We wish all of you the best and most spirited competition.



BAZAAR

The tournament center features a Bazaar where various shops are set up.

Gaia shop

The Gaia shop sells all the official WUGC2004 merchandise, featuring a wide range of sportswear and accessories. Here you can also buy Discraft

ABC

discs and other exclusive items.

Hertz car and bike rentals

At the Bazaar, you can rent bicycles and cars from Hertz. The tournament center is both the pick-up an drop-off locations for these cars and bikes. Bicycles cost 10e per day or 50e per week. For car rentals, you should use this form to reserve in advance, because cars may be already sold out by the time of the tournament (it's peak tourist season).

Epson Photo Center

Epson Photo Center operates at the Bazaar where yau can buy photos taken by our tournament photographer. Here you can also print your own photos.

Päämies Desk Mobile Store

Here you can buy prepaid phone connections, mobile phones and accessories. At this stand, you can also print photos taken with your mobile phone free of charge.

Laundry service

A laundry service will operate at the Bazaar. You can drop-off your entire teams laundry (no dry cleaning) in a bag every day by 8 pm and pick them up clean the next morning after 8 am.

BICYCLES

The easiest way to rent a bike is directly at the Tournament Center. Prices are 10e per day, 50e per week.

BREAKFAST

BUSSES

The tournament busses take you to all venues and accommodations (see BUS TRASPORTATION).

CASH

Look for the orange sign "Otto" for ATM's (ie. cash withdrawals).

CURRENCY EXCHANGE

Farex (at the marketplace, next to McDonalds), all banks, and hotel receptions offer this service.

DOCTORS

EVENING GAMES

Evening games are featured games that are played at Paavo Nurmi stadium on Saturday (31.7.), Monday (2.8.) and Wednesday (4.8.).

FOR FAMILIES

The Adventure Park (Seikkailupuisto) at Kupittao next to the fields is an excellent "extended playground" type of place for kid recreation!

Microwave ovens can be found ot the tournament restaurant "The Flying Plate" (free of charge).

FINAL PARTY

On Saturday 7.8., ofter the finals, a big porty is held at the Tournament Center. Several top DJ's ond the group Beots and Styles will provide the music. The party starts at 8 pm and ends ot

1:30 am. The law requires you to be 18 years ald to attend the party.

FRIDAY NIGHT PARTY

On Friday 6.8. the Tournament Center will transform into party zone. Several DJ's, most notably DJ Slow will provide the music. The party starts at 8pm and ends at 1:30 am. The law requires you to be 18 years ald to attend the party.

FIRST AID

See MEDICAL SERVICES.

INTERNET

There are three ways for you to access the Internet during at the tournament.

WLAN. The tournament center features a Wireless Local Area Network (WLAN) which you can use to get fast Internet access using your own laptop. At the Bozaar you can buy subscription vouchers for 5 e per day or 25 e per week. The same network also operates and provides access at many other locations in downtown Turku and the riverside.

Internet cafe. At the tournament center there will be an internet

cafe where you can read your E-mail ar browse the web. Access for 30 minutes costs 1.50.

Hotels. Most hotels offer Internet access to their guests. Ask at the reception of your hotel for further infarmation.

LAUNDRY SERVICES

Bring your team laundry (no dry cleaning) in a bag by 8 pm to Tournament Center and pick-up your bag at the same place after 8 om next morning. Price: 5,15e / kg. Operated by Melers Laundry.

Note: First pick-up is on Sunday 1.8. evening, lost return on Saturday 7.8. morning.

MASSAGE

At the medical facilities of the Tournament Center you will be able to get a mossage during the tournament. There will be 10 masseurs present from early morning to late evening. A 30 minute massage costs 5. If you reserve a massage for the whole team, there will be a 20% discount.



MEALS

Breakfast

If you are staying at the school your breakfast is served at the Flying Plate restaurant from 7 to 9 am each marning.

Dinner

Dinner is served at the Flying Plate (premium) and at Veritas stadium (budget) from 4 to 9 pm.

Lunch and snacks

During the daytime, you can buy lunch and snacks at the Flying Plate and from Kotipizza ot the Tournament Center or at Kaarina fields.

MEDICAL SERVICES

The tournament medical center operates daily starting from one hour before the first game until the end of last gome at Kupittaa. There are also first aid personnel situated at each playing location. More severe accidents are handled by Medical Centre Pulssi (located downtown at Humalistankatu 9-11, tel. +358 (0)2 26 161), which is cooperating with the tournament.

NEWSLETTER "THE DAILY SCOOBER"

The Daily Scoober is published each morning from Sunday 1.8. until Saturday 7.8. You will find your copy at the Tournament Center or one of the restaurants listed in the back of your ID card.

OPENING HOURS

In Finland, supermarkets and department stores normally stay open until 9 pm on weekdays, until 6 pm on Saturdays and are closed on Sundays. Small shops usually stay open until 6 pm on weekdays and 2pm on Saturdays. Mini-stores at gas stations may stay open until midnight or even 24 h.

PHARMACY

See the back of your ID card. The afficial pharmacy of the tournament is Aura Apteekki located downtown at Kauppiaskatu 7-9 next to the Sokos Wiklund department store.

POST OFFICE

There is a post office at Kupittaa close to the Tournament Center. It is located at Lemminkäisenkatu 14-18. Opening hours are Monday to Friday from 9 om to 6 pm.

PHOTOS

Official tournament photos are sold at Epson Photo Center at the Bazaar of the Tournament Center.

TOURIST OFFICE

The Tourist Office will guide you in your discovery of Turku. It is located at Aurakatu 4, telephone: (02) 262 7444.

NIGHTLIFE

On Friday 6.8. and Saturday 7.8., don't miss the tournament partys. On other days, by walking downtown or along the river, you will find a number of bars and clubs. Especially, check out the river boats (e.g. Donna, Cindy, Papa Joe). Some of the most popular clubs and bars

are Giggling Marlin, Blanko, Prima, Börs, Kino, Dynamo and Pöiväkoti.

SUPERMARKETS

There are supermarkets close to all playing locations. Besides cash, you can use oll major credit cards. The opening hours are typically 8 am to 9 pm.

TEAM ATTACHE

Your Team Attache is at your service during your arrival on Saturday 31.7. and additionally for one hour on Sunday 1.8. (your Team Captain will be informed about the exact time). During the rest of the week there are two stand-by attaches at the Tournament Center to help you if needed.

TIME

Finland is currently in the EEST time zone (Eastern European Summer Time) which is UTC/GMT +3 hours (this includes daylight saving). Times are presented using 24 hour notation. Dates are presented dd.mm.yyyy.

TRADING NIGHT

The traditional Trading Night is held on Tuesday 3.8. from 8 to 10 pm at the Tournament Center.

TURKU

Turku is the aldest town and former capital of Finland. With some 200,000 inhabitants, three universities, a flaurishing cultural scene and a long tradition in sports, it is often described as an idyllic yet lively tawn.

In the summer time, Turku is one of the most popular tourist attractions in Finland. The long history of the tawn is visibly present. The old castle and cathedral are over 700 years old and still in use today.



BILEET, BAILUT (party)

Crucial concept, and therefore important words to any Worlds participant. Time to meet old friends and make a whole lot of new ones, and dance 'til you drop.

ESPOO

The cradle of Finnish Ultimate. Also known as a town next to Helsinki.

FAZERIN SININEN (Fazer Blue)

Our dearest chocolate bar, named after Karl Fazer, the founder of the company that produces these delicacies.

HILJAINEN (quiet)

Generally speaking, if a Finn won't say a word to you, don't be offended. Finns are usually rather quiet people, at least until you get to know us better. We sort of take pride in the fact that small talk has not become mandatory.

MUUMIMAAILMA (Moominwolrd)

The Moominworld in Naantali is a childrens' theme park where any bad moods will soon evaporate and be replaced by laughter and good feelings. This home island of the Moomins is open daily from 10 o.m. till 6 p.m.

NAKKIKIOSKI, SNAGARI, GRILLI (hot dog kiosk, grill)

Long night out, starving to death – where do you go? We strongly encourage you to forget those boring burgers and standard fries: nakkikioski is the place to go. Despite the lack of big fluorescent signs and fancy facades, finding it shouldn't be a problem – just follow the lingering aromas of sausage, steak and fried egg-filled sandwiches with garlic

mayonnaise. Once you get there, join the queuing crowd, and ask for the 'special'.

NAPAPIIRI (arctic circle)

Finland is a long country, more than 1150 kilometres from tip to toe. Up north, above the Arctic Circle, you get to enjoy the Midnight Sun in June - but around December comes payback time, since in those coldest weeks of winter the sun doesn't rise at all. Relief to the midwinter darkness is occasionally provided by the revontulet (Northern Lights). And ohyes – they do have electricity up there as well. No polar bears, though.

SAARISTO (archipelago)

The closest place to experience this is the Turku Archipelago. A unique very beautiful site to visit e.g. by bicycle but also, of course, by boat.

SALMIAKKI


While Finns take great pride in their chocolate, they also cherish another sweet of a more peculiar kind; salty liquorice known as salmiakki tends to fall into the love-it-or-hate-it category.

SAUNA

More or less indisputably, sauna could be considered the most Finnish thing of all Finnish Things. It is indeed so dear to us that many Finns actually have two saunas: one at home, another at their summer cottage. If you get to give it a try, make sure to take a break now and then, for Finns like their sauna hot. In addition to taking a cool shower or a dip in the pool or sea in between, you can refresh yourself with a cold drink. Can't beat the feeling.

SISU (guts, stamina)

The English translations for the Finnish word sisu bear only a faint resemblance to what sisu means



to Finns. It's that tenacious will to keep going, come what may. For example, although Finland has had her share of historical turbulence, like all other states on the European continent that where involved in the Second World War, Finland was never occupied by foreign forces. Finns like to think it's the sisu that eventually got us where we are today: In the postwar years agrarian Finland was rapidly transformed into a modern industrial land.

TURKU

Turku is the oldest city (founded in 1229) and the first capital of Finland (until 1812). Nowadays Turku has some 170 000 inhabitants. Downtown Turku is very easy to get around in: the core area consists of the streets Aurakatu, Linnankatu, Yliapistonkatu and Eerikinkatu. Just memorise where they are located — we won't test you on spelling them correctly. Learn the Turku accent easily by practising the following: "Ai mää vai?" "Kui?" Tournament slogan in dialect. Launch It Good = Lataa huolel!

VESI (WATER)

Cliché or not, Finland is indeed the country of thousands of lakes. In the summertime Finns like to make use of this by heading out to their summer cottages and lakeshore saunas, leaving the cities somewhat deserted. But even the arrival of winter chills is no excuse to give up on outdoor swimming: the popularity of avantouinti, swimming in a frozen lake, has increased. And yes: it is safe to drink the water from the tap.

VÄHEMMISTÖT (MINORITIES)

Due to her relatively isolated location and strict foreign policy, Finland has remained a very homogenous country. Even the largest official minority, the Finland Swedes, constitute less than 6% of the total population of some five million people. However, all the public services must be available in

both languages: Finnish and Swedish. While most of the Swedes live in coastal Finland, the other official minority, the Sami people (also known as Lapps), live in their native area in the northernmost parts of Lapland.

YMPÄRISTÖ (ENVIRONMENT)

You cannot give an introduction to Finland and leave out the environment, for Finns love nature – and they have plenty of it. If you manage to get away from the courtless lakes, you will quite likely find yourself in a forest. Millions upon millions of pines, spruces, birches, and other trees cover about 65% of the total land area. Hence it is no wonder that forests are Finland's most important natural resource.





Player's Handbook Rules section for WFDF W/UGC 2004 - Finland

Game rules

All players, Captains and staff are expected to be familiar with the WFDF Rules.

Starting and ending the game

All field staff responsible for scoring and timing games will arrive at the appropriate field thirty (30) minutes before the game they are due to score ar time begins. They will place themselves in a position visible to any players approaching the field. Both Team Captains or Team Representatives shall report to the field staff at the appropriate field fifteen (1.5) minutes before their game is due to start. The Team Captains or representatives shall register the arrival of their team with the field staff and sign the team roster for that game presented to them by the game afficials. The roster will cantain the names and jersey numbers of all the players the team has registered to the tournament. Should ane or more of those players nat porticipate in said game, they should be stricken by the captain from the roster.

Captains of the two teams shall flip discs to determine passessian and field position for their teams at the start of the game. Should one or both Captains not report to the field staff at this time, the game official shall note this, try to contact the Captain directly by mobile phone, and if this is not successful contact the tournament center by phane, and ask far a public notice to be made to attract the Captain and/or their team to the appropriate field. Upon the arrival of the Captain the staff shall inform them of the amount of time left befare the beginning of the game. Rosters will then be handed to staff for verification.

Teams with less than 10 players on their roster for any one gome will not be permitted to play.

Teams who have delivered their roster late will not be permitted to play until the roster has been checked. If this means they are late starting then they will farfeit points.

The central horn that has been used successfully over a number of years will not be used at WUGC 2004. This is because the games are spread out on many sites. Individual timekeepers will be respansible for starting games on time and capping them when time runs out.

There will be a signal from the timekeeper five (5) minutes before the scheduled start of a game in order to prepare all teams to line up ready to play. At this signal, both teams at the field must be ready to play.

A second signal will be transmitted by the timekeeper to start the game at the designated time. Teams who do not have seven players on the line and at least three (3) substitutes ready to play when the signal is given to start play shall give ane (1) point for each minute they

are late to the opposing team. If a team has not arrived after fifteen (15) minutes they shall forfeit their game to zero (O). Should neither team arrive on time then they shall both gain points at the rate of one (1) per minute until a team arrives and lines up, or until both teams arrive and line up ar until both teams forfeit their game zero-zera (0-0) after 15 minutes. Should either or both teams fail to turn up and so forfeit their game they shall automatically be referred to the Taurnament Rules Graup (TRG) by the Tournament Director (TD) for possible disciplinary action.

If at the scheduled starting time of the game anly one of the Captain's is present, then that Captain may choose which end their team will defend and whether they will pull or receive. If neither Captain is present then the first Captain to arrive shall have first choice.

At the end of regular play a further signal will be transmitted.

Exceptions

Games will start an time, unless a previous game has overun its time an the same field as the next scheduled game. Teams may have to wait until the previous game is completed befare starting their game. They shall still follow the pre-match procedure outlined above and if another field is available teams may be asked to switch at the time they sign their roster fifteen (15) minutes before the scheduled start of their game.

If the game does not start on time because of the late arrival of one or both of the teams the start and finish signals shall remain in force for that game. If, however, a game starts late because of another game playing extra time on the scheduled field, and another field being unavailable, then the field staff shall note the beginning time of the game and adjust all subsequent timings so that the game shall run for its allatted time. The field staff shall then enforce this new time schedule irrespective of the time schedule af ather games being played in the same round.

Time Caps

All games at Warld Chompianship tournaments shall be time capped. For WUGC Finland the time cap will be 100 minutes.

All games in all rounds in all divisions will fallow the following rules:

If the time cap is reached, play will continue uninterrupted until the next point is scared. If the game has not reached its end then two points will be added to the highest scare. The first team to reach that scare will win. However, if a team reaches their target (17) with a lead of two then they shall have won. Far example, if the scare is 16-12 at the end af regular time and the leading team scare another point, they shall have won.

A point starts at the pull and ends when a goal has been scared (or, if there is a discussion, when the goal is ocknowledged by the defending team). If time cap is reached between the scaring of a point and the ensuing pull, the point cap will be set immediately.

Ties

If two teams are tied an win-lass ratio after any phase of pool play then the result of the head-to-head game will determine places.

If three or mare teams are tied on win-loss ratio after any phase of pool play then the following order of criteria will be applied;

- The teams will be ranked according to the win-loss ratio in the pool play games between the teams in question.
- 2. Should this ranking still produce a tie between three or more teams, points scored in games between those teams will be colculated. Teams will be ranked according to the points difference in those games. The highest positive difference will determine the highest ranking for that team. The remaining teams will be decided on the same basis.
- 3. After calculating the points difference between three or more teams, should the points difference be the same then the highest number of points scored in those matches will determine places. After determining places by this criteria, should twa teams remain tied then their ranking will be determined on the head-to-head bosis.
- 4. Shauld three ar mare teams still be tied after points difference and points scared are calculated then points difference in all games in that pool will be calculated and the team with the highest difference will gain the highest ranking. Further rankings will be determined by the results of head-to-head games.
- 5. After calculating the paints difference between three or more teams in all the games in the paol, should the paints difference be the same then the highest number of paints scared in all matches in the pool will determine places. Further rankings will be determined by the results of head-to-head games.
- 6. Finally, should this still produce a tie (now we mave to statistical instability) then all teams involved shall nominate one player to throw one disc as far as they can. All players shall throw at the same time, with any prevailing wind at their backs. The furthest throw shall win, other places determined on head-to-head.

Field procedures

The field staff will be responsible for scaring and time keeping, including the timing between points and on disputes. They are not available for rule clarification at the settling of any disputes. That is the responsibility of the players. They are, however, responsible for monitoring

your time on the field and their decisions will be final.

We ask yau, in fact INSIST, that you respect this paint and that the captains make sure that all their players adhere to it. Any abuse of field stoff will be a disciplinary matter. It is the respansibility of all players in all teams to follow all field staff instructions below with camplete campliance and co-operation. The captains are responsible for the behaviour of their team.

The following procedures apply.

The field stoff will be respansible far giving your teams all the information they need to arganise themselves, including the signal far the stort of the games. This will come in a variety of forms detailed belaw. The stoff will blow whistles from one to three times to warn the teams of the time limits. Three times olways indicates that play shall resume immediately.

Time limits between goals

A point starts at the pull and ends when a goal has been scored ar, if there is a discussion, when the goal is acknowledged by the defending team. We want to make this clear, os there have been questions about this in the past.

The time limit between goals (i.e. the scaring of a goal and the ensuing throw-off) is sixty (60) seconds far the receiving team, and seventy-five (75) seconds far the throwing team. These limits are enforced by the fallowing procedure.

The forty-five seconds whistle - one signal

+ [a] As saon as a goal is scared (in the event of a discussian, as soon as the goal is acknowledged by the defending team), the timekeeper starts a clock. After forty-five (45) seconds, the timekeeper blows a whistle ance to warn the receiving team that it has fifteen seconds before the minute runs aut.

The sixty seconds whistle - two signals

- + (b) After sixty secands, if the receiving team has acknowledged that it is ready, the timekeeper signals (whistles twice) the throwing team that it has fifteen seconds before the seventy-five seconds run aut.
- + [c] If the receiving team does not acknowledge that it is ready before the sixty-secand whistle, this signal means that that learn gets a time-out assessed if it has any time-outs remaining. The timekeeper then tells the captains that a time-out has been assessed, and a regular time-out for that team takes place. If the receiving team has no time-outs remaining then a time-out does not occur, there is no pull, and the receiving team takes possession of the disc 15 yords behind their own goal line, midway between the two sidelines. Play is restarted with a check.

The seventy-five seconds whistle

- three signals

+ (d) If the throwing team does not throw before the seventy-five second whistle, that team gets a time-out assessed if it has any time-outs remaining. The timekeeper then tells the captains that a time-out has been assessed, and a regular time-out for that team takes place. If the throwing team has no time-outs remaining then a time-out does not occur, there is no pull, and the receiving team takes possession of the disc at the brick mark nearest the goal it is attacking. Play is restarted with a check.

Time limits after time-outs

(a) Time-outs between points:

Each time-out between points extends the time between goals by 2 minutes. Play is restarted as between ordinary goals. However, when a time-out between points has accurred, the timekeeper gives an additional worning whistle 30 secands before the offense must be ready to receive the thraw-off. These signals are the same as for time limits ofter half-time.

(b) Time-outs during points:

The timekeeper signals

- · once when 1 minute is remaining and
- ance when fifteen [15] seconds are remaining.

At the end of 2 minutes all offensive players must have established stationary positions and the thrawer must signal readiness.

If the offense is not ready at the end of 2 minutes then the timekeeper shall blow the whistle twice to confirm that the time-out has expired. The marker may then initiate or resume the stall count immediately.

If the offense is ready at the end of 2 minutes the defense has an additional fifteen (15) seconds to establish positions, during which time the offense must remain stationary. The timekeeper shall give a final signal (by blowing the whistle three times) when these 15 seconds have elapsed at which time the affense may begin play immediately.

If both teams are ready at any time before the final signal is given then play is restarted with a check and all remaining timekeeper signals are dispensed with.

Time limit after half time

The same procedures also apply at the beginning of each half of play, except that the timekeeper gives warning signals:

- at 1 minute (once) before the receiving team must acknowledge readiness,
- 15 seconds (once) before the receiving team must acknowledge readiness,
- 1.5 seconds (twice) before the throwing team must throw and
- a final signal (three times) when play is to be re sumed immediately. These are the same signals as for time-outs between points.

Disputes

After a dispute has gone on for thirty seconds, the afficial shall give a worning signal twice with the whistle and coll "thirty" to indicate that the thirty seconds are up. The players involved are then expected to resolve the issue immediately or return the disc to the last thrower. There is no strict thirty seconds time limit but a realistic expectation that play shall resume.

Notes

Nate 1: if both teams are ready at any time before the final signal is given then play is restarted and all remaining timekeeper signals are dispensed with.

<u>Note 2</u>: the signal of readiness is that a ployer an the team in question roises a hand. Players must establish and hold their positions prior to signaling readiness.

Nate 3: It is common for players to confuse avertime



with the time-cop. Overtime has nothing to do with time elapsed since the start of the game. Overtime occurs when the score is tied at one point less than the number of points for which the game was originally scheduled, i.e. at 16-16 in a game to 17.

Discipline

At the Captain's meeting, there will be organised a Taurnament Rules Graup (TRG), which arbitrates in on-field and aff-field disputes between players, staff and members of the public. At WUGC 2004, the TRG is chaired by the WFDF Ultimate Director, and includes the TD of the event, or their delegated representative, and one player from each division represented.

The TRG will address formal requests, complaints or protests about any issue concerning an-field or aff-field activities. Requests, complaints or protests may be brought to the attention of TRG by any Team Captoin or Team Representative, identified before the tournament. Requests, complaints or protests may be brought at any time during the period starting from the end of the captains Meeting to midnight on the final day of play at the tournament.

Upan receipt of a request, complaint or protest the TRG will meet at its earliest convenience and make a decision available to all parties involved at least two (2) hours before the start of play the following day. The TRG for any request, camplaint or protest shall be composed of the WFDF Ultimate Director, the TD and the elected player from the division in which there is a perceived difficulty. The decision shall be posted where players may have access to read the outcome.

The TRG may, at its discretion, disqualify a player or an entire team from any event or from the entire tournament whenever that player or team exhibits violent, obscene, abusive, disruptive or illegal behaviour; cheats or otherwise attempts to create an unfair advantage for themselves or disadvantages others through circumvention of the rules; or otherwise causes substantial hardship, inconvenience or annoyance to spectators, officials or players.

The TRG may also censor an individual player ar team orally ar in writing; alter or nullify the result of any event; or order an event to be partially or completely replayed. In the event of an extremely serious conduct violation the TRG may, after disqualifying a player ar team from competition, refer the matter for later review and sanctioning actions by the WFDF Board of Directors.

If any member of the TRG has a vested interest in any matter put to the TRG that member shall be withdrawn to be replaced by their representative, or in the case of an elected player, another elected player from another division. Should two or more members of the TRG have a vested interest in the matter put to the TRG they shall be

replaced by unbiased WFDF elected afficials available at the tournament. These shall initially be Board members or members of the Ultimate Committee.

If an issue is brought to the TRG that effects the general interest of all or a group of teams participating in the tournament, the TRG may call an advisory Captains' Meeting of all or selected teams. The calling of such a meeting does not in any way reduce the powers of the TRG and the TRG is in no way bound to suggestions or decisions made by such a Captains' Meeting.

Any player or team disqualified from the tournoment shall forfeit all fees paid. If any player or team, or group of teams, chooses to challenge a decision made by the TRG in the cause of handling a request, complaint or pratest during a WFDF World Ultimate Champianship tournament, they should file a written protest to the WFDF Board of Directors within 30 days of accurrence.

Spirit issues

At earlier Warlds, there have sametimes been one or two games where the Spirit of the Game has not been enough to prevent rude and ruthless behaviour or even violent play. At WUGC, this will not be accepted. Captains are respansible for the behaviour of their teams and will be asked to remember this during the tournament.

The WFDF strangly discourages teams requesting the use of observers. In order to facilitate objective support for the field stoff, and still leaving it to the teams to take their respansibility for their own actions, we introduce at WUGC the following procedure.

If the field staff at a certain game consider the game to constitute a major problem, they will call for a WFDF official, the TD or the Field director. This person will have the authority to halt the game at any point, on the grounds of Spirit problems. The action taken can be a short pause in order far the Captains to calm their teams down or even decision ta play the rest of the game at a later time, should the schedule allow it. In connection with the game, but not necessorily during it, the official shall bring any misconduct to the attention of the TRG which may decide on sonctions according to the rules above.

The call will not be made on the request of the players. A captain that is of the apinion that the apposing team is not trying to communicate with his/her team is asked to address the apposing captain. Should this not solve the problem, the captain/s may ask for such of call for an autside official.

The decision to call or not to call an official lies with the field staff. Circumstances under which the field staff con/shauld call for an outside official include:

- repeated incidents of violent, dangerous or ruthless behaviour
- repeated incidents of blatont disregard for opponents, spectators, rules or property
- incidents of disregard for the outhority of field staff in combination with the assessment on the part of the field staff that the atmosphere of the game is deteriorating.

Note that the situations that might have caused this procedure to came into effect have been few and for aport. The WFDF, the organisers of WUGC 2004 and your apparents rely on you to help us avoid them at this great tournoment as well.

2005 IWGA World Games qualifying procedures

The next World Games will take place in Duisburg, Germany from July 14 - 24, 2005. The World Games will be the largest multi-sport event in Europe in 2005 featuring over 30 sports and 3000 athletes. Following up an the success of Flying Disc sport in Akito, Japon in 2001, Ultimate will again be a featured sport.

Six notions will be invited by WFDF to field teams that will compete in a Mixed format. As host nation, Germany will receive one of those invitations. The other five notions will be determined by the results of the 2004 World Ultimate Championships for National Teams here in Turky, Finland.

Warld Games invitations will be based on the combined results of each country's top three finishes in the six divisions of competition: Open, Wamen, Mixed, Masters, Juniar Open, and Junior Wamen. Far example, one cauntry's top three finishes may come in Open, Mixed, and Juniar Open, while another country's tap three finishes may come in Women's, Mixed and Masters.

Scoring within each division will be determined by the number of teams entered in the division. If 20 teams are entered, it will be worth 20 points to win, 19 points for secand and so an down to 1 point for 20th place. Germany 's finish will, for the sake of point distribution, be treated as any other team.

If two ar more countries are lied for the last invitation position, a tie-break procedure will be used which will then consider the countries finishes in the fourth division, and then fifth and sixth divisions if necessary. For example, one country's fourth highest finish may be in Masters, while another country's fourth highest finish may be in Vomen's.

If two or more teams are still tied after considering the sixth division finishes, the order of the teams will be decided with a random selection procedure determined by the WFDF Ultimate Committee.

The National Association for each country chosen shall then be responsible for selecting a Mixed team of elite players to represent their country.



Aussies rain on Finns' parade

It took only one point for Finland to realize how much the Australians' height would play a role in last night's opening game in Paavo Nurmi stadium, as Anthony Dowle sky'd his defender to rip down the first of his two scores off a long huck by #42 Tom Rogacki (8 assists, 2 goals). Finland quickly answered back with speed and precision throws, scoring three of the next four points on quick, long strikes.

The Aussies threw a mix of zone and clam, but switched back to man after the Finns patiently marched the disc to a two-point lead at 7-5. Unforced throwing errors by Finland gave Australia more than enough looks to even the score. Tied at 8-all, the Dingos came out fired up on defense, and took half following a huge block in Finland's red zone by #14 Jonathan Holmes.

Australia again came out hot 'D' to open the second half, but the Finns countered with cool –headed offense from #68 Topi "caribou" Haarama (4 goals). Finnish defensive machine #49 Peetu Öunap forced a Dingo turn which evened the score again at 11-all. More unforced throwing errors allowed Australia four straight defensive

goals, and placed them in a commanding position at 16-12, game to 17. Finland capitalized on Aussie throwing errors with three straight points of their own, but Australia finally prevailed, 17-15. Open Division Preview

TONY LEONARDO

Nothing looks so exciting to watch as this year's competition for the Open division. The word across the board this year is parity and the unique format of an international Ultimate tournament such as Worlds may make all the difference. It could very well depend on when a favorite loses, not if a favorite loses.

And who is the favorite here? There is no odds-on bet. The United States has traditionally dominated Worlds, both club and country, but the continued strength of the Vancouver team now representing Canada cannot be overlooked. What may be a problem for top-seeded team USA is that they are two years past their prime when they won Worlds 2002. These guys have won every tournament on the books - from College Nationals to Club Nationals to Club Worlds to Paganello, Kaimana and every American tournament that exists. Why do they need to prove themselves? The key for this team will be the young guns and

the new blood. These new players need to show that they can bring the spirit, heart and intensity to this team.

Canada won Worlds in 1998 and the World Games in 2001. Behind a tall and versatile lineup with speed and conditioning, the angry monkey has incentive to perform well after being underseeded at number three. When was the last time Furious players lost a major tournament? 2002 Club Worlds in Hawaii is their only such defeat in recent memory. They've won almost everything since. This is going to be a very strong team indeed and in the right frame of mind.

Finland is going to have something to play for by representing their country and their friends and neighbors in Turku. Their opening-game loss to Australia is a small setback. Having just cruised through the top teams in America and beating all of them except for Furious George (remember, the U.S. teams are not in season right now), the Aussies are looking mighty comfortable on the pitch. Expect them to be in a flow right away while other teams work out the kinks. Australia might be able to pull ahead early by a decent margin before their opponents recover in the second half.

Is there a weak pool? Great Britain's pool certainly does not promise the potential of the others The U.K. will indeed be very strong but Denmark comes in as a fifth seed without great success on the international scene. They are excited and may be peaking at the right time, by they are not as strong as Australia, Finland and Sweden in the other pools, and Great Britain is not as powerful as USA and Canada.

For this reason, expect the Japanese to mix up the Open B pool. The Buzz Bullets were the best non-North American team at Club Worlds 2002 in Hawaii but that was practically a home tournament for them. Japan finished in the middle of the pack in 2000. Could this be a break-through year for them?

Sweden and Finland are always in the mix. Sweden especially owes some revenge victories. They want Worlds very badly. Sweden's 1992 Gold was tarnished because USA did not send the defending New York, New York champions due to travel costs. Instead the U.S. recruited a team of Masters players, a few pickups, and a stuffed teddy bear to represent America on the field. Sweden lost to USA 19-18 in the finals of Worlds 2000 in Heilbronn. They lost the bronze medal game 17-16 to the Condors in St. Andrews in 1999. If Sweden can avoid Canada and get a match against USA, you can expect another game down to the wire.

What is Guts?

Guts is a sport played between two teams of one to five players each. The objective is to be the first team to score 21 points.

To start play, each team lines up facing each other 14 m apart. Play is accomplished by a player attempting to throw the disc toward or at the opposing team and within the reach of at least 1 player of that team, in such a manner that the opposing team cannot make a clean catch.

Scoring is contingent on the success or failure of the throwing team. A good throw, without a catch, results in a point for the throwing team and a bad throw results in a point for the receiving team.

Guts competition begins at 9:00, Tuesday, on the Kaarina fields.

Oh, Canada!

No matter when the real Canadian holiday falls, Sunday, August 2nd was Canada Day in Finland. Canadian teams registered 11 wins in 11 games yesterday, including Team Canada's convincing defeat of Team USA in the Women's division.

After coming out red-hot, Team USA's offense stalled to the tune of an 8-1 Canada run, which extended through halftime. Intense defense was the key for Canada, with Leslie Calder #7 and Jillian MaGuire #5 leading the charge. Unforced errors were costly for the Americans, with Canada capitalizing on nearly every turnover. Team Canada scored the final three points to close the game at 17-10.

Disparity is queen in the Women's division with Canada, USA, Japan, Sweden, Finland, Great Britain, and Australia refusing to yield

> more than 5 points a game to other opponents. This with the exception of Sweden, who came up 3-points shy of victory against the USA.

> Games to look out for today include USA vs. Great Britain and Canada vs. Sweden in the first round, Finland vs. Australia in round two, and Japan vs. Finland in tonight's feature game at Paavo Nurmi Stadium. Australia's two women's teams placed higher than all other non-North American teams at the 2002 World Ultimate Club Championships in Hawaii, and present a solid, unified force from Down Under. Japan has looked consistently strong in recent years, and are aiming straight for the finals, which they lost to Canada at the

Japan and Sweden to offer the most serious challenges to Canada and U.S.A.





From the Competition Director:

First the good news: The 3-5 day weather forecast is improving steadily. There is a chance of showers on Tuesday, but the weather should get increasingly warmer and drier toward the end of the week.

The first thing is to stick to what was agreed at the captain's meeting: if you are a fan watching a game, you should be seated on the outer boundaries of the field area.

A second is that moving about or practicing on empty fields is prohibited, as the fields are either resting or being maintained.

The third is a request to place any larger chunks of loose turf back into the ground after your game. Please help us on this, as the cities of Turku, Kaarina and Raisio have been extremely cooperative in all aspects of organizing this tournament.





Open Semifinals

Open Semifinal 1: Canada 17 - Sweden 8

Yesterday's Canada/Sweden semi was a rematch of a hotly contested game in Round 2. Sweden had not seen a World Ultimate Championships final in more than 10 years, and now they will have to wait at least another four. Perennial contenders in Europe, the Swedes could not pull together the offense needed to counter the huge lefty backhand of Jeff Cruickshank. Canada scored four straight to open the match, but let the Swedes back in at 10-7, Canada. Furious closed the door hard in the second half, finishing with at least 3 consecutive defensive goals.

Canada's game against the USA today is a rematch not only of Wednesday night's feature game, but also of the 2003 UPA Championships final. In the UPA finals, Furious George of Vancouver (representing Canada at WUGC 2004) defeated the Santa Barbara Condors, 15-12.

Open Semifinal 2: United States 17 - Australia 8

Any competitive club team in the USA will most likely tell you that they fear the Condors' defensive prowess. The team from Santa Barbara, California - representing the USA at this WUGC - always brings a fearless defensive line wherever they go. For confirmation, one may look to the semifinal game yesterday against Australia. With the USA up, 3-2, Team Australias' offensive weapons (Potts and Rogacki) could only work two more scores before half came at 9-4, USA. Australia woke up on D in the second half, but it wasn't enough to keep the USA from a feature game rematch with Canada. Offensive weapons (of which their were many) this game included James Studarus and Brandon Steets. Ryan Yarbrough was named the games MVP by the Aussies.

Women's Semifinals

Women's Semifinal 1: Canada 17 - United States 8

This game really came down to focus, of which Canada was lacking none. The Canadians quietly ran their offense, while letting their defense take over. Errors, both forced and unforced, were converted by the Canadian defense early in the game. Canada took half with a considerable margin, and never looked back in the second half. Always a threat on both sides of the disc, Leslie Calder (#7) got the assist on the final point off a short throw to Valerie Dion (#66).

Canada faces home team Finland in the finals this afternoon. Finland achieved only 9 goals against Canada in 2nd round play, but Canada will not take this game lightly.

Women's Semifinal 2: Japan 11 - Finland 14

Finland got their rematch against Japan in the second semifinal game on Friday and didn't look back. The Finns let the Japanese into the lead only once during the whole game, at 11-10. The blue-and-whites went on to score the final four points (11-14) to secure the victory and a place in the Saturday's final against Canada.

It was obvious from the very beginning that both teams wanted to be in the finals. The fury with which both teams went after the disk on defense and the patience of their offensive play was especially noticeable in the beginning of the game. Although there were many calls in the game that interrupted the rhythm and created some tension between a few players, in the end, the Finns were better able to focus on the business at hand than the Japanese. Katja Kosonen (# 30) had a strong day both in the defense and offense assisting three goals and scoring one. Henna Jalovaara (# 11) had an important role at the end of the game first making a defensive block and scoring, 12-11, which pushed the Finns to the final run.

Mixed Semis / Final

Mixed Semifinal 1: United States 17 - Germany 9

Most were expecting this to be an easy game for the undefeated USA, but the Germans gave them a run right from the start. The first quarter of play say both teams working their long game and breaking the mark often. Germany took the lead at 4-3, but the USA utilized its depth and consistency to turn the game around.

Mixed Semifinal 2: New Zealand 13 – Canada 16

In the other semifinal, New Zealand – a force in the mixed division as of late – faced the Canadians. The Kiwis couldn't get into an offensive groove, and Canada took half with a commanding lead, 9-5. New Zealand countered with hard marks and converted on key blocks that kept the game close. Canada's experience and poise under pressure proved the deciding factor.

Finals: United States 17 - Canada 14

A hat trick for the Americans! Team USA, represented by the Lake Tahoe, California, "Donner Party" may very well be proclaimed an Ultimate dynasty. Beginning in 2002 with their incredible run to the top from a low initial seed in the World Ultimate Club Championships in Hawaii, the Party have won two consecutive UPA Championships and now take home the gold for the USA in the Mixed division at the WUGC.

Canada and the USA tied in total goals for after Round 1, but Canada's total goals against was a staggering 25 over 7 games. Most expected a barn-burner in this game between unbeatens, with the USA's potent offense hammering against one of the best defensive showings of the tournament. The game was exciting to watch, but it was the USA's offense that dominated more than anything else. A very long point in the beginning of the game ended in the Americans' favor, bringing the score even at 2-all and providing momentum that pushed the USA ahead to half, 9-6. A late defensive surge by the Candians wasn't enough to counter the USA's deep game.

Masters Semis / Final

Masters Semifinal 1: Canada 17 - Sweden 13

Canada went up early in this game, but unforced turns were capitalized on by Sweden to bring them back within one before half. Canada pulls out the win with more focus and consistency on offense.

Masters Semifinal 2: United States 17 - Great Britain 13

three point run to take the score to 7. The Canadians answered with two points of their own but couldn't catch up. Simply put, the Canadians couldn't capitalize on the turn-overs they received, and the U.S. was more focused on the tasks at hand. The USA's endurance was hard to beat and, in the end, the Canadian's game came down to errors made and opportunities lost.

Junior Women's Final

Final: United States 8 - Canada 17

In the Junior Women's Final today, Team Canada bested the United States, 17-8. A slight change from the earlier calm conditions, the wind picked up a little bit and this might have affected the American's game. The girls seemed nervous and a bit tentative. The precision throws that we had come to expect from the team were off and their offense never got into a rhythm. On the flip side, the Canadian team was well in sync and converted on their opportunities.

The Americans fell behind early, going down 2-5. They came back to within two at 4-5, when Leila Tunnell pulled down two goals, but this would be the closest that they would get. The Canadians went on a furious run and took the half (9-4). They showed no signs of letting up in the second half of the game and went up 11-4. Final: Canada 9 - United States 17

Having already played a round-robin game against one another that was, to quote USA Juniors assistant coach Kyle Weisbrod, "the most exciting game that meant absolutely nothing," expectations at Veritas Stadium were high for the Junior Open final. In the game that "meant something," the USA dominated on offense with perfectly-placed hucks through the heart of the Canadian defense. After taking half, 9-3, the Canadians crept back to 11-7, but that was as close

as they would get. Working their way downfield on the final point, Eldon Creer (#31) of the USA reeled in an errant out-of-bounds pass and flipped it to Tommy Hendrickson (#5) for a "Greatest." Conner Maloney scored the deciding goal to close the books on the American boys' undefeated World Championship run.

"As the plane took off from Cape Town, the boys closed their eyes. But when we got to cruising altitude they realized that there wasn't anything to fear, any they finally relaxed," he added. The Khavelitsha boys gained credits on their tournament fees by volunteering in the tournament catering, but mostly their trip was funded by the Finnish Emabassy in South Africa. Shaes wants also to thank all the people in the Turku Worlds organizing committee who made this possible.
