 21-4.

DINGOS To SurPRISE

Even though their best ever finish is seventh from Colechester, 1994, this years line-up looks more than promising. Simon Wood, one of the coaches, told Discoverer that the ambition is at least fourth place.

In the windy game against Switzerland the Australians showed some of the spirit that might bring them to the semifinals. With key-players Stu Marcoon and Sam Howard they were simply too good. The game ended in a 21-11 victory, and more established teams should be aware of their improvement.

I asked Jouke, the captain of the Netherland's junior team, how old the girls in his team are: – They are born from 79-81, but the girls who are here are here to learn, for to take a place in the women's team in the future.

I also asked a girl in the Netherland's junior team what she thought about a Junior-girls division. And her answer was: – I think it would be good for the sport, especially the women's side. The question is: – Is the sport ready for a Junior girls division?




MASTERS GREATEST

The very much confused Swedish captain, Pål Robocop, said after the loss against Canada: "If we would have had 11 players like Thomas Brolin in the team...it would have been a soccergame, and that would have been totally wrong."

For the Canadian team it was enough with one Dante, nr 86. He scored the last point, made a beauitiful so called "greatest" (catch the disc when you are in the air, outside the side-line, throw back in and a team-player catches the disc on the field), and tried to calm down his team-mates when Sweden picked points. Canada was the strongest team from the beginning, but when Sweden managed to score with a nice long bomb, they got new energy and put up a zonedefence. This disturbed the Canadian play.

However when Sweden finally had evened the score, the Canadian players fought hard and well in the defence and they won with 18-15. It must also be mentioned that the Swedish audience did a great job cheering on their favourite team.



JUNIOR MATCH

Today it was **the Netherlands** turn to challenge the **U.S.A.**'s junior team but it was not an easy task. The Netherlands made too many easy mistakes. Sometimes they fooled around with the American zone-defence, but it always ended in an easy mistake. The American team took advantage of the Netherland's mistakes and scored. The game ended 19-2.

Finland owned the game against Switzerland. They had much better flow in their game and made no simple mistakes. The Swiss were better in the air but they missed several of the catches and casts. It's really fun to see when Switzerland play because they give 100% even when their opponents have a ten point lead.

The most exiting game today was Sweden against Germany. The Germans started with two fast points in a couple of minutes. The two goals resulted from the bad Swedish defencezone but then Sweden took a time out and started to play ultimate.

Two of the best players in the Sweden team were Jonas Westberg (Challe) and Andreas Magnusson (Magnum). Challe made a very nice dive goal that resulted in four-four. Magnum made four assists and one goal in the match and Sweden could leave the field as winners, 19-14.



OPEN

The Monday morning match between Australia and Canada was critical for both teams' medal hopes. Canada, defending its bronze medal from two years ago, had looked sloppy at times in its 19-14 victory against Great Britain on Sunday, while Australia was off to a strong start, shutting out Switzerland. Canada continued to make more turnovers than they would have liked, but managed to defeat the hard running Aussies 17-11.

Shining in Canada's three wins thus far have been Minko Poblete (#96) and Andrew Lugsdin (#9). For Australia, Chris Burwell (#88) and Doug Burgeson (#99) have stood out on a very well balanced team.

It's great to see a match with high tension and energy in a world championship. And it's even better when a tight match is clean and fair.

Germany against England was a display of ultimate-attitude at it's best. Both teams were committed to the job, and still the game remained in a good spirit.

Germany eventually beat England by 21-18. Alex Klötzer was the man to break the English defence with lovely passing. But the game had two winning teams. Both England and Germany showed the spirit that sometimes is rare in ultimate today.

FIRST EVer WIN FOR THE CZECHS

A historic moment occurred today at Field 5 when The Czech Republic won against France. It was their first ever victory in a world championship and we at the Discoverer congratulate the Czechs.

Since the "Velvet Revolution" when ultimate was introduced in former Czechoslovakia things have happened fast. Co-founder and player Jaromir Slama told the Discoverer about the progress: "It was in 1990 or 1991 when American tourists brought ultimate frisbee to Prague. At the same time a university started a team, and eventually a national federation was born. Today the federation consists of eight teams and two of them are from Prague. And we recently started our own league". But one of the problems the Czech face is playing better teams. It is expensive to go abroad so they need financial help to travel. For the World Championships the government supported the teams. Jaromir also want to thank Dutch, German and Austrian teams for their help. The victory yesterday was special to the team. They competed in England, 1992 and France, 1994. Jaromir says: "We beat Spain in '94, but their team wasn't that good. So we consider this our first ever win! We didn't expect this so we are very happy about the win!"

Jaromir continues about the future of Czech ultimate: "We recruit more and more players all the time. We also have a program for schools, and we recently developed a video tape and a frisbee with an ultimate-rules print. I think the future is very good in the Czech Republic".

RULES CONFLICT SPOILS THE GAME

After the game between Sweden and USA yesterday, a discussion about the rules interpretations was risen. During the game the Swedish team put up a stack when reaching the end-zone. Running through, tight around or very close to the stack, the following defender often collided with another player. The US-team made many pick-calls, and the atmosphere was a bit tense. "Westy" in



the US-team told the Discoverer that the players of the US got confused and didn't know if the Swedish women ran the way they did purposely or if it was their way of playing. On the other hand the Swedish women didn't know if the USA called pick all those times seriously and honestly, or if they did it for a tactic reason, to disturb the Swedish play.

The problem is that both teams/nationalities have made different interpretations of the rules, which isn't strange, as the rule-book isn't very clear in the matter. The official rule-book of 1996 says; §404.14 "Every player (...) is entitled to occupy any position on the field not occupied by any opposing player, provided that he does not cause personal contact in taking such a position." And further; "No player may establish a position, or move in such a manner, so as to obstruct the movement of any player on the opposing team." As I see it, the big problem is that the concept is possible to interpret, and that the teams

seem to have difficulties solving the problems when they appear. The solution should be a clear statement in the issue from higher authorities, and an effort from us all to try to remember that the spirit of the game has to win.

It was however a fun game to watch. The Americans play really well together. They play fast, there is always movement and their timing is perfect. They don't risk loosing the disc with long and difficult passes, because there is always one player to play in a distance no longer than six-seven meters. The Swedes use long passes and thanks to their great throwing-skills they often succeed. The Swedish women are also in a great shape, and one of their tactics seems to be running the others tired.

The game finished with a score of 19-14, and with this rule conflict sorted out, the next meeting between these two teams (maybe it will be in this years finals) will be a dynamic one.

In the final round of open pool B, **Sweden** played **Germany** for the championship of the pool. Most players and fans expected this game to be an easy win for Sweden, but with the score 15-15, Germany had a chance for the big upset.

Sweden stopped Germany's hopes by scoring the next three points, and took the game, and pool B, 21-17. Germany's star player Thomas Maierhofer (#19) was one reason the game was so close; Maierhofer scored three goals and threw five assists. Another reason why the game was so close was that Anders Jerhamre (#9) did not play for Sweden, and Namer Younan (#1) only played the first half, throwing four assists and scoring a goal. Fredrick Folin (#20) was the star, scoring six goals, while Lars Botvidsson (#4) scored four goals for Sweden. Sweden wins pool B, going 6-0, and is in great position for a spot in Saturday's final.

At the start of yesterday, open teams **Finland** and **Japan** were tied for second in pool A with just one loss. The match was scheduled for 9am, and the Finns put on a show for those fans who came to the fields so early. Japan put up a good fight for the first 10 points, but with the score tied 5-5, Finland exploded to take the half 11-6. Japan made a couple of charges in the second half, but Finland's 21-16 victory was never in doubt.

Finland was led by Toni Asikainen (#15) and Tuomo Jalovaara (#8) who are two of the open division's best offensive players. Asikainen threw for 6 assists and scored 2 goals, while Jalovaara caught five goals, including the game winner. Tomi Bruns (#16) and Matti Suurnäkki (#22) were also outstanding with four assists each. With the victory, Finland is in great shape for a spot in one of the medal games, while Japan will probably have to win three cross-overs in the next two days for a chance at the bronze medal.

The #1 seed USA faced Canada in the first round of cross-overs in the open division. The battle of North America was hot, with the US winning 21-13.

Canada played very well in the first half, and led the game 8-6 behind some great plays by Jeff Cruickshank (#19) and Andrew Lugsdin (#9). The US team scored the last five goals of the first half, with Bob Lobel (#7) involved in three of those five goals. Canada started the second half strong, and tied the score at 12-12. But with Lugsdin on the sideline with a shoulder injury for much of the second half, Canada's offense couldn't break the US traps and zones. The US scored 9 of the last 10 points.

Billy Rodriguez (#19) continued his great tournament, scoring four goals and assisting on four. Jim Parinella (#88) also scored four and got four assists against Canada.

The US is now 8-0, while Canada falls to 4-3 and cannot afford another loss.



But no close calls could stop Taiwan. They simply were the better, more consistent, and psyched team.



We also discussed a lot of topics about this tournament. Players made suggestions about ways of making things better on the field including easier access to water and ice for those sore legs. Peter Lundmark, TD for WUGC '96, has said he will make sure this will happen as soon as possible. There were also discussions about setting standards for food, accommodation and medical facilities. The major criticism was to do with changes in the schedule and the way these were communicated to players (who isn't reading The Discoverer) so extra efforts will be made to let vou know.

The general feeling though was that this was an excellent tournament that had met the needs of most players for most of the time. We all felt we had learnt a lot and will include players views in the upcoming Tournament Directors Manual that will set quality standards for all future events.

JUNIORS MEDAL


The bronze medal game pitted the USA, who lost in the semi-final against Germany in a really tight game, against
