*** 'JT' ON '81 SERIES DISC ***

Our very own Jim 'JT' Tompkins is the subject of the 1981 Series Disc, and is now destined for a place in frisbee history held by a select few. JT was doing a demo out at Damascus with Michael "Cap'n Snap" Conger, when a newspaperman took this shot of JT making a "figure four" catch. Since he had signed some release forms, JT was completely unaware of his impending immortality until he recieved some frisbees in the mail. Our heartiest congratulations!!!

These discs are the official NAFDS frisbees, and are sold at every NAFDS tournament, and, of course, become collectors items every fall. They are available in red green, blue, and black (each color also with gold), and in the standard three sizes, 119, 141, and 165 (The 165 is from the new 81-E mold).

PAST SERIES FRISBEES -

- 1976 - The first year. Called the National Championship Series, Jimmy Scala is the subject. Only available in 119 and 141. Besides the clear ones, a few were made with yellow plastic. They're ugly but extremely valuable. The black "Jimmy" in mint condition consistently brings over \$100 at auctions. It is probably the most valuable non-antique frisbee today.
- 1977 - John Bird is the subject on this one. The "Bird" is also only available in 119 and 141, and were also called National Championship Series.
- 1978 - Dave Marini. Toronto was added to the series meets, and so the series were called the North American Series. This is the first year that three models were available - 119, 141, and 165.
- 1979 - Jo Cahow became the first woman to grace the NAS frisbee. Our "in house experts" call the '79 Jo the most non-breakable series disc ever.
- 1980 - Jay Beukelman. NAS was changed to the North American Flying Disc Series. The frisbees were all two color 'bees for the first time. They have gold foil with each of the other basic colors.
- 1981 - JT - our very own JT doing a figure four catch. These ought to be a hot item in the DC area for a while to come. They are available at every NAFDS tournament, and we're working on a deal to get them at a discount so you can get them cheaper. Look for info in issues to come.

WHAT IS A SERIES TOURNAMENT ANYWAY?

The NAFDS is a series of tournaments throughout the year and all over the country. At each tournament two main events are featured. For placing in the top 30, "series points" are awarded (30 points for 1st, 1 point for 30th, etc.) At the end of the series (usually the first week in August), the top point getters are invited to compete in the World Frisbee Championships, held at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, California. The top point getter in that tournament is declared world champion and gets his and her name on Wham-O's frisbees. The men's champ for the last two years is 18 yr. old Scott Zimmerman, from, you guessed it, the Washington Area Frisbee Club (but he moved to Calif. last month). The Women's champ is G. Rose, whose name also adorns this year's model (no, we don't know what the 'G' stands for).

BURKE LAKE OPENS!

The Burke Lake Golf Course, designed by nationally famous frisbee golfer, Dennis Loftus, is now open. It's by the little kiddy train station and the ampitheatre. It's beautiful; look for a tournament there soon.

MONEY GOLF TOURNY

A big golf tournament will be held on April 11-12 at College Park. There are four divisions: open, women, junior (under 16), and senior (over 30). There will be cash prizes in the open division, and trophies for the top three in every division. The entry fee is \$15 (\$10 of which will go to sweeten up the cash prize pot). Pre-register by mail: Maryland Parks and Planning Commission.

Rumors have it that some big names will be at this one; Mike "Cap'n Snap" Conger, Dennis Loftus, and Craig Hunter are expected.

MORE RUMORS

The big wigs in the D.G.A. (Disc Golf Assoc.) are considering having two extremely large and lucrative tournaments this summer; one on the West Coast and one on the East Coast. Sites have not been picked yet, but the Eastern tourny will probably be either in the NY area or the DC area. This will be a big boon for our club - so hang on (and write your Congressman, or at least your DGA rep)

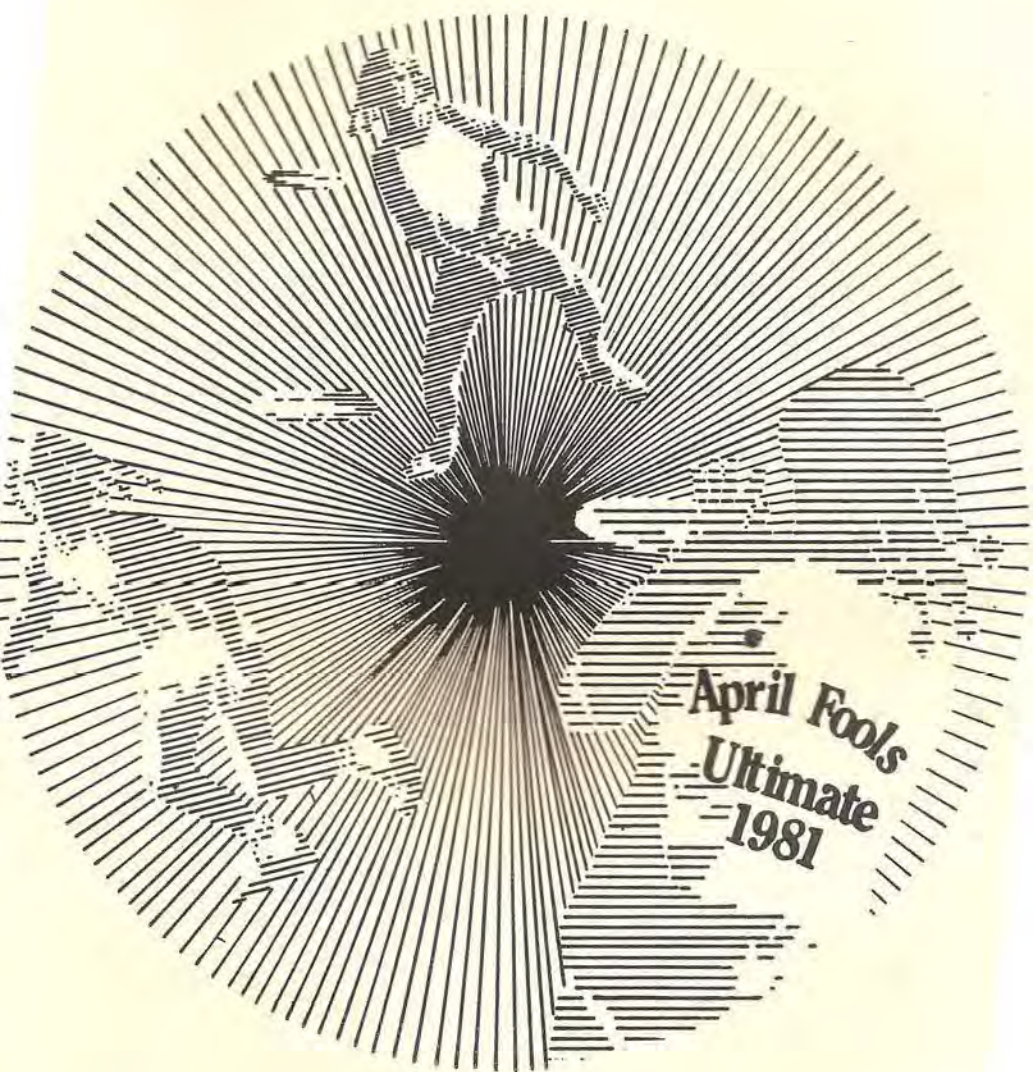

ULTIMATE - SPIRIT AND TRADITION

The stereotype of frisbee as a counterculture sport is not too far off the mark. The first thing a newcomer might notice during an ultimate game is the informality of it all and the lack of referees. These two aspects of the game help make Ultimate a "sport" in the truest sense of the word.

Ultimate frisbee was invented by high school students, and so was played as a game among friends. When these students went off to college and started teams, the game began to be played at the intercollegiate level, yet still among friends. Although it was fairly competitive, the attitude was not one of "win at all costs."

Ultimate is the only team sport in which it is impossible to score by yourself. Teamwork is essential. This aspect of the game is indicative of the attitude that pervades the entire game. The camaraderie displayed between ultimate teams simply does not exist at the top levels of other sports. Sure, there's competition allright, even intense competition, but it's FRIENDLY competition (which is what a sport should be). Players may take winning seriously (they don't do wind sprints at practice for nothing), but they don't take losing very seriously. It may be a cliché, but it's true that for a lover of ultimate, it is 100 times better to have played in a friendly competitive game and lose than not to have played at all.

Why? Because we like to PLAY frisbee - running, throwing, catching, and playing is fun. It's so much fun that teams come to April Fools from as far away as Boston and Michigan and Atlanta to compete in a tournament that carries no title or prize money. And that, fellow frisbee friends, is the spirit of April Fools Ultimate - 1981.

THE DRAW-- How the Schedule was determined

Qualifying Rounds- Friday

The first 6 teams that were turned down for a "bye" into the Saturday rounds are the teams in the 3-team divisions. The last 8 teams to join are the teams in the 4-team divisions. The first three rounds are for seeding purposes only. Then the 14 teams play single elimination down to 4 teams.

The only 2 teams to get a bye in the first round of the single elimination round are the first place teams from the 4-team divisions. The other first place teams play the two fourth place teams, and all the second place teams play third place teams. For each bracket leading to a wild card position, there is one team from each division, so it is impossible for two teams to play each other twice.

Because of the bracket design, if two of the best four teams are in the same division (or if 3 of the best are in 2 divisions, or if all 4 best are in 3 divisions), they will be able to qualify without having to eliminate each other.

We believe that this is the best and fairest way to reduce the 14 teams to 4 teams in one day. The only way this structure might be unfair is if 3 of the 4 best teams are all in one division, and we believe that this has not happened.

Teams that are eliminated are invited and encouraged to say and play pick-up games on empty fields, play golf, and/or spectate. These teams may also be able to find housing at the park or without other players during the day. We wish we could have provided housing for all, but, the host team (Ultimate Air and Space) has only 18 players, and there are 34 visiting teams.

The four Wild Card teams are assigned to Divisions in Saturday's play randomly, since there is no way anyone could determine who will win, and if they did, which wild card they would end up as.

Saturday's Rounds

The top 3 teams from the National Championships held in Atlanta during Thanksgiving week were put into different divisions, as well as one other regional finalist (Yellow Springs, since, of every regional finalist, they came closest to winning, losing by only one point in double overtime). The rest of the teams were divided up geographically, and seeded strictly according to how they fared in the Regionals last November.

(Glass)Boro, Boston, and MSU get fourth seeded teams in their division, and Yellow Springs gets two third seeded teams. The other third seeded team must go with Boro, Boston, or MSU, and was put with Boro, by virtue of Boro's first place finish at the Nationals. Boro, Atlanta, and WUFO go together, and the rest of the divisions fall into place.

The schedule was then designed so, of the non-wild card teams, there are no two teams from the same region in the same division. Also, no team plays more than two games in a row, and when they do, they always play an opponent who also plays two games in a row. Additionally, no team plays on the same field more than twice.

We did the best we could in designing this draw, trying to match teams up with balanced ability while also trying to get teams to play other teams that they have never played before. REMEMBER, this is a festival, so we can enjoy Ultimate with our Ultimate friends from all over the East, Mid-West, and South--this is not at a tournament.

THE TEAMS

Glassboro - Defending World Champs for the last two years. This ~~is~~ team is simply "the best."

Boston - 1980 runner up at the Nationals, losing to 'Boro 12-11 in the ~~if~~inals 1980 winner of the New England Regionals, and second place in the 1979 N.E. finals.

Michigan State - powerhouse of the Mid-West. Winners of the Central Regionals in 1980, 1979, 1978, and 1977. At the Nationals, finished third in both the last two years, losing to 2nd place Boston 15-13 in 1980, losing to 2nd place Santa Barbara, 11-10 in 1979.

Yellow Springs - the second strongest team in the mid-west. Lost to Mich, State last year for the right to compete in the Natioanla by one in double overtime. Was also runner up to M.S.U. in 1979.

Cornell - 2nd place in the N.E. Regionals in 1980, first place (over Boston) in 1979. Also won the Eastern Championships in 1977. A strong team that usually manages to beat 'Boro once a year.

Knights of Nee - 1980 winners of April Fools, beating 'Boro in the finals by one. Was runner up at April Fools (losing to 'Boro) in 1979 and 1978. Finished third in the hotly contested Mid-Atlantic Regional.

Whhopic - from Wocester Polytech. Frankly, we had never hear of this team until we read that they made it to the final four in the N.E. Regionals before losing to the eventual winners, Boston.

Atlanta - a combination of two teams, the Peaches and the Doctors of the Disc. The Doctors made it to the final four of the South regional, the Peaches also qualified for the South Regional.

Univ. of Virginia - 3rd place at April Fools all three previous years. Made it to the final four of tehMid-Atlantic regional, before losing to 'Boro. They are the strongest team in the Mid-AtIantic South section year after year.

Ultimate Air and Space - your host team from Washington D.C. Made their best showing last year by knocking off the #1 team from Pennsylvania and making it to the final eight of thh M.A.Regional, before losing to Univ.Va.

Univ. of Michigan - their first trip out east. Made it to the finals of the 1980 Spring Central Regionals, losing to Mich. State 26-23. Many veterans on the team from the old Kalamazoo team, which placed second in the Mid-West in '76 and '77 and qualified for the Easterns in '76, '77 and '78. Made it to the final four of the '79 Central Regionals before losing a close one to Yellow Springs.

W.U.F.Ø. - from Williams College in Mass. Last year at April Fools, winners of the unofficial "best dressed" award, the team that symbolizes April Fools at its craziest.

N.Y. Hiefers - made it to the final four in N.E. before losing to Boston 10-9 with two seconds left (and a controversial foul).

Jersey Jolt - Second place in the 1980 M.A. Regionals, beat everyone except the eventual world champs, losing to Boro in the finals.

Seven Sages - a new up and coming team that, we hear, is made up of some of the 1980 Jolt team.

Wind - from Delaware, finished 2nd in 1980 M.A. South sectional, and missed going to the quarterfinals of the M.A. Regionals when they lost to the Zoo by one in O.T.

Uni. Penn - always one of the best of that state, came in 3rd in the Penn. sectionals.

Vassar - made it to the quarterfinals of their sectionals, which was won by Cornell.

Duke - lost by one to the Atlanta Peaches in their sectionals.

Boston Hostages - we're not sure who this team is, but we hear it's laden with Boston Univ. players. B.U. lost to Boston Aerodiscs in their sectionals, and then missed going to the regionals when they lost to Tufts by one.

Richmond Flite - a relatively new team, already considered to be in the top four or five of their section (which includes U.Va., UMS and Wind)

George Mason - the other contender for the #4 spot in their section, generally manages to beat or lose to Flite by one.

Webb Institute - Va. Tech - Ohio U.

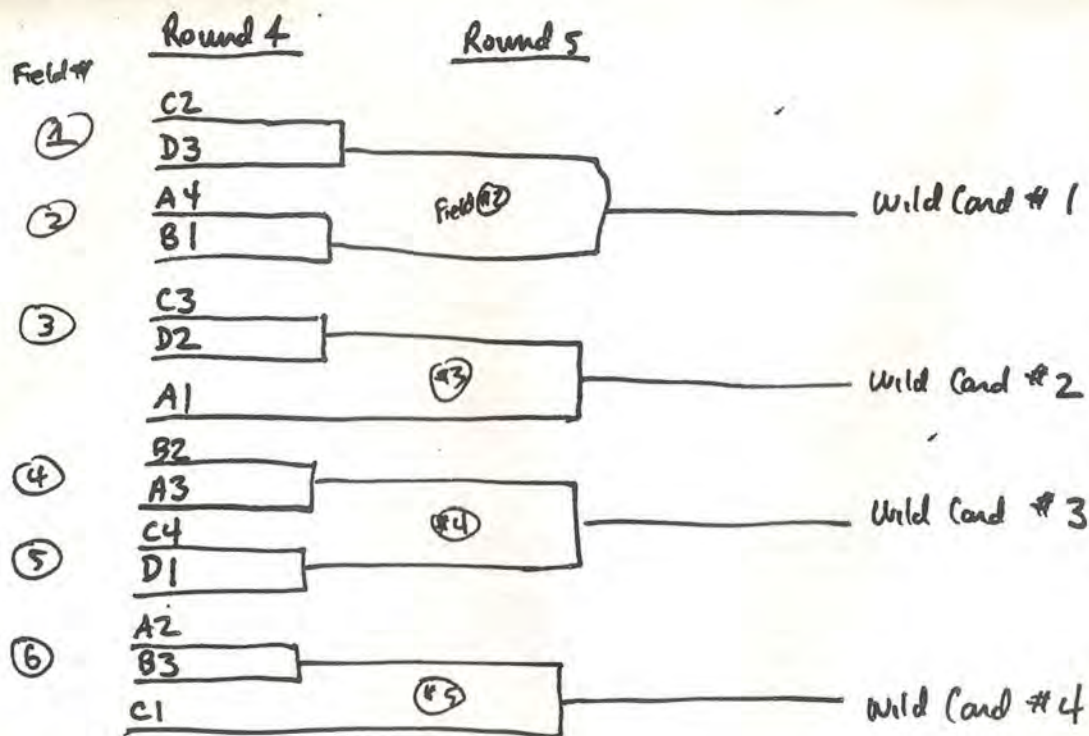

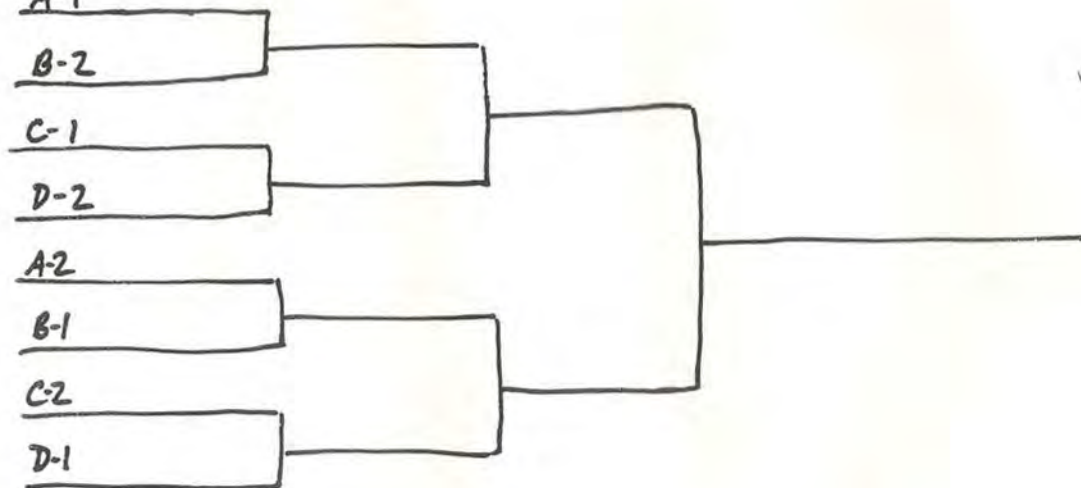

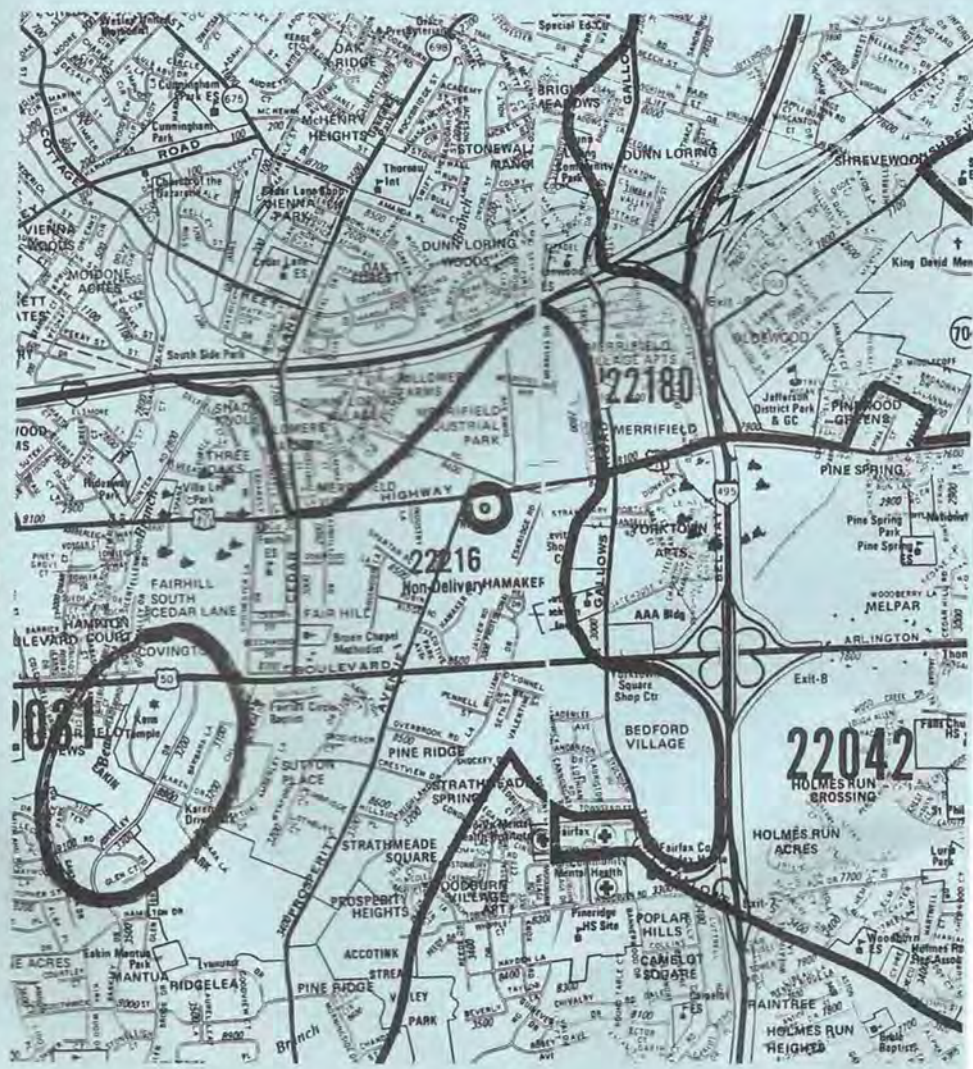

FRISBEE GOLF COURSES IN THE AREA

BULL RUN: Located in a huge park with large open fields, and many recreational facilities. Par 64 Fee: \$1.25 during summer months, the pole holes are taken down in the winter.

34 miles West of D.C. Take I-66 West (from the Beltway), exit at Centerville. Follow the signs (carefully) to the park. Call 631-0550 info.

BLUEMONT PARK: The only pole hole course inside the Beltway, it's in Arlington. Course is open year round, and there's no fee. The 9-hole course is Par 29. Take route 50 West, make right on Manchester, follow to the end, and turn right into park (you can get there right off of Wilson Blvd., too). Approx. 2 mi. East of 7 corners.

POHICK BAY: A multi-faceted park that attracts many people during the summer months, located right on the bay. Par 65, \$1.25 fee during summer months. 23 mi. South of D.C. Take I-95 South, exit at Lorton. Follow signs to Gunston Hall Pohick Regional Bay Park. Call 339-6100.

WINCHESTER: Recently completed course is in Fredrick County. We here that there's many rolling hills. Par? Fee? 18-holes. Take Rt. 7 West to I-81 South to Stephen City exit, 3 mi. turn right into park.

CALVERT ROAD: By far the longest course in the area. Par? Fee? It's a very scenic course. 10 mi. East of D.C. Take 495 to Kenilworth Av. (Rt. 201), 4 lights and make right on Old Calvert Rd. Park's on the right.

APRIL FOOL'S ULTIMATE FEST

The fourth annual April Fool's Ultimate Fest will be held Friday thru Sunday April 3-5. The 16 team, round-robin Fest will feature the world's three top Ultimate teams including: the world-champion Glassboro University team from New Jersey, the Boston Aerodiscs, and Michigan State University. The championship game will commence at 2pm on Sunday, April 5, at the Bull Run Regional Park in Manassas, Virginia.

Ultimate is a fast-moving, competitive non-contact sport played by two seven-person teams. The Frisbee flying disc may only be passed, and a goal is scored when a player successfully passed the Frisbee flying disc to a teammate in the endzone. Defense gains possession of the disc whenever a pass is incomplete. The honor system of sportsmanship permits the game to be played without referees.

The teams from the East, Midwest and South will play preliminary rounds beginning at 9am on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Other teams include: Yellowspring (OH), University of Michigan, University of Virginia, Knights of Nee (NJ), Worcester Polytechnic Institute (MA), Cornell University (NY), Ultimate Air and Space (DC), Williams University (MA), and Atlanta (GA). Four additional teams will be selected by Friday's matches. A separate field of six women's teams will also be playing round-robin matches.
