WOMEN'S FOCUS

Barbarella Returns takes the Cooler Classic by storm and turns their sights on Worlds!



The Australian Women's National Team warmed up for World's with an undefeated romp through the 10-team field at the Cooler Classic in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The newsletter staff caught up to team members, Fee Macrae and Alanna White lounging in the shade after their 17-9 tourney victory over Chicago's Backwater River Bitches.

The thirteen member team, lead by captain Jackie Potter, was selected from a pool of twenty-nine applicants at the Australian Women's National Tournament in Sydney. Women's Ultimate in Australia hasn't grown to the size to support club teams, so teams form on a tournament basis. Six teams, including one from New Zealand, played at Nationals. The team for World's was chosen by a three person selection committee who scouted applicants at the National tournament.

Seeded eighth in the Women's Division, the spirited Australian team is looking forward to a competitive tournament and to proving the seeding committee wrong. Look for highly charged

games against arch rivals, Holland and England who have defeated the Aussies in close matches at past World's. Both Macrae and White have played in past World's and enjoy the spirit of the *Great Ultimate Get Together*. "Worlds is great," says Macrae. "Ultimate is such a great game. It's (World's) like a big family reunion."

According to Macrae and White, Australia is fielding a young team, with only four of the players coming in with past playing experience in World's. States Macrae, "I'm looking forward to seeing the team in 2000. It will by shit hot." Watch out Women's Division, if the Aussies don't get you this year they promise to be formidable at the millenium.

MASTERS FOCUS

The Netherlands Masters team enters the 1998 Worlds with roster deep in World's playing experience. Thirteen of the seventeen players have played in past Worlds in the Open Division. Leaving that division to younger legs and the recklessness of youth, they take their game savvy and experience into the Master's Division. Two years ago at Worlds, the Dutch played a tight game against the US and look forward to avenging that defeat at this year's tournament.

Ten-year veteran, Peter Pols, playing at the Master's level for the first time, took time out from a pre-World's cookout to explain the Dutch selection process to newsletter staff. Responding to a call for players put out in the national paper in the Netherlands, thirty interested players began attending practices. After a period of time, the players created a "junta" by voting for the five players each felt should absolutely, positively play in World's. Those top five then selected the remainder of the seventeen man team. Pols tied for the fifth spot with another player and in a demonstration of Spirit of the Game gave his spot to the other player. "I knew that he would like it very much to arrange something, so I said, 'Well, you do it.' "

The team has been practicing together for the past six months and have played the Harbor Tournament and a smaller beach tournament together in preparation for World's. They have been perfecting an offense stolen from American and German teams. Mums the word on their strategy, but they like their chances in this week's pool play.

The Dutch Masters especially look forward to games against Canada and the United States. "Those are the big names. I saw two years ago the finals of Master's, the Netherlands against the U.S.A. and it was a hard game for both teams. I'm looking forward to it." Dressed in eye-catching orange uniforms, so chosen because orange is the top color on the Dutch flag, this Master's team arrives in Minnesota with their eye on great competition and great parties. "What I remember from two years ago was the party. And from four years ago was also the parties," reminisced Pol. "It is so important." No argument here.

Columbia enters their second World Championships with a variety of celebrations and cheers, a high level of corporate sponsorship, and a Minnesotan amongst their ranks. Their trademark, according to captain, Alvaro Ramirez, is that they play with all their heart. "We put all our hearts into each goal, each good move. It will be like a complete celebration for us. The Columbian players, we put all our hearts in the game."

The Columbian team name, Budare, is an indigenous word for a disc shaped plate used to make a tortilla like bread. With over \$12,000 (US currency) in corporate sponsorship, the Columbians are one of the most highly funded teams at World's. The award for most appropriately named sponsor goes to the Columbian fried chicken restaurant chain, Frisby. Funding also came from Café de Columbia, Frutino, and the University of Los Andes.

The majority of Budare are players from the University of Los Andes in Bogota, Columbia. According to Ramirez, there are 200-300 Ultimate players in Bogota, and 8-10 intramural teams at the University. The University club team was formed five years ago when Minnesotan, Cory Tyler was a foreign exchange student in Columbia and taught a bunch of disc throwing University students the formal game of Ultimate. "I think it's an awesome sport. It's so fluid," enthused Ramirez. They play teams from other Columbian schools and South American countries including Venezuela, Brazil, and Argentina. The idea of going to World's formed six months ago. The best players in terms of skills, conditioning, and most important, enthusiasm, were selected for the Columbian team. "We have been looking forward to this tournament. We have been very exited and nervous."

Arriving in the Twin Cities with a young team of twelve players, the Columbians are here to soak up any and every bit of Ultimate knowledge, strategy, theory, and technique possible. "[We want] to see how is the sport all around the world played. To get more experience with the game, to improve ourselves, to have a good time, of course." Besides facing new teams and styles of play, the Columbians will be playing a tournament in cleats for the first time. The use of any type of cleat or spike in games in Columbia is forbidden.

Proudly attired in brightly colored jerseys of yellow, blue, and red, the colors of the Columbian flag, the young Budare team comes to Worlds to play with spirit, heart, and uh.....cleats.

The Future of Ultimate lies in the Junior Division with a focus on the USA Juniors Team

The team is accompanied by a three person coaching staff. Field coach Tina Booth, started an ultimate team seven years ago at Amherst High School in Massachusetts. At that time so few junior teams existed that the high school team had to play colleges. Amherst now boasts both girls and boys junior varsity teams. UPA National Juniors Director David "Mo" Moscoe and Michael Baccariana, coach at Paideia, a strong Atlanta area high school squad, round the coaching staff.





COED FOCUS

Ultimate gains an international division specifically for mixed-gender play By Joey Gray

This year the World Flying Disc Federation introduced the coed division for it's international-level debut, with women and men from Austria, Brazil, Canada, Germany, Mexico and the US playing mixing it up for 3:4 play. Congratulations to members of WFDF's first coed division teams!

The addition of the Coed Division is an exciting development for the Sport of Ultimate and for WFDF. Mixed gender play has gained an outlet to evolve towards similar strategic and competitive levels as in Open & Women's games. And the new division allows countries with too few men or women players to attend Worlds for the first time, helping to grow the sport and to meet international benchmarks for recognition.

The coed division was first showcased at the 1997 World Club Ultimate Championships in Vancouver, BC, between the Master's and Women's finals. Men and women exhibition players from Canada, Japan, New Zealand and the US named themselves "Schwakeye" and "Double Virgins" (after Open and Women's division finalists Schwa, Sockeye, Double Happiness and Women on the Verge), demonstrating the potential of 3:4 play before a crowd of 5000.

The Sport of Ultimate allows mixed gender play as well or better than any other team field sport due to our rules, including non-contact and Spirit of the Game. Highly athletic play among a wide range of player speeds and heights is facilitated by the nature of field movement in Ultimate as well as by the technical aspects of throwing a disc. But most players simply say, "It is fun!" Perhaps for this reason, coed Ultimate has exploded at the grass-roots level, with leagues in some cities reaching over 100 teams.

Just as Ultimate is gaining recognition as a sport, Coed is gaining recognition as a division. If you look at all the branches of Ultimate, from the grass roots to the elite, from the masters to the juniors, and all the variations of gender ratios, the sport is huge and only getting huger. By joining together in our obsession

for whatever type of Ultimate we play, this point will only become more and more apparent, both to the fledgling institutions that support Ultimate and to the outside world.

Coed Ultimate creates an athletic venue for men and women to compete as equally valued teammates at the highest level of athleticism, as in life. But coed players have a long way to go before reaching the strategic and competitive levels attained in the Open and Women's divisions - may our current and future WFDF coed players start us off in that direction with ultimate spirit, fun and grace.

Open: Canada (10-1) vs Japan (7-4)



A sign of the deepening pool of Ultimate playing talent worldwide is new teams in the World Championship finals. Third and fourth seeds, Canada and Japan, defeated World Finals regulars, USA and Sweden, in Friday's semi-final action. Both games were well-attended and emotional, hard fought contests. The Japanese Open team entered the week of play with the goal of reaching the finals. In a tight, point-trading match against Sweden the Japanese prevailed 19-18 in the time-cap to reach that goal. Said captain, Kazu Hideaki, "Our goal was to go to finals. We have reached that goal. Now there is no pressure."

Across the way, the Canadians were outscoring the USA National Team for the second time in the tournament. Now they look toward facing a very quick Japanese squad. The Canadians beat them in pool play, but team captain, Andrew Lugsdin believes he will be facing a very different Japanese team. "We beat them in pool play, but the game was meaningless in terms of standings, so I don't think either team came out showing everything it had so we expect a much more competitive game out of them. They're a quick team and great break force throwers. I'd like to see us use our deep game and I think we'll do a lot of forcing them one direction to contain their quickness because they do a lot of back and forth across the field which ends up getting us kind of confused because our long legs have trouble keeping up with their short quick legs."

The two teams bring contrasting styles into the final. The Canadians prefer to use their height and team speed to play a longer, deep game whereas the Japanese play a shorter game utilizing shorter, quicker passes. For that reason, Lugsdin sees windy conditions favoring the Japanese. "We have a strong wind team. I think the wind may play into the favor of their game a little bit more than it does to ours. Because of our height and team speed we like to use a deep and back under game a lot an if it's windy that takes that game away from us a bit. The play much closer to the disc, a lot of shorter, quicker passes which are less affected by the wind."



One could call it a sort of bookend experience. Whether or not the bookends match will be determined today. On the first day of the World's Tournament, the US defeated Japan 17-10 in somewhat windy conditions. In the opinion of US player, Judy Layzer, if the conditions had been calm the game would have been closer. "They don't make unforced errors, so the wind is what hurt them more than us, I think." Now, on the last day of the tournament, the teams meet up again for the World Championship of Women's Ultimate. The Japanese definitely have the respect of the American players. "They have amazing skills. They're very fast and accurate and they catch everything," Japan's team manager, Mami Tezuka, noted the US players for height as well as speed. "They are so tall."

Layzer cautioned against viewing height difference as an advantage. "It should be, but there are as many disadvantages as there are advantages. It helps their underneath game, it ought to help our deep game. But they're fast, they jump, and they read the disc well, so, it's not as much of an advantage as it might appear to be. It's tough to match up against them because they're much smaller than we are and quick, so it's not a particularly ideal match-up physically.

Back to that wind thing. The weather report calls for rain showers and winds of 5-15 miles per hour. Neither team seems very concerned. Layzer: "Bad weather would probably help us. We're very good in adverse conditions." Tezuka: "Bad weather would be fine. We need a little bit of wind." Bring it on Mother Nature, your disc playing daughters are waiting.





On Thursday, Canada defeated the US 16-6. The US took the loss as a sign that something needed to change. Part of that was their attitude. "There's almost a built-in arrogance to American teams in Ultimate frisbee that's being changed with the advent of good teams from Canada, Sweden, and Japan," said player Stu Downs. "Canada thrashed us a bit more thoroughly than we expected so we've had to make a bunch of adjustments...; set up plays, work on our speed, take things a bit more seriously. They're a tall team, they have good speed, they are not a selfish team - they give the frisbee to the open person, they work their butts off on 'D'. They demand that you beat them person to person."

The Canadians enter the final in fine form after a week of learning to play well as a team. With players from all across the country, in the estimation of player, Mike Kaweski, the team has gelled extremely well. "Across our team we have solid disc skills. We have inside outs both sides, half of our team can put it up long. We're not weak in our throwing skills. If we just tune ourselves up we'll be ready to 'D' against them." Kaweski cites the US strengths as being deep in tournament experience, strong handling skills, and experience countering a variety of defensive strategies. But the Canadians are confident in their own abilities, "We match up real well. We've got an edge in height. We feel we can run with them as well.

Juniors: Sweden (9-2) vs USA (11-0)



The tough Swedish team battled long and hard against the Canadian Juniors, finally prevailing in a time-capped semifinal game. All that hard work earns them a finals berth against the undefeated USA Junior squad who were attentively watching to see which of the two teams they would face. US field coach, Tiina Booth, views the Swedes as a deep team with strong disc skills. She sees conditioning and freshness as a key to victory in today's final. "We will be running them as hard as we can because this semifinal game is really going to take a lot out of them." Her counterpart on the Swedish coaching side, Kenneth Amscrom also sees hard play as the key. "We will play for two hours, until 19. Never stop playing, even if we are down by a couple of scores. We will play for the whole game and I believe that is part of the game. This game is all about defense so if we can get together a good defense I think we have a great chance to win." For the USA, Booth is most concerned about the mental focus of her players. "We had tough games early in the week. We finished up pool play and did fairly well, and to get the team up for the final game will be our biggest challenge." The US and Swedish teams have met twice this tournament with the Swedes taking the loss both times. Perhaps third time is the charm.

WFDF World Ultimate Championships Return to Europe for the year 2000

Heilbronn, Germany will be the site for the next World Championships scheduled for August 5-12. Tournament Director Mark Kendall hopes that holding the tournament in Heilbronn, the geographic center of Europe, will attract many of the European teams which didn't make the overseas trip this year. He expects Belgium, France,



Austria, Switzerland, the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland, and several countries of the former Soviet Union to send teams to the 2000 tournament.

With the support of the city of Heilbronn and the German Frisbee Sport Association, Kendall expects to attract 1200 players to the tournament. The layout of fields, accomodations, and entertainment are designed to be very centralized. Fields will be contained in an area of one square kilometer and downtown accomodations will be one kilometer from the fields. Two stadiums will be available for evening feature games and for all finals. Kendall hopes to create a central area for players to congregate and socialize, something past Worlds have not done due to split playing sites or long distances from fields to accomodations.

Todd, Holly, Scott and the rest of the NSC Event Staff tackled their first Ultimate tournament. Many of them had never seen a game before this week and all have enjoyed the exposure to the sport. Holly now has the Ultimate playing bug. The official word is that this was "a smooth event which brought a new dimension to the National Sports Center." Thank you players for your good behavior and outstanding play. The impression you made has resulted in the NSC wanting to host other Ultimate events. The staff was very impressed with the relaxed, "here to enjoy playing" attitude of the players. They also said that you are the "best partiers".

Thank you to all the volunteers from the Minnesota Ultimate community for providing Ultimate tournament expertise and many free hours of labor. The tournament would not have been possible without your involvement. Volunteers were responsible for field management, scorekeeping, planning and organizing evening entertainment, and your daily newsletter. In return they got a t-shirt and the opportunity to watch some amazing disc. Summer League play this Tuesday night should be very inspired. Quoting WEDF Ultimate President, Charlie Mead, "The volunteers have been great. They put their heart and soul into it and they've been fantastic." Okay, players, have you hugged your volunteer today?



As the head of WFDF Ultimate, Charlie provides leadership in the development of the sport. One the eve of the finals, newsletter staff caught Charlie sitting still and without the everpresent walkie talkie. Pleased with the tournament organization, facilities, fields, staff, and volunteers, he turned his attention toward future developments in the game. These included speeding up play, observers, growing competitiveness among nations, and increased participation.

Charlie and others at WFDF, various national associations and the UPA will spend the winter negotiating ways to speed up play and eliminate stalling tactics. The discussion started because of obvious time wasting by teams at various tournaments, most notably Club Worlds in Vancouver in 1997. To Charlie the biggest challenge is maintaining the balance between Spirit of the Game and players taking responsiblity for on the field intent while getting the games to move along faster. The two hour time cap instituted at this tournament was a means to get teams to maximize playing time so games would finish under the cap. For next years Club Worlds, the organizing groups are looking at a time limit between points with sanctions for taking too long to start the point. "The desire to speed up the game and get things going is there. How it's done is a different matter."

The issue of teams moving offsides on the pull is also under review. "Every team playing in this tournament, almost without exception, has been offsides on the pull. That's a fifteen yard advantage straight away." A this means that timekeepers and scorers may be given more authority in games. But Charlie still discourages the use of observers or officials. Several times at this tournament Junior teams requested observers, but none were ever used. Charlie asks that both captains in a match request observers, not just one. He believes that this encourages a dialogue about what, the problems are and why a team thinks observers are necessary to have a fair game. "Throughout this tournament all the teams that have asked for observers, afterwards have been happy NOT to have had them because after that discussion has taken place the game has gone very well. Because even though the game has been very hard and competitve, its generally thought to have been very fair as well. Some people feel that in order to make the sport more acceptable we need to make it look like like every other sport. The thing is, we've been accepted into the World Games on the basis of who we are, not what we're going to be. It took us ten years to persuade them that not having referees was okay and it was perfectly possible and an acceptable part of the sport. Not just that, it's actually the part of the sport that drives it, that makes it different from anything else, what makes it appeal."

Charlie is very exited by the growing competitive balance among teams. He sees Canada and Japan rising to join the US and Sweden as major Ultimate countries in the Open Division. While the US still looks clearly ahead, the Women's Division five or six strong teams. "There is a switch in the balance of power away from Sweden to Japan, Canada, and Finland. You've got some tight games there. Australia's getting better as well, so it's much more competitive that way. You've definitely seen a big move this year. Canada especially in every division have gone up and up and up."

Club Worlds will be held in St. Andrews, Scotland in 1999, Worlds in Heilbronn, Germany in 2000, and in 2001 Ultimate will make its first appearance into the World Games. Because travelling to a World Championship every year is very costly in terms of time, money, and personal commitment, WFDF is proposing a transition to a four year cycle of Worlds. Every other year either Club Worlds or Worlds would be held. In one of the intervening years would fall the World Games which are staged once every four years. In the remaining open year there would be regional championships such as the European Championship. This schedule would give teams time to develop the sport in their own region. Countries of South America were cited as an example. "South America desperately wants time to save their money to go to World Championships. But they also want American teams to go down there to play against them. Americans just can't afford to do that if they're also going to World Clubs or World Championships."

Besides increasing the number of countries participating in Worlds, Charlie sees the the addition of new divisions. Co-ed was a big success and the participation of I-Cup teams added to the overall co-ed atmosphere. He anticipates both over-40 and under-16 divisions emerging in the next five years. Also, a split of the junior division along gender lines. "It has to happen. If you're going to develop your sport in the women's division than you need to have it being fed in either through co-ed or juniors." A women's masters division will be possible if four countries have masters champions. So far, no countries do.

Asked if he had any fears of the players losing control of the sport as it grew and entered more established events such as as the World Games or the Olympics, Charlie expressed little concern. "I think we will have to make some very principled decisions about how to develop the sport, like speeding up the game. But as long as that stays within the line of what players say they want or what they think is good for the sport, and we don't do it for commercial reasons, than I think we'll be okay."


