

Dear All Ultimate & Guts Players,

In Japan, we have a proverb that human beings can turn damage into power to find happiness.

On March 11, 2011, disastrous Earthquakes and Tsunami attacked Eastern Japan, and Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant exploded. The damages were huge. In fact the magnitude of the earthquake was one of the biggest ever experienced by mankind and the tsunami was the most powerful in these 1,000 years. We were terribly shocked by the serious damages, but Japan Flying Disc Association (JFDA) wasted no time in sending relief aid to the victims including soft discs to school physical educators. Many schools in affected area were turned into evacuation centers and children could not have enough space for sports. 3 months later, we started Tohoku (Northeastern Japan) Ultimate League Matches to cheer up disc players and families in disaster area.

As early as only 3 weeks after the disaster, JFDA decided to challenge another big project to "host World Ultimate and Guts Championships [WUGG]". 20 years have already passed since we hosted WUGG in Utsunomiya. As Japanese Yen is too strong against US dollars and Euro, maybe now is not a good time to invite disc players from overseas. However, we really need many players from overseas in WUGC2012 SAKAI. Sakai City and Western Japan have not been affected by the radioactive contamination. Nonetheless, many foreign visitors stopped coming to Japan, even Western Japan. Western Japan is safe, Your participation is a GREAT support to Japan. Much to our delight, World Flying Disc Federation (WFDF) understands our aspiration and decided to have the next WUGC in Sakai. We, at JFDA thank WFDF and the disc family in the world for your warm friendship from the bottom of our heart.

On behalf of JFDA, I invite you to "the meaningful World Ultimate & Guts Championships" in Sakai, Osaka, Japan from July 7 to 14,

As you all know, WUGC2012 SAKAI acts as a qualifier for World Games 2013 Cali, Columbia under the patronage of the International Olympic Committee. The top 5 countries of WUGC2012 SAKAI will qualify for the Games.

WUGC2012 SAKAI bears the unlucky number "13"th WUGC. But PLEASE come to Japan. We want to ask all WFDF member countries, especially the countries that have never joined World Championships to participate WUGC2012 SAKAI. Your participation will certainly show "the Power of Flying Disc" and "Human beings can turn damage into power to find happiness" to the world. We look forward to seeing you in WUGC2012 SAKAI!


Kinesio Taping Service

No-Smoking



The winning team is the team with the most players left in the infield when the game clock reaches 0.0nly backhand and forehand throws are allowed. Passes between players in the infield or players along the same side of the court in the outfield are not allowed. A player is out if a disc hits any part of their body. A disc that lands on a line belongs to the team that touched it last. Stepping on a line is a foul. DBJA referees will referee all matches.



Saturday dawned with thunderstorms threatened, but we ended up with just a brief torrential downpour before the skies cleared in time for the opening ceremony and feature games. After being warned at the captains meeting not to steal golf carts, or play to more than 17 points under any circumstances, everyone except the Japan and New Zealand open teams made their way to the main field stands to watch the brief opening ceremony. The Sakai Sparrow Dance Federation and the Japanese Takio Drummers "Miyako" entertained us, and a few words from organisers and dignitaries led us to the first feature game between the Open teams from Japan and New Zealand. Japan was a clear favourite to win, but the vocal crowd was very happy to see the Kiwis score early on. There were glimpses of some excellent play on both teams but the Japanese really played very precisely and pulled away from the New Zealanders, leading 9-4 at half. Although the Kiwis tightened up a bit in the second half end eliminated some errors, there was no stopping the Japanese team and they comfortably took the game 17-9. The second game on the beautifully prepared main field was a womans division game between Japan and Australia. Again Japan were expected to win and they pulled out a 9-4 lead to take half with a game full of control and precision. While Australia came out strong after the break and scored a couple of unanswered points to get to 9-6, that was as close as they got and Japan just pulled away again to take WFDF2012

the game 17-10. (continued)



The final game on day 1 was played under lights on the main fields, and by this time the wind had dropped as well as the temperature -this might have helped the Finns a little in their mixed game against the Canadian team, but Canada had this one in the bag from the first point. A huck from Artturi Koronen to a diving Jussi Kituso in the zone brought the Finns their only first half point. Although both sides turned over more often than expected, the Canadians seemed to take more quick advantage of turns near the zone and scored many of their points with a single pass from a turnover. They couldn't close out the second half scoreless though, and the Finns grabbed a second goal before going down 17-2 in just 60 minutes. Mirroring the mixed result, the other result from day one was the Finnish and Canadian Open game. The Canadians easily took this 17-6, with a commanding second half performance letting the Finns score just once. Tomorrow sees the main tournament kick off with full use of the fields and even the weather seems to be co-operating with the thunderstorms not due to appear again until mid-week.

Gak started playing Ultimate in the mid 90s, his domination of chasing plastic began when he was still at high school and since then he's chalked up at least three World bronze medals, one World Games silver and four Australian open championships for his club side Chilly. 

Brilliant sunshine with just a few clouds meant conditions today were perfect for Ultimate and with all the grass fields full it really started to feel like a World Championship tournament. There were quite a few games today and a couple of surprises. First up the NZ women had their first game and it was against Great Britain - a game they knew would be hard but knew if everything clicked they would have a good chance. Both sides played well and the game came down to a golden point in timecap which GB finally managed to take. The kiwis were disappointed with the result but pleased with the performance and I'm sure GB are pleased and relieved. Before today, I don't think any Australian team had beaten a US team at a worlds tournament and today saw Australia finally triumph. The Open Masters team from down under beat the USA 16-13 with legendary Tom 'Gak' Rogacki leading the scoring with 5 goals and 2 assists. By the end of the thoroughly entertaining game there was a large audience watching and I think it was a popular result with the fans. I don't think you'll get the smile off the Aussie faces until much later this week.

Back in the Women's division there was a top of the table clash between USA and Canada on the main field (S1) this afternoon and the large crowd was treated to one of the best women's games I have ever seen. The standard of play was excellent and both teams were happy to play an impressive long game at times. It was always going to be close and the US started well and kept the lead until just into the second half when Canada finally pulled ahead 11-10. This was the start of a great push by the Canadian women and they mercilessly pressed home point after point with the US only managing one more goal on the way to a Canadian victory 16-12 in timecap. Not a great day for the US teams.

The final game of the day was a masters clash between Japan and France. Many people expected Japan to run away with this but after three points it was a massively fired up French team ahead 2-1. Unfortunately for the spectators this didn't carry on and Japan went on a huge 9 goal streak to really break the spirit of the French team before comfortably winning 17-7.

Tomorrow the artificial turf fields come into play as well with Ultimate taking over the soccer fields for the next few days. The first Women Masters and Guts games start on Tuesday, and there are a lot of pool play games. On Monday, games to watch include Canada vs Australia in the Women's, Australia vs GB in the mixed and USA vs Japan in the Open Masters.

WFDF conducts first ever elections to Athlete's Commission at WUGC —Athlete's representation with three members to be elected—

WFDF for the first time ever conducts elections to the WFDF Athlete's Commission during WUGC 2012 in Sakai and has announced the candidates for the election. Seven candidates have been nominated by their respective Member associations, with three members to be chosen:

- Matt DOYLE (Canada)
- Adam GOFF (USA)
- Anna HAYNES (Australia)
- Bernhard OTTO (Germany)
- Piero PISANO (Italy)
- Ryan PURCELL (South Africa)
- Valeska SCHACHT (Germany)

The full biographies and candidate statements of the candidates can be found on the WFDF website. To be eligible, a candidate must be a participant in the current WUGC or have participated in a World Championship within the previous four years.

The purpose of the WFDF Athletes Commission is to promote open communication with, and solicit feedback from, flying disc athletes, and give them a formal role in the decision-making process of WFDF.

"I am extremely excited that we have interest from such high quality candidates possessing significant experience in Ultimate. The enthusiastic response from WFDF's Members was larger than we expected," stated WFDF President Nob Rauch. "As a player-oriented sport, we remain fully committed that the viewpoint of the athletes should always be our primary

The Commission will consist of three members, comprised of a Chair and two ordinary members, with at least one representative of each gender. The term of office for Commission members will be two years. So please do not forget to cast your vote and hand in the election form at the registration desk.



GB took half 9-6 but Australia came out firing and scored 7 seven of the first 9 points after half. That took them to time cap and a couple of traded points later, Australia found themselves the victors 16-14. It's no surprise to see Gak with an amazing seven of his teams points for the game, AS WELL as 5 assists!

Clearly our research technique of eavesdropping on the Aussie Masters team over dinner could be improved on.

First Doping Tests in the History of WUGC

- Significant Progress in WFDF's Anti-Doping Program-

Since the WFDF Anti-Doping Program Plan 2011-2013 was approved by the WFDF Congress last year, out-of-competition testing has been successfully conducted prior to the WUGC 2012. WFDF and the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) had previously agreed on the anti-doping testing plan. WFDF in particular is required to conduct in-competition testing during the WUGC 2012. Nine WFDF Registered Testing Pool (RTP) athletes were selected from 6 countries for out-of-competition testing overall. Of those RTP athletes, 3 were randomly selected and tested with the support of the Japan Anti-Doping Agency (JADA) during their stay in Sakai. The results of the out-of-competition testing will be available within several days. "The WUGC 2012 is also the qualifying event for The 2013 World Games, so doping testing is very important," said Volker Bernardi, Executive Director of WFDF and Chair of the Doping Control Panel (DCP), at the captains meeting on Saturday, July 7th. WFDF will conduct additional tests on the day of the Finals, ensuring that the teams being crowned as World Champions and qualifying for the World Games have "played true" as stated by the WADA slogan.

The athletes for the in-competition testing will be randomly selected. If you have any questions, please contact the WFDF's doping control professionals at the WFDF Office, Dream Camp building, 2nd floor. Additional information including the 2012 version of the prohibited drug list is available at the Anti-Doping Information booth at the registration desk located in the

"Spirit of the game," the essence of ultimate, and "play true," the slogan of WADA, are the common ideals of fair play. Although a challenge, we are all hoping to have successful doping testing in this event. It will be a remarkable turning point of the history of WFDF and flying disc sports.

Open Final USA 17-5 GBR

The Open Final saw the United States versus Great Britain in the first time the Brits had made it to the final in the Open division in any Ultimate world championship. With the Open final being the last of the day, the wind picked up a bit and the sun came out, and it showed as Great Britain missed three or four crucial passes early. USA was able to capitalize and went up 3-0. Great Britain took a timeout in order to calm the game down and was able to score their first two goals off the handling of Daniel Furnell. The USA, however, answered back, and even though most points had two or three turns, USA was always able to put the last point in. USA took half 9-3 after a strategy change to "walk the disc in", chanting "five yards at a time" from the sideline. During halftime, Great Britain attempted to get fired up by doing shuttle runs and an inspirational halftime speech. This looked like it would work at first right out of half as Britain converted their first break, making the score 10-5. USA's walk it in strategy kept on paying dividends, however, as they scored the next seven points with no answer from Great Britain to win the final 17-5.





Women's Final JPN 17 - 13 USA

The fans crowded into the stadium early in preparation for this hotly anticipated matchup between Team USA and Team Japan, a rematch of their game from round robin play on Tuesday. Japan won that game 16-14 after Team USA rallied to tie the game 14-14. The match started out under overcast skies with little to no wind as Fury dominated early, coming out 5-2 on their tight man defense and burst offense by Alex Snyder and Cree Howard. Japan turned the disc quite a bit in the first few points on long hucks that failed to connect. USA then started to play zone, a look they had tried in the Tuesday game. It seemed to work as first as they generated a couple turns, but Japan quickly figured the zone out and started a run. USA, on the other hand, seemed to lose patience in the end zone and started throwing floaty blades that were easily contested by team Japan. Japan rallied to take half 9-8 with the crowd supporting them every step of the way. After halftime, USA continued to play zone, but it was clear at this point that it was not effective. The Japanese offense tightened up and stopped taking risks with the disc, and the US offense responded by doing the same, walking the next few points into the endzone, as the two rivals traded three breaks. At 14-12 Japan, the crowd was treated to a nailbiting point with quite a few turns. After a timeout was called, it was clear that both teams needed to score this point more than everything - the USA to remain in the game, and Japan to put the nail in the coffin. Japan scored on a throw from Oyama Ayu to Yonehara Rie to make it 15-12, and the US was unable to come back. Final score: 17-13 Japan. After Ito Madoka got the final point and was mobbed by her teammates, many a Japan play began to shed tears of joy - it was clear how much this game meant to them to be able to win in their home country in front of hundreds of their fans.

Mixed Final CAN 17-9 AUS

The Mixed Final featured Canada, a team who so far in the tournament had yet to be challenged, beating all opponents handily, versus Australia, a team with a tougher road through finals, staving off a skilled Japanese team 16-13 in the semis. The two teams had previously met on Tuesday, where Canada crushed the Barramundis 17-5. Australia came in looking for revenge. It was not to be, however, as the all-star Canadian team quickly ran away with the game. The Canadians went up 3-1 early, and then it was Mark Leduc time: the longtime Team Canada Mixed player scored the next 5 points for Canada as Canada and Australia traded breaks, making it 7-5 Canada. Canada then began to pull away both before and after half, relying on the consistent play of brothers Jeremy and Justin Norden, who played on the defensive and offensive lines, respectively. That remained the story through the end of the game, as Canada walked away with the 17-9 victory. Australia was able to hold on a few points with the gutty defense of tall man Gavin Moore and the offensive connection of John Damiani and Tegan Sneddon, but ultimately was not able to make a dent in Canada's perfect offensive set. Canada finished as the most dominant team in any division in the tournament, with no opponent able to score double digits on them.
