

The Game of Ultimate

ULTIMATE is a fast moving field sport played with a Frisbee disc. The action of the game combines the passing and scoring of football, the cutting and guarding of basketball and the non-stop field movement of soccer. Because Ultimate is a team sport in which each player must act as quarterback, receiver and defender, a large number of participants can be actively involved throughout the course of play.

Ultimate is played on a field similar to a football field, with 25 yard endzones at each end of a field that is 70 yards long by 40 yards wide. Two seven-person teams are on the field at once, with substitutions allowed only between goals.

The object of the game is to pass the disc from teammate to teammate until a pass is caught in the opponent's endzone. Running with the disc is not allowed; upon catching a pass, the player must stop running and establish a pivot foot before attempting the next pass. In the meantime, potential receivers are cutting towards and away from the player with the disc, often running established plays or patterns "on the fly." The disc may be thrown in any direction and there is no offsides. One point is awarded per goal. In tournament play, the first team to reach 21 points wins; however, this can be modified to any number of points or the game can be played to time, if necessary.

On defense, no overt contact or tackling is allowed. Rather, while the team in possession of the disc is advancing toward an endzone, the defending team tries to force a turnover by guarding the thrower and potential receivers, or by playing a zone defense. A turnover results whenever a pass is not completed, when it is caught or knocked down by an opposing player, is caught by a player out-of-bounds, or touches the ground at any point. This results in an immediate change of possession of the disc.

The use of a flying disc adds a dimension not seen in ball games and is one of the elements that makes Ultimate a truly unique sport. Unlike a ball, a disc sinks, floats and curves. A skilled thrower can guide it over and around defenders and float it ahead of a running receiver. An Ultimate game is filled with leaping one-handed catches, short give-and-go passes, field-length bombs and diving blocks and catches. Action is intense, exciting and continuous.

A second unique feature of Ultimate is that players on the field are responsible for their own foul and line calls, there are no referees. Players are therefore required by the rules to adhere to the highest standards of sportsmanship and to respect their opponents. This element, the "Spirit of the Game", is greatly valued by players because it creates an etiquette and camaraderie not typically found in other sports.

Famous Dates in Ultimate

1920's — Yale Students discover the fun of throwing pie tins from the Frisbie Baking Company in Bridgeport, Conn.

1948 — Fred Morrison, a California carpenter and building inspector, manufactures the first plastic flying disc.

1955 — Rich Kerr and A. K. "Spud" Melin invite Morrison to join Wham-O, Inc., in San Gabriel, calif.

1957 — Wham-O introduces the "Pluto Platter."

1958 — The First Annual International Frisbee Tournament is held in Escanaba, Mich.

1964 — Professional Model Frisbee is introduced.

1967 — The International Frisbee Association is founded.

1968 — The U.S. Navy spends nearly \$400,000 to test the Frisbee disc as a vehicle for keeping flares aloft.

1969 — Ultimate Frisbee is invented by Columbia High School students in Maplewood, N.J.

1972 — The first intercollegiate Ultimate Game is played between Princeton University and Rutgers University.

- **1974** Flying Disc World, a bimonthly flying disc magazine, is introduced.
- **1974** The first all-dog flying disc competition is held at California State University at Fullerton.
- **1974** The Rose Bowl World Frisbee Championship is held in Pasadena, Calif.
- 1975 Rules for Guts Frisbee are formalized by the International Frisbee Association.
- 1979 Tyler Roddick sets the distance record for under 2 age bracket — 8.70 meters — in Pasadena, Calif.
- 1980 Liz Reeves sets women's distance record of 122.63 meters in Richmond, U.K.
- 1984 Frank Aguilera of the United States sets men's distance record of 167,88 meters in Las Vegas, Nev.
- 1984 Don Cain sets Maximum Time Aloft (MTA) record.
- 1987 Frisbee disc marks 30 year anniversary.
- 1989 20 year anniversary of Ultimate Frisbee.
- 1990 Ultimate united with the American Heart Association at the Eastern Championships in Lawrenceville, N.J.


