In 1998 I had the opportunity to play on the Canadian Mixed team at the 1998 World Ultimate Championships. A year earlier I had organized World Clubs in Vancouver, and when working on that event I told people I wanted to do "Clubs" as it seemed like the vibe would be more fun and relaxed than "Worlds". Prior to 1997 I had never attended a WFDF event, and WUCC 1997 was everything I could have hoped it to be as a player and an organizer.

Accommodations and Food

Totem Park, Ritsumeikan House (Rits) and Place Vanier Residence – Just a quick 5-10 minute walk to the main fields, Totem Park, Rits and Place Vanier are the main residence for players and guests attending this year's World Ultimate and Guts Championships.

The cafeteria at Totem Park is the main meal location for the event. The cafeteria will be open from 6:00am to 10:30am on August 3 to 10 for breakfast and from 4:30pm to 9:00pm on Aug 2 to Aug 9 for dinner. Options include vegetarian as well as vegan selections.

Parking at UBC

Parking for conference guests staying at Totem Park is available for \$5.00 + GST per day (\$5.35). You can make arrangements for parking when you check in at Totem Park. For guests and visitors coming for the days events but staying elsewhere there is ample surface parking also charged at a rate of \$5.00 per day. Parkades are also available for day time parking only, at a rate of \$1.50 per hour to a maximum of \$12.00 per day.

Medical Information

The medical tent located in the Athlete's Village will provide tournament players with access to volunteer physiotherapists, chiropractors and massage therapists. In addition the medical tent will always be staffed with an emergency paramedical.

Chiropractor and Physiotherapy services are available at no charge to all players. Those who require taping services are asked to make a small donation for taping supplies.

Massage therapy appointments are booked by a sign up sheet in the medical tent and will be charged a service fee of \$1 per minute. Appointments will be booked in 20 minute time slots. Please make every effort to keep your appointment, or provide 8 hours notice of cancellation to allow other players to make use of the time.

Player Conduct

The Organizing Committee, tournament staff and volunteers hope that all the participants at Worlds can have the most fun possible during their stay in

Vancouver. However, "fun" for you does not always translate into "fun for everyone". Please take into consideration the impact of your actions on those around you and strive to make the right choices. **The following 10 Simple Rules should be memorized or referenced prior to the start of any questionable behavior:**

Don't Steal Golf Carts - And don't ask for rides in Golf Carts, we are not going where you are going.

Chairs are Chairs, Tables are Tables - Use them as they were intended, and don't put one on top of the other to get a better view of something. Things will break and we will be sad.

Drink Responsibly - People who enjoy too much often exhibit behavior that, while it might seem like a good idea at the time, can sometimes be inappropriate and/or dangerous.

Don't Drink on the Fields - There are plenty of places to enjoy an alcoholic beverage legally, the fields are not one of them. If tournament staff, security or UBC staff notice alcohol being consumed outside of the designated areas it will be confiscated.

Respect the Volunteers - Under no circumstances should any participant at WUGC 2008 act in an abusive manor towards a volunteer. If you have a problem that needs to be solved, or a complaint that needs to be voiced please find a tournament staff member. They will escalate the problem quickly.

Rules to Live By, cont.

Activate a Fire Alarm ONLY in the case of a fire – UBC considers false fire alarms in the residences a criminal act. Players responsible will be removed from their rooms.

Don't throw anything (even a disc) out of a window – If something is thrown from the window of your room, UBC will remove you from the residences, whether or not you were the person who threw the object or not.

Illegal Substances – Illegal substances are illegal. Read that again if you need to.

Clean up after yourselves – The volunteers are not your mothers. There will be plenty of garbage receptacles at the event, please make use of them. We will take it from there.

Fill up your water bottles before you arrive in the morning – Supplying water for the event is the single hardest job for the volunteers. If every player brings just 1 liter of water to the fields each day you will save the volunteers from lifting around 8.75 tons of water during the course of the tournament.

WUGC 2008 Alcohol Conduct Policy

WUGC 2008 will be hosting a licensed Beer Garden during the course of the event at various locations. Only persons who are 19 Years of age and older may purchase alcoholic beverages, and these must be consumed within the designated areas. Proof

of age in the form of government photo ID will be required (WUGC IDs do NOT constitute proof of age), prior to the purchase of any alcoholic beverages. Once purchased, it is recommended that no person should leave their drink unattended. This can lead to the possibility of tampering.

It is illegal to supply alcohol to persons below the age of 19. Equally important though, are the risks involved when underage youth drink alcohol, as their lack of maturity makes them vulnerable to the changes that take place when alcohol is consumed. Nobody should place young people at risk by buying alcohol for minors.

Consuming alcohol in non-designated areas is prohibited. Any individuals or groups who are found to be drinking in non-designated areas by tournament security, volunteers or UBC staff will have all alcohol confiscated. Repeated occurrences will be reported to the Tournament Rules Group as well as local authorities. If you or your group is caught in a situation where alcohol is being confiscated absolutely no hostility towards the individual removing your alcohol will be tolerated.

Drinking and driving in BC is against the law. WUGC 2008 takes the subject of drinking and driving seriously. Many car crashes occur as a result of driving while intoxicated. Any person who has consumed alcohol should not operate a motor vehicle. Local law enforcement officials take drinking and driving very seriously and there are frequently road blocks set up to screen drivers.

World Cup of Ultimate

For the first time at Worlds, the tournament organizers will be presenting the World Cup of Ultimate Trophy.

This prize will go to the National Federation whose teams finish with the most "WCU Points" at the conclusion of the event.

We hope that this is the start of a tradition that will continue for each subsequent WUGC tournament.

World Cup of Ultimate Points

A country will score points based on the finishing position of each Ultimate team representing that country according to the following system:

Points = World Cup Points awarded

A country which is not represented in a division will, for this division, score one point less than the country which finished last.

The Country with the most WCDU points will be declared the World Cup of Ultimate Champion. In the case of a tie, the country whose teams have the highest average spirit score will be declared the winner.

Things to Do & See

Places to see, things to do, favorite finds while in Vancouver

So you are psyched up for a big week of competitive world class ultimate at the beautiful University of British Columbia campus, but you are wondering what is available to discover off the pitch, away from the Russell Brewing Company Beer Garden, merchandise tent and tournament party venues. Vancouver and this corner of the Pacific Northwest offer unlimited possibilities for further adventure...it's a wonder how anyone manages to play ultimate here.....

Check out Tourism Vancouver (www.tourismvancouver.com) for further details on what's available out there.... or hop on a ferry to explore beyond the lower mainland www.bcferries.com which will take you to Vancouver Island, Tofino (highly recommended for some pacific NW surfing), the Sunshine Coast or one of the many smaller islands.

Not into ferries or limited on time? One of the most spectacular drives is the Sea to Sky Highway (warning best to do during the day) which will take you north to Squamish (rock climbing and hiking the Chief, cross country mountain biking), Whistler (World Class / Olympic skiing and boarding venue, big mountain downhill biking, single & multi day hiking, glacier lakes) and Pemberton (Mt Currie, more hiking, biking and glacier lakes).

If you are too impressed by Vancouver itself to organize a trip beyond the North Shore Mountains we can

recommend exploring a few convenient pockets of the City.

Just east of UBC check out the beaches of Spanish Banks, Jerico and Kitsilano (Kits) make sure you hit the spectacular beachfront pool (137.5 metre partial saltwater pool). From Kits you can check out the shops of 4th Ave or explore the sea wall to Granville Island and beyond on foot, bike or roller blades. For the latest look at hipster Vancouver South Main (SOMA) has a plethora of cafes, restaurants, bars and shops, including Vancouver based designer duds. If you prefer a greater meshing of multiculturalism with your food & drink move further east to Commercial Drive (the Drive).

Downtown Vancouver has Yaletown for a look at fancy cars, slick boutiques and restaurants and highrise waterfront condo living. The Westend blends the beaches of English Bay, character filled Davie & Denman streets with views to Stanley Park. Stanley Park is must on the list and can be explored via walk, bike or sea kayak.

For those wanting more adventure yet still within the City check out any of the trails on the North Shore including Mt Seymour, Grouse Mountain (the infamous Grouse Grind) or Cypress Mountain all great for hiking, trail running or for the more adventurous mountain biking (experience required).

Australia - Women - Firetails

The Australian Firetails are the 2008 representative women's team from Australia. The team is a mix of new young talent and returning experienced players from all over the country and is looking forward to matching up against the best talent in the World.

The Australian Firetails are coming to WUGC 2008 fresh off a pre-tour which has taken them from San Francisco (playing Zeitgeist, Slackjaw and Fury), through Portland (playing Schwa) to Seattle where we played Team Canada, Riot and Viva. One of the best things about Ultimate is the sense of community and support from these teams, and the Firetails would like to extend our thanks to all those teams for hosting, organising and billeting us on the way and making our pre-tour possible. It is these friendships, warmth and camaraderie extended to us that makes Ultimate so special and unique from other sports. Despite the fact some of these teams are our main competitors we will be cheering them on from the sideline and sharing a beer with them at the final party.



Australia - Masters - The Taipans

The team ethos of the Taipans is best illustrated by the story of Gordon Lyons, a Darwin man who had his left arm amputated and almost died on the operating table, after being bitten nine times by the deadly snake. He later spent seven weeks in a coma, being kept alive by a dialysis machine and ventilator.

Mr Lyons, who admitted he was drunk at the time, said he and a mate had been driving from Mandorah to Darwin when they saw a Taipan on the side of the road.

"I remembered the guys at the Mandorah Pub wanted something to put in their huge fish tank."

"But I made the stupid mistake of grabbing it with my left hand because I was holding a beer in my right one. I had its head in my hand but it got loose and grabbed the web of my left hand... its fangs were that big it ripped my hand open."

"I tore it off me and put it in a plastic bag and threw it in the back of the car."

"For some stupid reason, I stuck my hand back in the bag. The Taipan must have smelled blood, and it bit me another eight times."

Mr Lyons said he began vomiting and suffering diarrhoea.

"My mate was trying to keep me awake by whacking me in the head and pouring beer on me."

My Lyons said his last memory was passing out, covered in blood, at the Noonamah Hotel before being rushed by ambulance to the Royal Darwin Hospital.

"I still can't believe my arm's been chopped off for just one snake. I still have my life and I guess that's the most important thing."

Canada Masters – Tombstone

Canada's Masters division representative is TOMBSTONE, a combination of players that reside primarily in Toronto, with others from Ottawa, Montreal and Vancouver rounding out the roster. TOMBSTONE was formed in 2006 with the specific intent to win Canadian Ultimate Championships in 2007 and the WUGC in 2008. While technically a new team, the nucleus of TOMBSTONE has been playing together for years at the heart of Toronto Men's Ultimate on teams such as GOAT, YES, REBELLION and JOYSTIK. Ottawa players from WAX, PHOENIX and GLU make up the majority of the roster.

TOMBSTONE's work ethic is focused and intent on winning, with a party ethic to match. Speed is at the heart of this team, which has a strong balance of throwers and big receivers to complement its arsenal.

Colombia - Women

This team represents players from the top 5 women's teams in the country. All players in the country interested in being a part of the selection process participated in try outs. During spring break of this year, the final team was selected by the five captains of the team (the captains were selected by The Ultimate Players Association of Colombia - AJUC).

Since the time of the selection, they have practiced as a group three times, and in every city they have been training with the same guidelines and the same physical approach. The team works well as a group, with great talent and great potential. It is a team of determined women, warriors and without fear, wanting to de-mystify our game and with all their heart to represent all women ultimate players who are in our country and wave the flag very high.

Columbia – Open

After open try outs where many high level players from different cities in the country participated, the very difficult decision was made to select 31 of the best athletes. Every player has great technical and physical abilities...the goal: to achieve a cohesive group of players who reach the highest level of commitment and discipline. Despite some worries, this group worked very well together, accepting the labor of their leaders and overcoming all problems.

Sadly, the most numerous group of all the Colombian teams learned that 12 players had their visa applications rejected, and it is still unclear if they will be able to fulfill their dream of competing in the world tournament. However, the group remains motivated and trains hard in order to show the best the country has to offer.

Colombia - Junior Women

After an open call and a long process (since mid last year), 27 girls were selected to represent our country. Since then, each one has trained to have the mental toughness to be the best on the team. Each one of them, since beginning this process, has eaten, slept, and dreamt Ultimate. Each week they are together at least four workouts to acquire greater technical skills, gain physical endurance and above all earn their trust and chemistry paramount to play. Girls in three cities will be responsible for displaying the entire future of the sport in our country and have the difficult task of multiplying all the lessons learned from this experience to their peers who do not travel the world. Already they are winners because of the training they have participated in, their continual improvement and by the level of commitment, intensity and discipline they have acquired.

Colombia - Junior Open

This is the Colombian Team which generates the highest expectations, inside and outside our country. In the last world junior championships, the team won bronze and many players of that tournament are playing again this worlds, making them the group with the largest number of players who ever has faced such pressure to carry their country to a championship.

Each one of them, since beginning this process, has eaten, slept, and dreamt Ultimate...

If that were not enough, they have a greater responsibility, because nobody expects them to finish lower than third place.

These 20 players were chosen from among many junior players and since they have been part of the selection have trained more intensively than any other selection. Internal competition has reached very high levels and discipline and commitment to the team has increased, even to the point of putting their social lives second. All in Colombia have faith in this team and we know that they will show that they have what it takes to be champions.

Team Bios

Dominican Republic - Open

The Dominican Republic is a beautiful nation with rich history and natural resources set in the heart of the Caribbean, where Ultimate has been played both for fun and competitively for the last 20 years or so, while fully embracing the Spirit of the Game.

Ultimate first appeared on the Dominican sports scene in the late 1980s, when a group of 15-20 people would gather on Sundays for some fun and tough games, albeit with primitive rules. By the 1990s, organized play had begun, with a few tournaments being held. The Aughts brought a new wave of fresh faces to the game, and Ultimate has enjoyed a bona fide growth. As of now, about 100 people play Ultimate in our country and 2-day tournaments are held 3 times a year with 3-5 teams participating each time. In 2005, we organized the first Spring League, in which 50 players participated distributed among three teams. Pick-up games are played 3 times a week and the Dominican Team, Domino, practices 3-4 times a week.

In Domino you'll find some of the DR best Ultimate athletes, who are eager to show that, even though inexperienced at this level, they can play along with, and most importantly, learn from the Elite Teams from around the World.

Our main goal for this WUGC, is to raise Ultimate's awareness in our country, and build upon that a larger and stronger Community.

Finland - Women

Our goal is to bring home a medal for Finland this August! The members of our team come from the southern and central parts of Finland: Helsinki, Espoo, Turku and Tampere. They represent the best mixture of talented, dedicated, and mentally tough players in the country. Finland is the European Champion (Great Britain/Southampton 2007) and won silver in the last World Championships on our home ground (Finland/Turku 2004).

Now we're ready to bring the Finnish "sisu" on the field again! Last but not least we hope to see great ultimate during the tournament and the best of Canada afterwards!

Great Britain - Women

The GB women's squad 2008 is looking forward to our most exciting season yet. In the time since the last World Championships in 2004, the British women's ultimate scene has benefited from the introduction of a highly competitive women's league resulting in an influx of new talent and quality competition which has driven the level of the women's game to new heights.

Our two-year mission kick started last year with the European Championships in Southampton where we proved ourselves to be one of the top women's teams in Europe. The high standard of British female players on today's ultimate scene has meant that this year's squad has only the highest ambitions and are set to be the most successful and most talented GB women's squad to date.

The disappointment of finishing second at the European championships last summer has fuelled our desire and our competitive spirit. This season we have been working hard to be fitter, faster and more diverse than ever before. Our season so far has included the European Elite Series and a North American Tour in which we managed to squeeze a 5-day training camp and plenty of gags in between two tournaments!

This season we are slicker, smarter and fired-up and cannot wait to bring our performance to the World stage!

Great Britain - Junior Women

GB Junior Women is comprised of players from around the UK, with the juniors division growing rapidly throughout the country. Players were selected from clubs across the UK, and have been working hard to prepare for this tournament over the last few months.

The core unit of this team won EUC 2007 in Southampton last summer, demonstrating good playing skills and great grit and determination to beat Sweden in a sudden death final. They are hoping to build upon their experiences from last year and, with the addition of several talented and enthusiastic players, put up a good fight against the more notorious junior women's teams.

Look out for these players when GB has the disc:

Captain Jen Hart: A strong handler with great disc skills and a calm head to help lead this team by example.

Vice Captain Gill Spy: Gill has a chilled approach to ultimate with good awareness and safe hands.

Anna-Lisa Stone: Anna-Lisa has perfected 'the seal' and will layout for anything which helps make her a key receiver.

Hannah Randles: An unshakable poise makes Hannah a calm and reliable handler.

Look for these players when the opposition has the disc:

Vice Captain Sarah 'Ruby' Rennison: Ruby runs tirelessly on D to get the block and is renowned for her massive hammers!

Laura 'Lob' O'Brien: Sheer grit and determination makes Lob a true fighter, an asset on any D line.

Emily Meade: You'll spot Em with her huge pull, another intense D player who never gives up.

Johanna Szczyglowska: A great player on both D and D, Johanna will always look to get the layout block before sprinting long to score.

Germany - Masters

There was a big break in the German masters scene in 2007, with a lot of masters off to new shores. So a completely new team formed for the European Ultimate Championships (EUC) 2007 in Southampton. While missing some of the old hands the team showed great spirit winning the spirit-award in the masters division. Having had such a good team experience the major part of the team continued (with some "fresh" mid-thirties hands) as masters team in 2008 to play and win the ECBU (European Championships Beach Ultimate) in France and to prepare for the worlds in Vancouver.

Having played all the attending European masters teams within the last year there will be some scores to settle and eagerness to compete with the other teams from around the world.

Germany - Open

The team name of the German National Open Team is "Inside Rakete". Interestingly enough "Inside Rakete" is also a single-serving tactic to win an ultimate match and coincidentally the coach of "Inside Rakete" is the only person in the world who knows it. This strategy was designed to be used in the "ultimate ultimate-match" between humankind and the top team of the aliens ("UFO") for the world leadership in a few years. In order to avoid that aliens having the chance to develop a defence strategy against the "Inside Rakete" drive, unfortunately this tactic must not be performed before that day. Therefore, this year's German national team will try to be successful using again the common sets of offence and defence strategies at the WUGC 2008.

The team "Inside Rakete" consists of only five players who played at the WUGC 2004 and many quite young, but highly motivated, players of many different teams spread all over Germany.

The team is split into two blocks: **Phillip Timmermann # 4** is the captain of the offence team (called "Very Dick") and **Bernhard Otto # 6** is the top banana of the defence block (known as "Even Longer"). Welded together through a series of trainings camps and preparation tourneys the team now wants to prove its spirit and motivation.

Germany - Women

The German women have consistently placed well in European competitions, coming in 3rd and 4th at the EUCC in 2003 and 2007, respectively, and also currently holding titles in two different European club championships. After missing the quarterfinals of the WUGC in 2004 (at the hands of a determined Italian squad), they finished at the top of the bottom bracket. But this team wants to improve that result. Tough losses in last year's European championships semifinal and consolation game have provided even more motivation.

Team Germany is out to improve their ranking and seal their status as one of the European forces to be reckoned with.

The team is truly a national team, with seven club teams represented, and players hailing from cities all over Germany. The roster reflects not only a wide range of talents but also a balanced mix of experienced vets and outstanding rookies. At the helm is coach and player Sara Wickström, former Finnish national player now based in Munich, who has brought a wealth of ideas along with invaluable experience – she was one of the captains of the team that won silver in Turku (and the only team from outside North America to make it to the finals in any division at that tournament!).

Look for these ladies to use any one of a number of offensive and defensive strategies – the secret, as in the roster, is strength in diversity. And this team is deep – you will not be able to tell which players will be making their third appearance at a WUGC and which have only begun their national team careers!

Team Bios

Ireland - Open

Ireland is a relative newcomer to the international ultimate scene, but since competing at WUGC '00 in Heilbronn an Irish squad has represented at each of the major ultimate championship events. The squad is comprised of 21 players, from all over Ireland with the majority of the squad based in Dublin. The core of this squad has been together since WUGC '04 and also competed in EUC '07 in Southampton where they finished 6th after taking some big European scalps.

The squad was chosen following a number of televised trials in January and since then members of the Ireland open team have engaged in bi-weekly practice sessions as well as a strict dietary regime consisting almost entirely of potatoes and multi-vitamin tablets in preparation for Vancouver. With an average player age of just 25 this squad is very much building for the future but hopes to make a big impact at WUGC '08 in Vancouver. Key players to watch out for during the week include: Brian McDevitt, a former Clapham player (he's got the tracksuit) is a key member of the D line, and loves to get horizontal...legend has it that he once drank an entire 1.75 litre bottle of orange cordial mid-layout...without water...ligind!

Twin brothers Quinn and Cascarino provide an O-line option that can be devastating for opposing teams. These guys have been playing together since they left their mothers (Charlton) womb and seem to possess a sixth sense when it comes to picking each other out on the ultimate field. See if you can tell them apart!

The team JTM, Ian 'Surrender Monkey' French is one of the few university students on the squad and boasts a powerful intellect which saw him obtain a perfect score (1000/1000) in the state examinations and secure a lucrative academic scholarship to Trinity College, Dublin.

Cian 'Crash Bandicoot' O' Morain is the heart of the defensive line and is the only squad member who can perform a one handed clap pushup and if you ask him nicely enough he may just show you!

Niall 'A.C. Slater' Harbourne, a late injury addition to the squad is most excited about what will be his inaugural visit to the continent where the 'A.C.' technique was first employed

Ireland - Women

Ireland was represented in the women's division at a major championships for the first time at EUC2003. The players were young and inexperienced, didn't win a game, but they resolved to keep battling at international level. Ireland Women returned the following year for WUGC2004. Still, a win eluded them but their effort and ethic was rewarded with the Spirit of the Game prize.

EUC2007 was a real turning point in the development of women's ultimate in Ireland. This time round there was competition for places on the national team, the squad trained together regularly, completed a gruelling fitness programme and arrived in Southampton thirsty to prove that they could really compete at the highest level whilst maintaining their award-winning spirit. A win over Belgium was the first ever international victory for the Ireland Women and the beginning of a week that saw them beat five established European teams and finish the tournament in 10th position.

Looking to WUGC2008 the Irish have pushed themselves harder than ever before. The addition of coach Lucy Barnes, of Brutesquad, has brought fresh ideas and a new focus to the setup. The team is ready to work for every point in order to improve its world ranking. Ireland Women is a squad of 18 players based around Ireland and the UK. Four of the original EUC2003 team remain while WUGC2008 will be the first international cap for five of the players. They will be looking to run hard all week and hoping to cause a few upsets.

Team Bios

Italia - Open

After a disappointing 12th place at Europeans 2007, Italia Open hit a rocky period, due to the withdrawal of a number of players from the project and the subsequent loss of coach Gabriele Giacomini (Cotarica Rimini). In an attempt to avoid total implosion, in February 2008 the Italian Federation assigned two new captains to lead the team: Valerio Iani, veteran of Canieporci Imola, and Davide Morri, talent from CUS Bologna. The first steps they took to break the downward spiral were to motivate and find new members. The team is now composed of 25 athletes, most of whom are promising young players at their first world championships, flanked by several experienced players. Also on the roster are two Americans, Ryan Balch (Chain Lightning) and Sean McCall (Doublewide), who qualified to play with Italy at Worlds.

Despite its last-minute recovery, the team has since managed to organize four weekend practices and has participated in two key tournaments with encouraging results: 8th place at WCU, Copenhagen and 3rd place at the 6 Nations tournament in Berlin where, for the first time in its history, Italy beat Finland.

The team focuses on offensive efficiency, unpredictable defenses, and athletic training. Now, if it can only keep its hot tempers in check and use teamwork, Italia Open will be on its way to achieving its goals for WUGC 2008. The team aims to make the top 10, with the intention of playing all out in the game to go to quarters.

Italy - Women

Italia Women features players from throughout north-central Italy, representing the clubs of Bergamo, Bologna, Imola, Parma, Prato, and Rimini. We have been preparing for WUGC 2008 since early 2006. Led for the first time by a non-playing coach, Maurizio Palladino, and by captains Laura Cincotta and Barbara Bondi, the 17-player squad contains a balanced mix of young talent and seasoned experience. The first important milestone on the way to Vancouver was the 2007 European Championships in Southampton, UK, where the team took 6th place after losing to Switzerland in the quarterfinals by only two points.

Due to injuries and life changes, this past year witnessed several heavy losses to our roster, including captain Eva Artoni and star player Emanuela Argilli who, with Fury, qualified for Team USA. However our younger members are stepping up to fill in the gaps and have tested their mettle at three high-level competitions this season. The team made a good showing at the Euro Elite Series 1 and 2 against Europe's top four teams, and took Amsterdam's 2008 Windmill Windup by storm. With such a small roster, we are counting on intense training and solid teamwork to reach our goal of beating seed and bettering Italy's 8th place at 2004 Worlds.

Team Bios

Japan - all divisions

All teams from Japan are made up of players from many different club teams for this year's championship.

As we all come from various regions throughout Japan, we have not been able to hold regular weekend practices, but even with our limited practice, we will dedicate all of our strength to strive for the gold medal.

Among our many rival teams, such as the Canadian home team, the powerful U.S.A. team, and the height-advantaged Europeans, we will play in our own way, and do our best to step up to the challenge!

Mexico - Women

The history of the development of the women's category in Mexico started when a few girls began to play Ultimate in the Coed Division. The women's division in Mexico had its first appearance in 2005, with a game involving the coed division girls. This situation was really exciting for all women and it motivated the creation of the first Mexican Women's Team which along with some out of country players, participated in a tournament in Austin, Texas. Result, an overall finish of 3rd place and a great learning experience for Women's Ultimate in our country.

In Mexico, there are 7 national tournaments and since 2006 half of the tournaments have been divided into Open and Women's divisions. This has lead to the development of five women's teams across the country and a National Women's team which participated in the International University Ultimate Tournament in Medellin, Colombia. During this tournament the women players had the opportunity to share playing experiences with teams from Venezuela, Colombia and Panama. As of 2007 the development of the category increased remarkably in Mexico with the participation of 10 women's teams, a structure for the tournaments and higher level of play. During this year, a National Ultimate Women's Circuit was implemented with the main objective to formalize the category and competition in the country. The 2007 winning teams for the Women's Circuit are: Catarinas (1st place), UNAM (2nd place) and Luas (3rd place). The players from these 3 teams represent Mexico in Vancouver, reinforced with players from other Mexican teams and 2 players from the States.

Since this sport is not sponsored in our country and some of the players are still students, the team organized fundraising events including parties and raffles to help fund the trip. Our goal during the WUGC 2008 is to learn the most we can from other Ultimate Teams that have more experience. We want this tournament to be a learning experience so we can return to our country to apply what we learn and share with other teams and players all this knowledge to improve the level of play and attract more women to practice this sport.

New Zealand - Open - Manuka

New Zealand has had a competitive Ultimate scene since the late 80s and this year's Worlds open squad, Manuka, will represent the culmination of a up-and-coming scene.

The New Zealand teams have proven tough competitors on the international circuit. In 2004 at the last World Ultimate and Guts Championships in Finland, the New Zealand Mixed team finished 3rd. However this year New Zealand is sending 3 teams, spreading the best men and women of New Zealand ultimate across the open, women and master's teams.

New Zealand on Offence and Defence:

Suffice to say we have trained a bunch. Our solid core of potential has been super-heated in the furnace of fitness training, and cast into a unique mould. Our defence makes the turnovers, our offence will convert them. We will be down on the pull, clogging the cutting lanes, stopping opponent's cuts, bidding on every disc, owning the airspace and halting game runs.

We are a mix of experience levels, from the heady heights of über-veteran Peter Sisam (Coach) to the first-time internationals that are just aching to carve themselves out a place in Ultimate history.

Interesting Facts about Ultimate in New Zealand:

We share with the Australians the rather dubious honour of having to train for Worlds during the winter and we claim the unique distinction of playing Ultimate farther South in the hemisphere than anywhere in the world. So frosts, mud, rain and hail on the fields, hitting the gym before the sun comes up and doing sprints in the dark are all part and parcel of Manuka's preparation for this event.

Manuka (pronounced maa-nu-ka) means many things:

It is the name of a tree (also know as the tea-tree), whose wood is used in traditional maori weaponry. Sometimes manuka was partially burnt and its charred, blackened surface had sharp protrusions that made a nasty piece of equipment. We can not promise sharp protrusions, but we will certainly be dressed in black..

A well-known maori whakataurangi (proverb) is 'manuka takoto - kawea ake', that is 'the manuka has been laid down, pick it up'. In practice this means 'take up the challenge that has been laid down in front of you'. We see this tournament as the next in a long line of challenges that Manuka has already faced.

There is also 'puputia mai nga manuka' meaning 'bind together the manuka branches'. By itself, one piece of manuka can be easily broken, but bound together, many pieces (in this case 23) form an unbreakable whole.

Sweden - Open

Our team is based on players from Skogs Ultimate, which has been the dominating club team in Europe the last decade. The team also consists of players from all over Sweden. We have veterans who have been on the team since Worlds '94 as well as players who have played with top teams in the UPA championship division.

Sweden's trademark has always been athleticism, and this team is also very young and athletic.

Sweden has never finished lower than 4th place at Worlds and are always up there fighting for the gold. After losing the EUCC last year with 14-15 against GB we have been training even harder and are hungrier than ever.

To succeed this year, Sweden wants to show that they are as great as before, when we won gold in 1992 and silver in 1994, 1996 and 2000. We have a non-playing coach Lars Hamstein who brings the team good team spirit.

Switzerland - Open

After Swiss Club Teams have been among European Top Teams for quite some time now the National Team finally broke through at last years European Championships with a 3rd place finish after a close loss to later Champion GB and a convincing win over Finland in the Bronze medal game. With most of the core intact and some talented young players Switzerland Open is looking to prove its progress with finally making Quarters on the highest Stage!

USA - Masters

Team USA Masters is represented by the 2007 UPA Champions DoG based in Boston, Massachusetts. In its initial year of play in the Masters Division, DoG battled past long-time foes from Minnesota, San Francisco, Philadelphia and New York to claim the title.

About half of the team played for the Death or Glory (DoG) dynasty which dominated the sport from 1994-2000. The team won UPA championships for a record six consecutive years. Competing as the US representative, DoG also won WUGC titles in Jonkoping, Sweden in 1996-- where the team also proudly won the Spirit of the Game Award-- and in Heilbronn, Germany, in 2000. It also won the WUCC title in 1999 in St. Andrews, Scotland.

Look for USA Masters to showcase DoG's trademark styles. On offense, precision is the main weapon, with focus on space recognition, easy completions and scoring percentage. On defense, DoG wields its signature zone and innovative clam formations, along with one-on-one coverage -- often flexing seamlessly between sets. USA Masters' arsenal of strategy and hall-of-fame talent is strengthened by communication and synchronization among its players.

USA – Junior Open

The USA open juniors represent the best of American youth Ultimate. Drawn from all over the country, these are the most dedicated athletes, the most skilled competitors, the best teammates, and the most spirited players in the United

States. As with their successful 2004 and 2006 campaigns, the hallmarks of the Team USA Boys in 2008 will be relentless shut-down full-team defense, smart up-tempo offense, and the highest commitment to the spirit of the game. Our goals are to give a total effort on every point; to lift up our teammates and make them look good; to compete fairly, with unwavering respect for our opponents; and to make every game we play slightly more perfect than the last game. If we achieve these goals, we're going to have a lot of fun along the way.

USA – Junior Women

The U.S. National girls' team has a history of strong finishes on the world level and hopes to continue that streak in the 2008 World Ultimate Championships. In the past this team has combined some truly outstanding girls, many of whom have gone on to achieve great things on the College and Club circuits of the US Ultimate scene. The team consists of girls from 7 different states with a strong contingent from traditional Ultimate hotbeds Seattle, Atlanta, Massachusetts and Minnesota. 3 girls return from the 2006 team that won the gold medal against perennial powerhouse Canada. Since the geography of the US limits the amount of practice time to the week before this tournament, the girls have been actively involved in an on-line community each week. This community is designed to

help the team learn strategy, encouraging each other through personal workouts and learning about themselves through mental drill work. This year's team also consists of a very wide range of ages. There are several girls who have spent the past year playing college Ultimate and they are expected to play a major role in this team's performance. What might be unexpected is just how much contribution comes from a group of younger girls, some of whom have not yet started their junior years in high school. Watch out for them again in 2010! Through this competition the US national girls' team hopes to bring glory not only to the girls who play Ultimate in the US but also to the sport itself. This is a team of girls who love to play Ultimate and they look forward to sharing that love with the best in the world.

Team Bios

USA – women

Competing in Vancouver as Team USA, Fury is an elite women's club team based in California's San Francisco Bay Area. The team was founded in 1997 and over the past twelve years the team has won 4 UPA Club Championships [1999, 2003, 2006, and 2007]. This sustained success at the national level has enabled the team to compete internationally as well, representing the U.S.A. at three WUGCs (2000, 2004, and 2008) and one WUCC (2002) and receiving a sponsored trip to Japan for the 2008 Club Jr. Dream Cup. To date, Fury's highest Worlds finish was a bronze medal in Turku, Finland, in 2004.

The honor of competing as Team USA and the drive to earn Fury's first international gold medal has helped shape the team's 2008 season. Adding five talented players to its roster and returning all but three of the players from 2007, Fury now carries a squad of 26 women. This roster has the depth and versatility to handle the demands of an intense six-day tournament in Vancouver and is guided by the wisdom and calm of Matty Tsang, Fury's coach since 2006.

Fury's 2008 tournament schedule also reflected a determined focus on peaking in August. Kicking off its international preparation by playing the Japanese National Team in March, Fury will have also played tough competition from Canada, Great Britain, and Australia before the start of Opening Ceremonies. After months of preparation on the field, with the chalkboard, and at the track, Fury is now ready to show the world the highest level of women's ultimate in the U.S.

USA Mixed

Team USA is from Seattle, Washington and is also known as Shazam Returns. Since its beginnings in 2002 as simply "Shazam" the team has enjoyed varied success at the US National Championships, taking 3rd in 2002, 9th in 2005 and winning the championship in 2004. In 2007, a core group of players from prior Shazam teams decided to make a run again for the US National Championship, knowing that the winners would have the chance to represent the USA at the world tournament. As Shazam Returns, the team was comprised of players with a wide range of ages and experience. Some players experienced their first major ultimate tournament with Shazam Returns in 2007, while others had been to nationals and international tournaments many times. The team's success in 2007 was built upon confidence in each teammate and not relying upon any one player. Utilizing a wide-open rotation, Shazam Returns won tournaments in San Francisco, Boston and Seattle, losing only one game during the season. Having gone undefeated in two qualifying tournaments, Shazam Returns succeeded in making it to the US national tournament.

Sporting capes courtesy of Five Ultimate, the team battled for four days in Florida. Losing only one game, Shazam Returns won the championship for the second time and earned the right to represent the United States in Vancouver in 2008. Its strategy of playing with a deep roster and playing within themselves was successful.

Shazam Returns' mascot is a superhero from a 70's TV show who turns into his super-self by shouting "Shazam". Lightning strikes him and he takes on super-strength and speed, and the ability to fly. At the end of each episode, he would relate a moral to the audience about how to live better. Team USA has embraced this concept and applied it to ultimate. At each practice, an individual player brings one point of focus or one idea to the forefront. The team focuses on playing high quality ultimate with great spirit and passion for the game. Through trust in each other and pushing each other to play better, harder and smarter, this group of teammates has found success and developed a bond that they will never forget.

Guts Overview

Guts Frisbee is an extreme sport featuring lightning-fast throws and incredible one-handed catches. Invented in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan in 1958, this ultra-high-speed game has spread all over the world, from Japan to Great Britain and from Ireland to Taiwan. Like a martial arts battle with 110 grams of plastic, the sport is exciting and often awe-inspiring for cheering crowds that have been estimated at as many 8,000 for a single match.

Guts is played by firing the disc at the opposing 5-man team lined up fingertip to fingertip 15 yards, 11 inches away. Typical flight time is less than a second. If the "shot" isn't caught cleanly in one hand, either on first impact, or after being deflected into the air, the thrower's team scores a point and the player hit with the disc must throw the return shot. If the disc is thrown short, high, wide, vertical, or upside down, the receiving team scores a point and can have their best thrower take the next shot. If the disc is caught, no point is scored and the catcher throws the return shot. Each game is played to 21 points and requires a minimum two point margin of victory.

Research Projects

To The Ultimate Community,

My name is Andrew Thornton. I am a University professor working and living in London (UK) as well as a long time Ultimate Player: I started playing while in Graduate School in Toronto in 1992. I currently play for 'Fire of London'. [See my University website: <http://www.roehampton.ac.uk/staff/AndrewThornton/>]

I am hoping to conduct some research on/with Ultimate players and organisers at WUGC 2008. I have previously conducted and published research on Ultimate Frisbee, in particular on issues of the gender split in Mixed ('co-ed') Ultimate.

My current research concerns organisational changes and practices in Ultimate culture. As such I would like to be able to speak to players and organisers about what's happening in their country and organisations. I realise that all players, coaches and organisers will be very busy, but I will appreciate any time that people might be able to volunteer. Ideally, I would like to conduct short interviews with at least one representative from each country and potentially from each level of play (e.g. Women, Mixed, Open, Masters, Junior). I will be available to talk to as many players and coaches as possible over the course of the tournament, even if for just a short informal chat. I will be happy to share my findings with anyone who requests it.

The WUGC is a rare opportunity to meet up with players and organisers from around the world and see how the game is developing. [However, my research is not on the scale of the UPA's 'Ultimate Revolution' as I am just one person!] My research is not evaluative, rather it is exploratory. I am particularly interested in the degree to which the increasing scale of Ultimate may or may not be affecting how the game is played, the Spirit of the Game and how players perceive these changes. I would also be happy to receive any comments via email on what's happening with Ultimate in your part of the world.

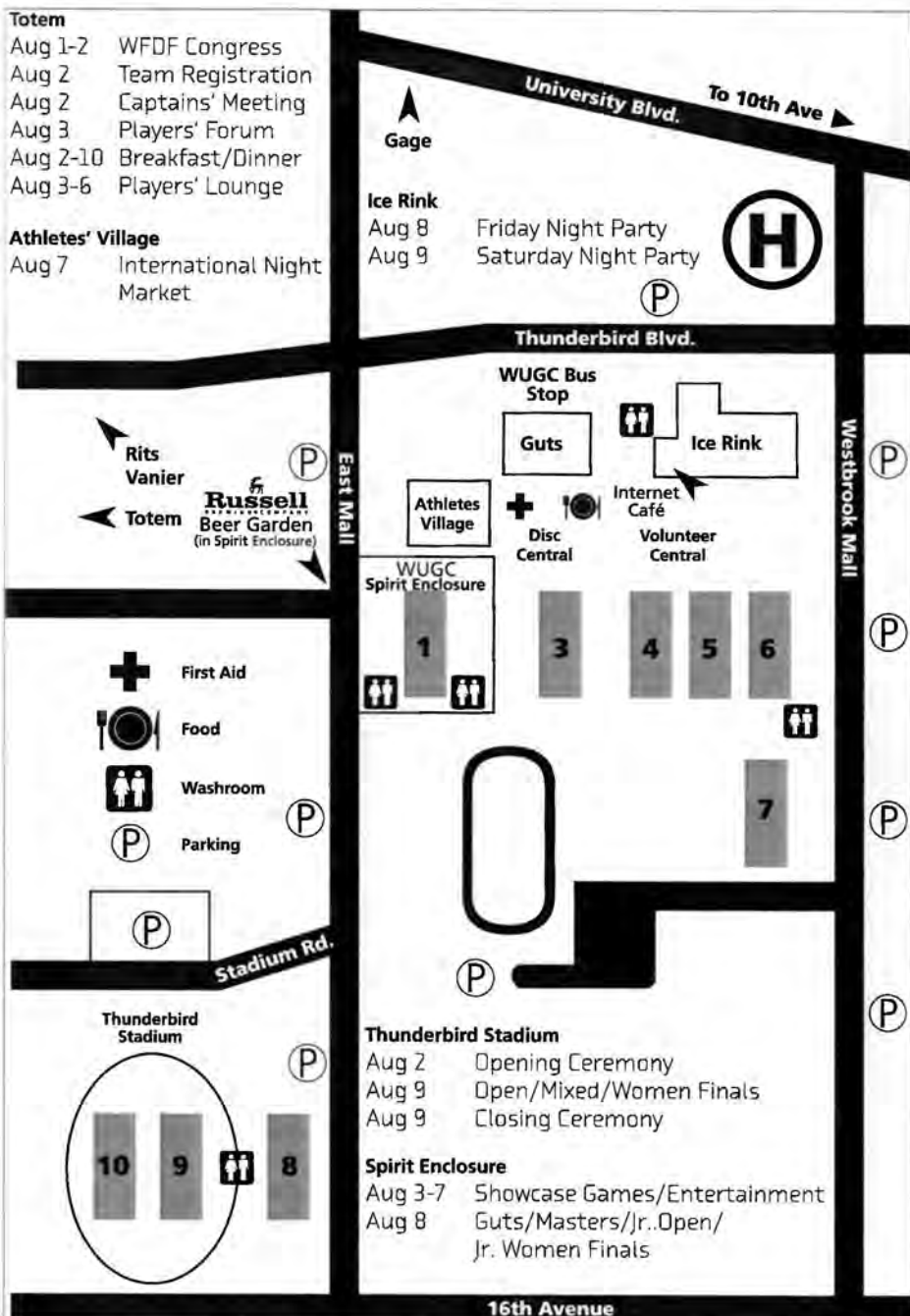

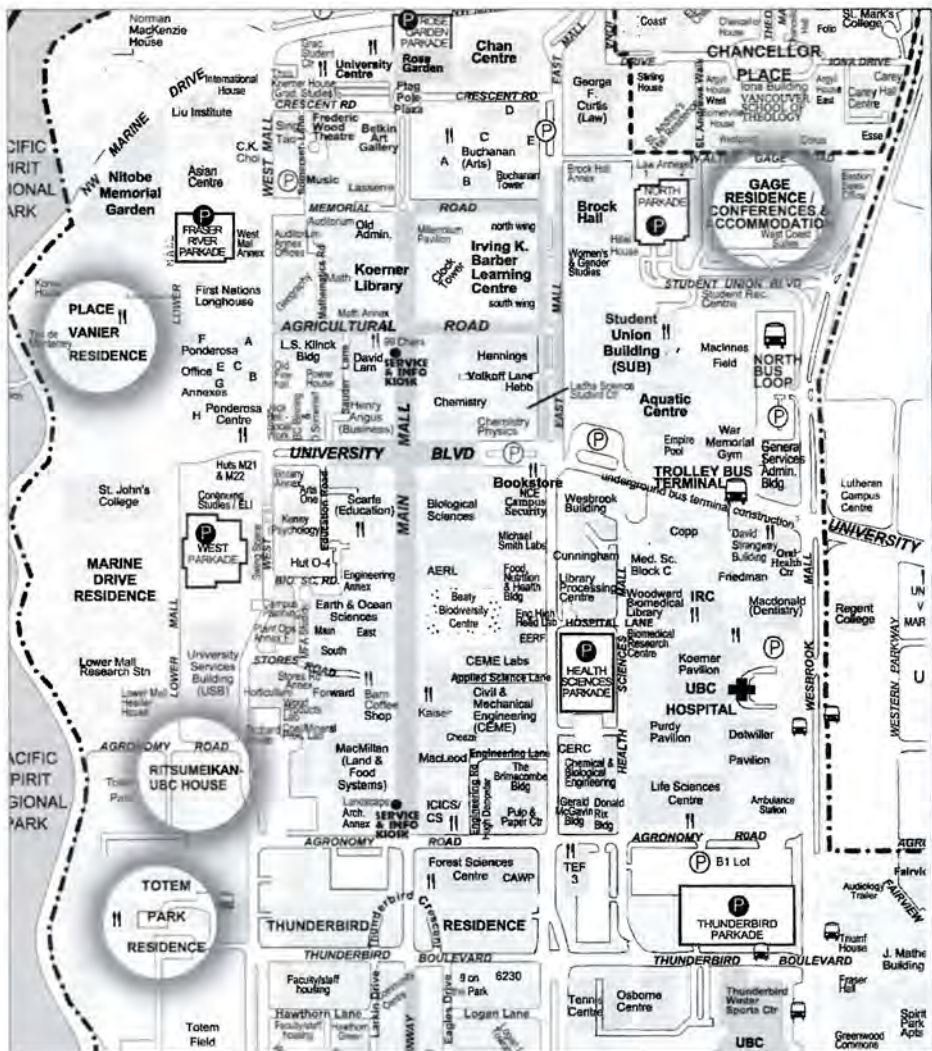

WFDF Requirements

WFDF Tournament Rules Group (TRG)

The TRG is established to arbitrate in on-field and off-field disputes between players, staff and members of the public. The TRG shall be established at the 2008 WUGC Captains Meeting. The TRG is chaired by the Chair of the Ultimate Committee or their delegated representative, and includes the TD of the event, or their delegated representative, and one player from each division represented at the event.

The TRG will address formal requests, complaints or protests about any issue concerning on-field or off-field activities. Requests, complaints or protests may be brought to the attention of TRG by any Team Captain or Team Representative, identified before the tournament. Requests, complaints or protests may be brought at any time during the period starting from the end of the captains Meeting to midnight on the final day of play at the tournament.

Upon receipt of a request, complaint or protest the TRG will meet at its earliest convenience and make a decision available to all parties involved at least two (2) hours before the start of play the following day. The TRG for any request, complaint or protest shall be composed of the Chair of the Ultimate Committee, the TD and the elected player from the division in which there is a perceived difficulty. The decision shall be posted where players may have access to read the outcome.

The TRG may, at its discretion, disqualify a player or an entire team from any event or from the entire tournament whenever that player or team exhibits violent, obscene, abusive, disruptive or illegal behaviour; cheats or otherwise attempts to create an unfair advantage for themselves or disadvantages others through circumvention of the rules; or otherwise causes substantial hardship, inconvenience or annoyance to spectators, officials or players.

The TRG may also censor an individual player or team orally or in writing; alter or nullify the result of any event; or order an event to be partially or completely replayed.

In the event of an extremely serious conduct violation the TRG may, after disqualifying a player or team from competition, refer the matter for later review and sanctioning actions by the WFDF Board of Directors.

If any member of the TRG has a vested interest in any matter put to the TRG that member shall be withdrawn to be replaced by their representative, or in the case of an elected player another elected player from another division. Should two or more members of the TRG have a vested interest in the matter put to the TRG they shall be replaced by unbiased WFDF elected officials available at the tournament. These shall initially be Board members or members of the Ultimate Committee.

Rules & Regulations

If an issue is brought to the TRG that effects the general interest of all or a group of teams participating in the tournament, the TRG may call an advisory Captains' Meeting of all or selected teams. The calling of such a meeting does not in any way reduce the powers of the TRG and the TRG is in no way bound to suggestions or decisions made by such a Captains' Meeting.

Any player or team disqualified from the tournament shall forfeit all fees paid.

If any player or team, or group of teams, chooses to challenge a decision made by the TRG in the course of handling a request, complaint or protest during a WFDF World Ultimate Championship tournament, they should file a written protest to the WFDF Board of Directors within 30 days of occurrence.

WFDF Rules of Ultimate 2008

- a receiver must be slowing down quickly and in a straight line after they catch the disc, and may throw at any time while slowing down and in-bounds

Pick can only be called by the defender who is picked [16.4.1]

Only a team captain can call a Timeout between points [19.5]

Significant Changes

Clarified what is and isn't good spirit [1.3.4, 1.3.5, 1.3.6, 1.6.4]

Stall count can be started if thrower's momentum has taken them out of bounds [9]

Redefines what happens after a fast count near a stall-out [13.3]

Clarifies what happens if play continues after a turnover [13.10]

New rule regarding player safety [15.2]

Blocking foul [15.7]

Redefined "Disc Space" [16.2.1.3]

Removed reference to "failure to come to an agreement" resulting in the call being contested [16.1]

WFDF Qualifying System for WFDF Ultimate World Games Events

1. WFDF: WFDF is the contact organization for the International World Games Association with respect to Flying Disc Ultimate, a competition sport in the sports program of the World Games.

2. Qualifying Event: The qualifying event for World Games will be the most recent Ultimate World Championship event which was held at least 8 months prior to World Games.

3. Divisions: The following divisions will primarily be used to determine which countries qualify for World Games: Open, Women, Mixed.

In the event of a tie, results from the other divisions as well as 'Spirit of the game' results will be used as tiebreakers.

4. Ultimate World Cup Point Scoring System

4.1. Team World Cup Points

In each division a country will score points according to the following system:

Place = Final Placing of Team

Points = World Cup Points awarded

4.2. Country World Cup Points: For World Games Qualifiers a country scores the total of points which are scored in the relevant divisions. A country which is not represented in a division will, for this division, score one point less than the country which finished last.

5. Spirit Score

5.1. Scoring System: Spirit scores will be scored for each game according to the official "WFDF SOTG Scoresheet 2008".

WFDF Qualifying System for WFDF Ultimate World Games Events, *cont.*

5.2. Team Spirit Score: At the end of the tournament each team will receive a Spirit Score average which will be calculated by the total of all Spirit Scores divided by the number of games played/scored.

5.3. Combined Country Spirit Score: A combined spirit score will be calculated by the total of all Spirit Scores divided by the number of divisions taken into account.

6. World Games Ranking: The teams will be ranked according to the following criteria. This criteria is applied in the order it is listed below. In the case of a tie, the next criterion is applied to the tied countries only. This is repeated until the tie has been resolved. Countries will be allocated bids in the World Games in the order determined by this ranking.

- * Number of World Cup Points scored

(Higher ranking for greater amount of points)

- * Number of World Cup Points scored in all divisions (Higher ranking for greater amount of points)

- * Spirit Score average for Open, Women's, & Mixed divisions (Higher ranking for greater average)

- * Combined country Spirit Score for all divisions. (Higher ranking for greater average)

- * Final place of the team in the Mixed division (Higher ranking for higher finish)

7. Participation of host country in 2009

In order to earn a bid to participate in the 2009 World Games the host country (Chinese Taipei) is required to register a team and participate in the World Ultimate and Guts Championships 2008 in Ultimate play in either:

- a) the Mixed division or
- b) the Open and the Women's division.
